DANGERS IN AND AROUND ABANDONED MINES

SHAFTS

The collar or top of the mine shaft is especially dangerous. The fall down a deep shaft is just as lethal as the fall from a tall building-with the added disadvantage of bouncing from wall to wall in a shaft and the likelihood of having falling rock and timbers for company. Even if a person survived such a fall, it may be impossible to climb back out.

The rock at the surface is often decomposed. Timbers may be rotten or missing. It is dangerous to walk ANYWHERE near a shaft opening-the whole area is often ready and waiting to slide into the shaft, along with the curious.

A shaft sunk inside a tunnel is called a winze. In many old mines, winzes have been boarded over. If these boards have decayed, a perfect trap is waiting.

WATER

Many tunnels have standing pools of water which could conceal holes in the floor. Pools of water also are common at the bottom of shafts. It is usually impossible to estimate the depth of the water, and a false step could lead to drowning.

LADDERS

Ladders in most abandoned mines are unsafe. Ladder rungs are missing or broken. Some will fail under the weight of a child because of dry rot. Vertical ladders are particularly dangerous.

CAVE-INS

Cave-ins are an obvious danger. Areas that are likely to cave often are hard to detect. Minor disturbances, such as vibrations caused by walking or speaking, may cause a cave-in. If a person is caught, he can be crushed to death. A less cheerful possibility is to be trapped

behind a cave-in without anyone knowing you are there. Death may come through starvation, thirst, or gradual suffocation.

TIMBER

The timber in abandoned mines can be weak from decay. Other timber, although apparently in good condition, may become loose and fall at the slightest touch. A well-timbered mine opening can look very solid when in fact the timber can barely support its own weight. There is the constant danger of inadvertently touching a timber and causing the tunnel to collapse.

BAD AIR

"Bad air" contains poisonous gases or insufficient oxygen. Poisonous gases can accumulate in low areas or along the floor. A person may enter such areas breathing the good air above the gases but the motion caused by walking will mix the gases with the good air, producing a possibly lethal mixture for him to breathe on the return trip.

Because little effort is required to go down a ladder, the effects of "bad air" may not be noticed, but when climbing out of a shaft, a person requires more oxygen and breathes more deeply. The result is dizziness, followed by unconsciousness. If the gas doesn't kill, the fall will.

EXPLOSIVES

Many abandoned mines contain old explosives left by previous workers. This is extremely dangerous. Explosives should never be handled by anyone not thoroughly familiar with them. Even experienced miners hesitate to handle old explosives. Old dynamite sticks and caps can explode if stepped on or just touched.

<u>RAT</u>TLESNAKES

Old mine tunnels and shafts are among their favorite haunts-to cool of in summer, or to search for rodents and other small animals. Any hole or ledge, especially near the mouth of the tunnel or shaft, can conceal a snake.

DON'T VANDALIZE

Fences, barricades, and warning signs are there for your safety. Disturbing or vandalizing them is dangerous. Mine owners have constructed these safeguards at there expense for your protection. Please cooperate with their efforts.

Those who remove tools, equipment, building materials, and other objects from mines and buildings around mines do not go home with souvenirs, but with stolen property. Many mines that look abandoned are private property-they are only idle, and waiting to be reworked.

RESCUE PROBLEMS

NO INEXPERIENCED PERSON SHOULD ATTEMPT TO RES-CUE THE VICTIM OF A MINE ACCIDENT! CALL THE COUNTY SHERIFF. He is in the best position to organize a rescue operation. Attempting to rescue a person from a mine accident is usually difficult and dangerous for both the victim and the rescuer. Even professional rescue teams face death or injury, though trained to avoid all unnecessary risks. It makes no sense to kill one person to rescue another. Anyone, adults as well as children, should consider the extreme dangers even to highly trained rescue teams, when tempted to enter mines for any reason. THERE IS ONLY ONE SAFE WAY TO DEAL WITH ABAN-DONED MINES-

Lost Indian Mine

Sometime in the 1870's. when settlements in northern Nevada were few and far between, a pioneer named job Taylor opened a trading post iust over the California state line in Indian Valley. Since this store was the only one for miles around, for years he was able to sell supplies to many residents of northwestern Nevada, Indians whites alike. Money was nearly as scarce as stores in those days, so the customers in Taylor's often paid for their purchases with furs, other goods, and on occasion gold specimens. Even so, he was quite Surprised one day when a young Indian came shopping and paid for his supplies with gold nuggets "as large as hen's eggs." When questioned about the source of his wealth, the Indian hurriedly gathered his purchases and left, giving no answer whatsoever to Taylor's inquiries.

