Teacher Certification in New York State

Local leaders and members are continually faced with many questions and problems regarding teacher certification in New York State because of significant changes in certification requirements over the last decade (see Appendices IV, V and VI). Some teachers are working toward their permanent certification status under regulations that were in place until February 1, 2004. Others will be working under new regulations that became effective on February 2, 2004. The purpose of this Information Bulletin is to summarize the information most commonly sought by members and local leaders and provide resources for addressing questions and problems. This Information Bulletin will only discuss the requirements for classroom teaching certification. For teaching assistant certification information, see NYSUT Information Bulletin #200610, New Certification Requirements for Teaching Assistants.

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OVERVIEW OF TEACHER CERTIFICATION

All teachers employed in the public schools in New York State must hold a valid certificate issued in accordance with Sections 3001 and 3009 of Education Law and Part 80 of the Regulations of the Commissioner of Education. Section 3001 establishes that no one is authorized to teach in a public school without a teaching certificate, and Section 3009 clearly states that unqualified teachers cannot be paid with district funds. Part 80 contains certification requirements for classroom teaching, administrative/supervisory and pupil personnel (school) service titles. The Office of Teaching Initiatives at the State Education Department is responsible for certifying teachers in New York State.

State certification is also required for teachers employed in state-operated and state-supported schools, Special Act school districts, approved private schools for the education of students with disabilities, and approved preschool special education programs.

THE CERTIFICATION PROCESS UNTIL FEBRUARY 1, 2004

The certification process for individuals who received provisional certification no later than February 1, 2004 is as follows:

PROVISIONAL CERTIFICATION

A provisional certificate was the first credential an individual received upon satisfactory completion of all teacher preparation requirements. The certificate expired five years from the date of issuance. A permanent certificate must be obtained within the period of validity. The last provisional certificates were issued on February 1, 2004.

PERMANENT CERTIFICATION

A permanent certificate is valid for life in the area of certification and would be issued upon completion of the following requirements:

- ❑ Satisfied the requirements for the provisional certificate;
- ❑ Application with fee;
- ❑ Master's degree (The graduate study which will culminate in a master's degree must be "functionally related" to the subject field or grade level in which certification is being requested. The term "functionally related" means that the graduate degree program is job-related, as determined by the Commissioner.);
- ❑ Two years of teaching experience in a public or nonpublic school (The teaching experience requirement means a minimum of two years of paid full-time elementary and/or secondary service. It is possible to combine different teaching experiences to meet the two-year requirement.);
- ❑ If required for the certificate title, New York State Teacher Certification Examinations (see Appendix II):
 - CST
 - Assessment of Teaching Skills-Performance (ATS-P); this is also known as the performance video; and
- ❑ United States Permanent Resident status.

THE CERTIFICATION PROCESS AS OF FEBRUARY 2, 2004

As of February 2, 2004, major changes occurred in NYS teacher certification. An **initial certificate** replaced a provisional certificate as an entry credential for teaching in New York State. The initial certificate is followed by a **professional certificate** as the final credential, not a permanent certificate. In addition certification titles changed as new titles were introduced and others were focused on more limited student populations. See Appendix V for a more detailed listing of the new certificate titles.

THE PATH TO CERTIFICATION

After February 2, 2004, an applicant may achieve certification in New York State through one of the following paths:

1. ***Successful completion of an approved teacher preparation program registered by the State Education Department.***

The type of certificate to be issued is determined by the recommending institution of higher education and is forwarded to the Office of Teaching Initiatives for approval. 2. ***Individual evaluation of a candidate's educational background by the State Education Department (also known as the Transcript Review process).***

As a result of a recent amendment to the Regulations of the Commissioner, the individual evaluation (or transcript review) process is no longer available to certificate-seekers in childhood education (Grades 1-6) but is available until February 1, 2012 for all other certificate titles. 3. ***Interstate Agreement on Qualifications of Educational Personnel.***

