### → From the Pastor →

But the angel said to them, "Do not be afraid for see –I am bringing you good news of great joy for all the people: to you is born this day in the city of David a Savior who is the Messiah, the Lord.....So they went with haste and found Mary and Joseph and the child lying in the manger. When they saw this, they made known what had been told them about the child; and all who heard it were amazed. But Mary treasured all these words and pondered them in her heart.

Luke 2:10, 16-19



It does not seem possible it is time to write the January-February pastor's column. We are not through celebrating the birth of the baby! We rejoice over that gift of God's love Incarnate. We want that rejoicing to last a little longer; we don't want to let go of the baby just yet. We want to gaze at that infant in his stable, and picture Mary, Joseph and the barnyard animals hovering over him. Yes, it's a smelly place...no barn is ever neat. But in the midst of sheep, cattle, goats and who knows what else, the Savior of the world is cooing. He is gazing at his mother and at Joseph. He turns his eyes to the animals and sees within their eyes the knowledge that he is special. Then, the shepherds enter.

They tell Mary and Joseph what had been told them by the angels. Jesus listens, enjoying the sound of their voices. How much does he comprehend? He's a newborn, so probably not much. But he can sense that these visitors have come to see him, and that he is special to them as well.

Jesus may not understand all that is happening, but Mary is capturing the words of the shepherds in her heart. Her thoughts center on her son, and what it means that he is the Messiah, the Lord. She is a faithful young woman; she knows the teachings that God would send a Savior to his people. This baby is he. How much does she understand about the extent of this? It is hard to know. In her Magnificat, she proclaims that God will bring down the powerful and uplift the lowly, feed the hungry and send the rich away empty. None of these things had happened in her lifetime. For her to proclaim that God would do this means she believed that God would use His (her) son to do this. Did she grasp that her son, the Son of God, would be put to death because he threatened those in power? Maybe those were not her thoughts as she held Jesus in that stable, but as his life unfolded, she could sense the hostility that the Pharisees, the Sadducees and the Roman rulers had towards him. You have to wonder if then, she realized the full scope of what it mean that Jesus was the Son of God.

For now, we can remain in the manger. But we cannot stay there for long; because he didn't. He left the safety of his mother's and Joseph's arms to travel to the Temple and begin to grasp who he was ("Did you not know I must be in my Father's house?"). From there, after several more years of learning and growing, he began his earthly ministry when he was baptized by John in the Jordan and his identity was revealed for all to see (And a voice came from heaven, "You are my Son, the Beloved, with you I am well pleased.) The

journey to the cross had begun, and that is where we find ourselves during the season of Lent.

It is all right not to want to face the cross immediately. We want to revel in the innocence of the baby, as if, by doing so; we can retain some of ours. But that also does not last forever. We face those who threaten us as much as Jesus faced those who threatened him. We walk with him, finding the courage to stand up to the same types of injustice and oppression that eventually took his life (temporarily). We feel the strength of the Spirit as we listen to his directions;" Love your enemies, do good to those who hate you, bless those who curse you, pray for those who abuse you." We can walk the path to the cross, but first, we can kneel at the manger and welcome this baby into our world.