An applicant who has completed a program leading to a teaching certificate in another state or holds a teaching certificate from another state may meet the education requirement for the initial certificate, however all other requirements must be completed prior to the issuance of the initial certificate. 4. ***Certificate Issued by the National Board for Professional Teaching Standards.***

A teacher who holds a certificate from the National Board for Professional Teaching Standards (NBPTS) may obtain a New York State certificate in a comparable title, without meeting any additional education or testing requirements, through the National Board Pathway. Candidates holding at least a baccalaureate degree and a certificate issued by the National Board for Professional Teaching Standards in a title equivalent to the initial certificate title would fulfill the requirements for an initial certificate. This generally pertains to teachers certified in another state who move to New York. 5. ***Completion of an Alternative Teacher Certification Program.***

These models are aimed at experienced, second career professionals and are offered by colleges in conjunction with local school partners. They feature an accelerated introductory component, followed by paid employment, with extensive mentoring, coursework and other supports from the college and school district. Individuals with a baccalaureate degree entering the teaching profession through this path will first work under a transitional B certificate if enrolled in a college level alternative certification program leading to an initial certificate or a transitional C certificate if they hold a graduate degree or graduate professional degree and are enrolled in an intensive teacher preparation program leading to a professional certificate. Please be aware that these programs are not available in all areas of NYS.

INITIAL CERTIFICATION

In order to receive an initial certificate, an applicant must fulfill the following requirements:

- Application with fee;
- Baccalaureate degree;
- General Liberal Arts & Sciences coursework core;
- Content coursework core;
- Pedagogical coursework core;
- Student teaching (Experience as an employed teacher within the range of grades and the subject area of the certification area may be accepted in lieu of this requirement.);

- ❑ Literacy Practicum - Applicants for initial certification in Literacy must also complete a college-supervised practicum of 50 clock hours in teaching literacy to students, at developmental levels appropriate to the certificate sought. (One year of paid, satisfactory, full-time experience as a literacy teacher on the elementary and/or secondary level may be accepted in lieu of the college-supervised practicum.);
- ❑ Passing scores on the Liberal Arts and Sciences Test (LAST), Assessment of Teaching Skills-Written (ATS-W) and a Content Specialty Test (CST) in the certificate area (see Appendix III); The Speech and Language Disabilities certification title does not require the CST for initial certification;
- ❑ Child Abuse Identification workshop;
- ❑ School Violence Prevention workshop;
- ❑ Training in the Needs of Children with Autism (Coursework or workshop required for Special Education titles only – see under - Training in the Needs of Students with Autism for applicable titles); and
- ❑ Fingerprint clearance.

Please note that certification in career and technical subjects may not include all of the above requirements. Initial certificates are valid for five years, and the earliest effective date for individuals holding initial certificates would be September 1, 2004. It is important to note that originally the Board of Regents established a three-year validity for initial certificates, but NYSUT aggressively and successfully advocated for a change to this regulation. As a result, teachers holding initial certification are provided with additional time to meet the requirements for professional certification.

PROFESSIONAL CERTIFICATION

An applicant for a professional certificate must fulfill the following requirements:

- ❑ Satisfied the requirements for the initial certificate;
- ❑ Application with fee;
- ❑ Three years of teaching experience with the first year as a mentored teaching experience;
- ❑ Master's degree (see under - Other Certification Information - *Master's Degree Requirement for Professional Certification* for an explanation of this requirement);
- ❑ United States Permanent Residence status; and
- ❑ Applicants for the professional certificate title - Speech and Language Disabilities are required to pass the CST for Speech and Language Disabilities.

Please note that certification in career and technical subjects may not include all of the identified requirements. See Appendix VII for specific information.

In order to maintain the validity of the professional certificate, an individual will be required to complete 175 hours of professional development, consistent with the school district's Professional Development Plan, every five years. Please note that there is no professional development requirement for maintaining the validity of a **permanent certificate**.

CERTIFICATE HOLDERS SEEKING AN ADDITIONAL CERTIFICATE

In general, the following pertain to an individual who currently holds a certificate (in other than a career and technical title) and who applies for an additional certificate in another subject title:

- ❑ Must complete the content core in the subject area of the additional certificate sought- 30 semester hours (with no more than 6 in a cognate or related field.)
- ❑ Not required to repeat the general education core for the additional certificate
- ❑ Not required to complete the pedagogical core for the additional certificate except for the following titles: early childhood education (birth-grade 2), childhood education (grades 1-6),

generalist or specialist in middle childhood education (grades 5-9); English to speakers of other languages (all grades); literacy (birth-grade 6) and (grades 5-12); students with disabilities (birth-grade 2),(grades 1-6), (grades 5-9), and (grades 7-12); deaf and hard of hearing (all grades); blind or visually impaired (all grades); and speech and languages disabilities (all grades)

- ❑ Not required to re-take the Liberal Arts and Sciences Test (LAST) or the Written Assessment of Teaching Skills (ATS-W)
- ❑ Must complete the appropriate Content Specialty test in the subject of the additional certificate sought

CONTACT INFORMATION

An official response on the interpretation of certification regulations or the determination of individual certification status can only be obtained from the State Education Department's Office of Teaching Initiatives. However, please be aware that the office has a backlog of pending applications, and it is very difficult to contact staff by telephone. Frequently, written information resolving questions can be found on the Office of Teaching Initiatives Web site. If an answer cannot be found there, we suggest that individuals e-mail the Office of Teaching Initiatives for information. In that way you create a complete record reflecting the date, time, question and response for your personal certification files. **Remember, it is important to maintain a personal certification file which includes not only copies of any and all correspondence concerning certification but also copies of your certificate(s), test scores, transcripts, notes of any conversations with officials, etc. This file documents your efforts in maintaining your teaching credential and can assist you if there is a problem regarding your certification status.**

ASSESSMENT OF TEACHING SKILLS-PERFORMANCE (VIDEO)

The ATS-P is **still** a requirement for permanent certification in PreK-6, academic subjects for Grades 7-12 (mathematics, physics, chemistry, biology, earth science, social studies, English, languages other than English) and English to speakers of other languages. However, the ATS-P is not a requirement for individuals seeking initial or professional certificates (i.e.: individuals certified after 2/2/04).

CHILD ABUSE IDENTIFICATION AND SCHOOL VIOLENCE PREVENTION TRAINING

All applicants for certification are required to complete two clock hours of coursework or training regarding the identification and reporting of suspected child abuse and maltreatment in accordance with Sections 3003(4) and 3004 of the Education Law. In addition, all applicants for a certificate on or after February 2, 2001 are required to complete two clock hours of course work or training in school violence prevention and intervention in accordance with Section 3004 of the Education Law. These requirements are frequently fulfilled as part of a teacher preparation program. If not, training in these two subjects is available only from a provider approved by the New York State Education Department. CONDITIONAL INITIAL CERTIFICATES

An individual certified in another state may apply for a conditional initial certificate. This certificate is valid for two years and non-renewable, during which time the teacher must satisfy the examination requirement for a regular initial certificate. If the candidate has satisfied the testing requirement at the end of two years, a regular initial certificate will be issued, valid for five years from the effective date of the conditional certificate. Candidates issued initial certificates must still satisfy all graduate degree, experiential, examination and workshop requirements for the professional certificate.

EXTENSION OF TIME FOR PROVISIONAL/INITIAL/TRANSITIONAL CERTIFICATE

An extension of the provisional, initial or transitional certificate, not to exceed two years, may be granted to an individual:

- who is on leave from his/her teaching duties because of childbearing, child rearing, serious illness, or extended illness; or
- who is serving with the Peace Corps or other volunteer organization; or
- whose service as a teacher has been discontinued as a result of abolition of teaching positions in the school district in which employed; or
- who, because of extreme hardship or other circumstances beyond his/her control, was unable to complete the requirements for the Permanent or Professional certificate in a timely manner, excluding normal family commitments or inconvenience; or

- ❑ who is not a citizen of the United States and who has applied for citizenship or permanent residency status and whose application has not been acted upon by the United States Citizenship and Immigration Services (USCIS); or
- ❑ who has been unable to secure employment as a teacher or who has been pursuing a career other than teaching.

The Commissioner may, under certain circumstances, extend the time validity of an expired provisional, initial or transitional certificate beyond the two-year extension for one additional year.

Further, the time validity of certificates held by teachers on active duty with the Armed Forces may be extended by the Commissioner, upon the application by the holder of such certificate, for the time of such active service.

Persons requesting the time extension will be required to submit an application with a \$50 non-refundable fee, and those individuals who have not completed a Master's degree, for Professional/Permanent certification, must obtain a written plan, signed by their college advisor describing how they will complete their academic requirements for the Master's degree prior to the expiration of their time-extended certificate.

To be eligible for a time extension, Provisional certificate holders **MUST** have passed the Content Specialty Test if one is required for the Permanent certificate.

FINGERPRINTING

Applicants for certification must be fingerprinted. An individual who has been fingerprinted for certification or public school employment purposes need not be fingerprinted again for subsequent certification or employment. INCIDENTAL TEACHING

A teacher may be assigned to teach a subject not covered by the teacher's certificate or license for a period not to exceed "five classroom hours per week." The regulations require that the district first seek a certified teacher, file an application, and receive approval of the Commissioner. Requests for incidental teaching approvals are submitted directly to the local BOCES District Superintendent as an agent of the Commissioner. Incidental teaching in New York City is approved by the Chancellor of the New York City Department of Education. Special education may not be taught on an incidental basis.

ISSUANCE OF CERTIFICATES

Under Department regulations, teaching certificates must be assigned either a September 1 or February 1 effective date. Once an individual has met all the requirements the certificate is issued with an effective date of either the February 1 or September 1 date that will next occur chronologically. The Office of Teaching Initiatives has a longstanding policy that once a certificate is issued, the teacher may begin employment in a public school under that certificate title. For example, someone who satisfied the requirements for a teaching certificate on October 1, 2009 would be granted a certificate with an effective date of February 1, 2010 and he or she is qualified to teach in a New York State public school on October 1, 2008 even though the effective date of the certificate would be February 1, 2010.

Applications submitted after July 2009 will remain in active status for three years and applications that are not complete after the second evaluation must be resubmitted, with another fee, for a subsequent evaluation.

LIMITED EXTENSIONS

The New York State Board of Regents recently adopted changes to the Commissioner's Regulations permitting teacher certification flexibility to avoid or mitigate reductions in force. Certain general education and students with disabilities teachers may be reassigned to teach in grades close to their current certification area for up to two years. Such reassignment will require a "Limited Extension" to a base certificate.

Limited certificate extensions will be granted to currently employed experienced and qualified teachers that have a Superintendent's statement attesting:

- the district is in an immediate fiscal crises and the issuance of the extension will avoid or mitigate a reduction in force,
- the teacher is Highly Qualified under NCLB,
- the district will provide appropriate support to the teacher, and
- has verified that the teacher is enrolled in study at an institution of higher education to complete the requirements for the full extension.

These Limited Extensions are not renewable and their availability will expire June 30, 2013.

LITERACY PRACTICUM

In addition to student teaching, individuals seeking certification in Literacy shall satisfactorily complete a college-supervised practicum of 50 clock hours in teaching literacy to students, at developmental levels appropriate to the certificate sought. For candidates who apply for both certificate titles, literacy (birth-grade 6) and literacy (grades 5-12), the 50-clock hour practicum shall include 25 hours of teaching students (birth-grade 6) and 25 clock hours of teaching students (grades 5-12). One year of paid, satisfactory, full-time experience as a literacy teacher on the elementary and/or secondary level may be accepted in lieu of the college-supervised practicum in literacy when such experience is verified by the employing school district administrator. For example, a Literacy Birth to Grade 6 teacher can satisfy the practicum for the Literacy Grades 5 to 12 certificate by completing one year of literacy teaching experience at one of the crossover grades (either Grade 5 or Grade 6).

MASTER'S DEGREE REQUIREMENT FOR PROFESSIONAL CERTIFICATION

The Master's degree for a professional certificate is not defined as "functionally related" as allowed under the requirements for a permanent certificate. The professional certification requirement is satisfied, if an individual:

- ❑ successfully completes a graduate teacher education program leading to any certificate, whether in New York State or another jurisdiction;
- ❑ holds a master's degree accepted previously to satisfy requirements for a NYS permanent or professional certificate;
- ❑ successfully completes a master's or higher degree program in the content core of the initial certificate or in a related content area; or
- ❑ successfully completes a master's or higher degree program in any field, provided that the individual has completed at least 12 semester hours of graduate study in the content core of the initial certificate or in a related content area.

MENTORING

To obtain a professional certificate, an individual employed in a public school district must receive mentoring in their first year of teaching. Individuals who have had at least two years of teaching prior to service in a public school under an initial certificate are exempt from this requirement.

Public school employers are responsible for reporting the mentored experience for the certificate holders they employ using the Superintendent Statement option directly to the TEACH online system.

NYS TEACHER CERTIFICATION EXAMINATION PROGRAM

The New York State Teacher Certification Examination (NYSTCE) program is designed to help ensure that certified teachers have the knowledge and skills that are important for the job of teaching in New York State public schools. The testing program is administered by the Evaluation Systems group of Pearson, for the New York State Education Department.

The NYSTCEs consist of the following tests:

- ❑ Liberal Arts and Sciences Test (LAST);
- ❑ Assessment of Teaching Skills-Written (ATS-W) in either the elementary or secondary version;
- ❑ Content Specialty Tests (CSTs);
- ❑ Bilingual Education Assessment (BEA);
- ❑ Communication and Quantitative Skills Test (CQST); and
- ❑ Assessment of Teaching Skills-Performance (ATS-P), also known as the video.

Individuals seeking a New York State teaching certificate must achieve qualifying scores on a set of assessments, depending upon the certificate title. A listing of certification test requirements by certificate title can be found in Appendices II and III.

Some of these examinations are now available electronically in addition to the regularly scheduled paper and pencil test administrations. Computer-based testing (CBT) is available Monday through Saturday (excluding holidays) at Pearson Professional Centers at a time that is convenient for the test taker. REISSUANCE OF AN INITIAL CERTIFICATE

An expired initial certificate can be reissued for a period of five years. Applicants seeking a certificate reissuance of an Initial certificate will be required, within one year prior to the candidate's application for a reissued initial certificate, to:

- ❑ re-take and pass the applicable NYSTCE content specialty test(s) if the certificate has been expired for more than two years; and
- ❑ successfully complete 75 hours of acceptable professional development.

The initial certificate can only be reissued once and would not be eligible for an additional extension of time. Please note that the Department is currently **not accepting** applications for re-issuance of an expiring Initial certificate. Check the NYSED Web page:

REVOCAATION

Under Part 83 of the Regulations of the Commissioner, the Commissioner of Education may institute proceedings to remove a teacher's certificate for cause under the good moral character requirement. A due process hearing is required. Certification may be revoked for conviction of a serious crime, or if the teacher has committed an act which raises a reasonable question as to the teacher's moral character.

STUDENT TEACHING

A candidate for initial certification must have completed 40 school days in a college-supervised student teaching experience. Student teaching must be under the direct supervision of a certified teacher and in the subject area and grade level of the certificate being sought. Applicants may also meet this requirement by documenting at least 40 days of full-time teaching experience in the subject area and at the developmental (grade) level appropriate to the certificate.

SUBSTITUTE TEACHERS

Commissioner's Regulations define a substitute teacher as "one who is employed in place of a regularly appointed teacher who is absent but is expected to return." Persons serving on a long-term basis must have proper certification for the position. There are three categories of substitutes:

1. ***Substitutes with valid teaching certificates or certificates of qualifications.***
Service may be rendered in any capacity for any number of days. If employed on more than an "itinerant basis" (employment for 40 days or less by a school district in a school year) such persons will be employed in an area for which they are certified.
2. ***Substitutes without a valid certificate, but who are completing collegiate study towards certification at the rate of not less than six semester hours per year.***
Services may be rendered in any capacity for any number of days, in any number of school districts. If employed on more than an "itinerant basis," such persons will be employed in an area for which they are seeking certification.

3. ***Substitutes without a valid certificate and who are not working toward certification.***

Service may be rendered in New York State public schools for no more than 40 days per school year.

The chief school officer must submit an annual report to the State Education Department concerning the employment of all uncertified substitute teachers.

SUPPLEMENTARY TEACHING CERTIFICATE

In response to persistent teacher shortages in certain subject areas, the Regulations of the Commissioner of Education were recently amended to establish the supplementary teaching certificate. This credential will allow a teacher certified in one classroom teaching area to provide instruction in a different certificate area where there is a demonstrated shortage of qualified teachers while meeting the requirements necessary for a certificate in the new certificate title. Anticipated as a temporary measure, individuals will be unable to obtain this credential after September 2, 2009. The requirements for a supplementary certificate include:

- A demonstrated shortage of certified teachers in that subject area;
- A school district or BOCES makes a commitment to employ a teacher holding a supplementary certificate and provide appropriate support;
- The individual holds a valid provisional, initial, permanent or professional certificate in another area;
- The individual has completed a specific number of semester hours in the content core of the new certificate area;
- The individual has passed the Content Specialty Test in the new certificate area; and
- The individual is enrolled in collegiate study leading to the fulfillment of the new certificate requirements.

The supplementary certificate is valid for three years and is non-renewable.

TEACH ONLINE SERVICES SYSTEM

TEACH has been developed by the Office of Teaching Initiatives as an online application and database system replacing the submission of paper applications. This is now the preferred method of sharing information about certification. TEACH allows:

- Applicants for Certification** to apply online for certification or fingerprint clearance and check the status of applications, documents and test results received.
- Applicants for Fingerprint Clearance** to apply online for fingerprint clearance and check the status of the fingerprint clearance.
- Public Schools** to obtain application status updates on current or potential employees, request fingerprint clearance for prospective employees and submit superintendent statements.
- New York State Colleges/Universities** to submit recommendations for certification program completers online and track the certification status of graduates.

Members are urged to establish individual password-protected TEACH accounts to better manage their certification activities and ensure that the information in the account is accurate. See NYSUT Briefing Bulletin # **10-13** for more information on the TEACH system.

TRAINING IN THE NEEDS OF STUDENTS WITH AUTISM

Applicants who apply for certain certificate titles on or after September 2, 2009, must complete course work or at least three clock hours of training in the needs of students with autism either as part of an approved teacher preparation program or from an approved provider. The applicable titles are:

- Students with Disabilities (all grade levels)
- Speech and Language Disabilities
- Deaf and Hard of hearing
- Blind or Visually Impaired

TRANSITIONAL CERTIFICATES

Individuals may be issued transitional certificates, valid for three years, which would allow for their employment in public school settings. Those transitional certificates for teaching titles are as follows:

- ❑ **Transitional A**
Available after February 2, 2004 for individuals who do not hold initial or professional certification in specific career and technical subjects.
- ❑ **Transitional B**
Issued to individuals enrolled in an alternative certification program leading to an initial certificate.
- ❑ **Transitional C**
Issued to individuals who hold a graduate academic or graduate professional degree and are enrolled in an intensive program leading to a professional certificate.

UNITED STATES PERMANENT RESIDENCE

New York State Education Law now permits individuals with US Citizenship and Immigration Services (USCIS) Permanent Residence status to qualify for a permanent or professional teacher certificate. To verify permanent residence status, submit one of the following with the application:

- ❑ A photocopy of your permanent resident card (also known as a "Green Card"); or
- ❑ A photocopy of your passport stamped with "Processed for 1-551 Temporary Evidence of Lawful Admission for Permanent Residence"; or
- ❑ A certified and sealed copy of a letter from the USCIS verifying permanent residence.

ADVICE FOR LOCAL LEADERS

- ◆ **Each teacher is responsible for meeting the requirements of his/her certification!** A teacher must secure, maintain and provide evidence of certification and must pay particular attention to changes in certification requirements. It is impossible to correct some situations which have occurred due to the inattention of the teacher.
- ◆ Individual members are urged to establish their password-protected TEACH online account with the NYSED's Office of Teaching Initiatives (OTI). See NYSUT Briefing Bulletin 10-13 for information on NYSED's TEACH Online Services.
- ◆ Individual members experiencing certification problems are urged to first contact their local union leadership for advice and direction, rather than attempting to deal directly with the State Education Department.
- ◆ Local leaders whose members are faced with questions regarding certification are urged to contact their NYSUT Labor Relations Specialist. In order to be of the greatest help, you should provide the name of the teacher and social security number, as well as a brief description of the problem or question.
- ◆ Local leaders are reminded that failure to maintain certification is grounds for dismissal. Effective 03/02/2010, paper certificates are no longer printed for time-limited certificates (Initial, Provisional, etc). Certification status should be verified by using TEACH Online Services.
- ◆ Local leaders should encourage and remind their members to maintain a personal certification file. This file should include copies of certificate(s), test scores, transcripts, copies of any and all correspondence concerning certification, notes of any conversations with officials, professional development hours, etc. Such a personal file can minimize delay or concern which may arise at a future date regarding an individual teacher's certification status.
- ◆ Members should be advised, when mailing information to the State Education Department, to use certified mail, return receipt requested.
- ◆ Local leaders should alert their members to the fact that the State Education Department generally has a backlog of applications to process.
- ◆ Individual members who have not yet completed the requirements for permanent or professional certification should be strongly encouraged to maintain continuous progress toward meeting the

requirements. Accurate records should be maintained regarding this process, as well as reasons for failure to maintain progress (e.g., leave of absence, loss of position, illness, etc.).

- ◆ New certification regulations require a mentor program for all first year public school teachers. Therefore, local leaders should seek to negotiate language regarding the mentor program. Please note that your district's Professional Development Plan must contain information detailing the mentoring program. See NYSUT Information Bulletin #200807 (February 2008) for information on District-Based Teacher Mentoring Programs.

WHICH CERTIFICATION REQUIREMENTS AFFECT YOU?

New York State teacher certification regulations have changed a number of times over the years, but did you know that you are held to the requirements in place at the time you were first certified in that particular teaching title*? As a result, there are individuals currently teaching in the same title area who may need to meet very different criteria in order to obtain their final credential.

For example, if you were first certified...

- ***No later than September 1, 1993***

Applicants would have been issued a certificate of qualification as their first credential. There are no testing requirements for permanent certification regardless of your certificate title. There is also no fingerprint clearance requirement for certification. You would be required to fulfill the following:

- An application for permanent certification with fee;
- Two years of teaching experience;
- A master's degree that is functionally related to the certificate title;
- Workshops in the identification and reporting of child abuse and in school violence prevention and intervention; and
- United States Permanent Residence status.

If individuals held to these regulations do not obtain permanent certification in the time allowed and their teaching credential expires, they could start the certification process again...but it would be under the regulations in place as of that date!

- ***Between September 2, 1993 and September 1, 1999***

Applicants would have been issued a certificate of qualification as their first credential until September 1, 1998. After that date, certificates of qualification were discontinued and applicants would have been issued a provisional certificate. For permanent certification in the same title as your provisional, you would be required to fulfill the following:

- An application for permanent certification with fee;
- Two years of teaching experience;
- A master's degree that is functionally related to the certificate title;
- Qualifying scores on the applicable Content Specialty Test and the Assessment of Teaching Skills-Performance (video), if required for that certificate title;
- Fingerprint clearance;
- Workshops in the identification and reporting of child abuse and in school violence prevention and intervention; and
- United States Permanent Residence status.

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If they do not obtain permanent certification in the time allowed and their teaching credential expires, they also could start the certification process again...but it would be under the regulations in place as of that date!

- ***Between September 2, 1999 and February 1, 2004***

An applicant for a permanent certificate who obtained a provisional, conditional provisional, transitional, limited or renewed provisional certificate during this period of time would be required to fulfill the following:

- ❑ An application for permanent certification with fee;
- ❑ Two years of teaching experience;
- ❑ A master's degree that is functionally related to the certificate title;
- ❑ Workshops in the identification and reporting of child abuse and in school violence prevention and intervention;
- ❑ Qualifying scores on the applicable Content Specialty Test and the Assessment of Teaching Skills-Performance (video), if required for that certificate title;
- ❑ United States Permanent Residence status; and
- ❑ Fingerprint clearance

If they do not obtain permanent certification by the time allowed and their teaching credential expires, they also could start the certification process again...but it would be under the regulations in place as of that date!

- ***On or After February 2, 2004***

Major changes occurred in NYS teacher certification for individuals applying for a credential on or after this date. An initial certificate replaces a provisional certificate as an entry credential for teaching in New York State, and, in turn, these individuals will be working toward a professional certificate as their final credential, not a permanent certificate. The earliest effective date for individuals holding initial certificates would be September 1, 2004. No examinations, workshops in the identification and reporting of child abuse and in school violence prevention and intervention, and fingerprint clearance will be required for professional certification because they were completed prior to the issuance of the initial certificate. In addition, the Assessment of Teaching Skills-Performance (video) will not be required for an initial or professional certificate. An applicant for a professional certificate would be required to fulfill the following:

- ❑ An application for professional certification with fee;
- ❑ **Three** years of teaching experience with the first year as a mentored teaching experience;
- ❑ A master's degree; and
- ❑ United States Permanent Residence status.

In order to maintain the validity of the professional certificate, an individual will be required to complete 175 hours of professional development, consistent with the school district's Professional Development Plan, every five years. There is no professional development requirement for maintaining the validity of a permanent certificate.

All candidates who apply for teacher certification on or after February 2, 2004 will be subject to new certification requirements as found in Part 80 of the Regulations of the Commissioner of Education. Those new certification requirements also reflect a number of new or revised certificate titles. This Briefing Bulletin contrasts the certificate titles available prior to February 2, 2004 with the new certificate titles effective on or after February 2, 2004.

It is important to note that teacher certification candidates who:

- **have been issued a provisional certificate with an effective date that begins on or before February 1, 2004; and have not allowed their provisional certification to lapse; and will seek permanent certification in the same certificate title will not be affected by the new certification requirements or new certificate titles.**

Teacher certification candidates who:

- **apply for a new certificate title after February 2, 2004 will gain certification under the new requirements and titles.**

Local leaders should be aware of those certification title areas that are narrowed after February 2, 2004. There is the potential for significant impact on staffing and teacher assignments in the future for those teachers certified under the new titles.

Certification Types for Teachers and Teaching Assistants

April 2006 marked the latest changes in New York State certification for teachers and teaching assistants, and it is no longer as simple as having provisional or permanent certification. Currently, there are no less than thirteen different types of certificates for teachers and five different types of certificates for teaching assistants. The following charts detail those certificates. It is important for members to know about their credential and the need to protect their career and livelihood by maintaining appropriate certification. Local leaders should be aware of the variety of certificate types and the purpose and validity of each certificate.