More than a year later the Indian returned for more supplies. Again the trader questioned him about the gold. Just as before, the Paiute paid for the goods with nuggets, said not one word about their origin, and hurried away as soon as he could.

Once again, the following year, the Indian returned to the store, but this time changing tactics Taylor began win-

ning the man's confidence. Eventually, in return for a certain amount of supplies from the trading post, the Paiute agreed to show him to the spot where he gathered the gold. Elated over this turn of events, Taylor contacted Captain Wetherell, a veteran Indian fighter, and the three men started east into Nevada. As the Paiute described it. their destination was a mountain stream, lined in places with trees and filled with gold nuggets as well as trout.

After passing through Susanville, the three-man party stayed on the old Honey Lake road and finally made camp one night at Deep Hole



Spring, eight miles northwest of present Gerlach. At the same time Old Winnemucca, chief of the Paiutes, was holding council on Granite Mountain adjacent to Deep Hole. Taylor's Indian guide, who was also carrying a message from his people in California to the Paiutes in Nevada, took an extra day to meet with the old chief. When he returned to the camp at Deep Hole he apologized, but stated that Winnemucca had been very angry when he found out where the Indian was leading the two whites and absolutely forbade him to continue. He even went so far as to promise certain death if they did not immediately turn back to California. Under these conditions there was no alternative but to retrace their steps to Indian Valley.

Whether Winnemucca frightened him or whether he simply had no cold to trade, the Indian never returned to the store. But the following summer a Paiute boy came to buy supplies and made his purchases with similar nuggets. Taylor quickly, made friends with the boy and had no trouble getting him to talk. 'While the boy knew all about the -old-filled stream, he had never actually seen it. He said he did know an old exiled Indian living near Deep Hole who might be induced Again Taylor and Wetherell, with the boy, journeyed east until they reached Deep Hole. There they found the old Paiute, but while considered an outcast he was still loyal to the tribe. He refused to lead the whites to the gold under any conditions whatsoever. I This time, trough, the two men refused to give up. They

men refused to give up. They demanded that the boy lead them as close as possible to where his elders gathered their nuggets. Frightened, but with no other choice, he claimed it was only "two sleeps" east of Deep Hole, and the), continued on.

After two days of traveling the three made camp. According to the young Indian they were still quite a distance from the area of the stream. That night, as Taylor and Wetherell lay in their blankets, they discussed the prospects of finding the gold. Believing that the boy was asleep, Wetherell said that the little Indian had better be true to his word if he knew what was good for him. The tone of voice frightened the boy more than anything else did and, when dawn broke, he slipped away and soon was long gone.

The two men continued to search for a while but eventually they turned back

WHO HAS THE MINING CLAIMS?

by Doug Driesner (from Update March 1999. State of Nevada, Division of Minerals)

Based on information obtained from the BLM, there are, as of July 1, 1998, approximately 138,000 active mining claims in Nevada. The number of active claims constantly varies as new claims are staked and some claims are dropped. The BLM data shows a total of 7.333 claimants however the actual number is a little smaller. This is because the BLM's computers would count, for example, J. Doe and John Doe as two claimants when they are the same.

While most of Nevada's mineral production is the result of the efforts of large companies, most of the claimants hold relatively small numbers of claims. Over 65 percent of all claimants (4,776) hold between one and ten claims. An additional 1,022 claimants (14 percent of all claimants) hold between eleven and twenty claims. Thus, nearly 80 percent of the claimants hold between one and twenty claims. The BLM records show that collectively the nine largest claimants hold over 36,000 claims. In addition

to holding claims in their own name, most of the mining companies also lease claims held by others. Thus the larger companies actually control more claims than they have staked themselves.

According to the results of the Division's survey of 1997 exploration activity, 18 companies each controlled more than 1,000 claims with 9 of those companies each controlling over 5,000 claims.

The Division of Minerals is happy to assist anyone needing information on mining claim staking or filing procedures. The Division's Carson City and Las Vegas offices each have the necessary forms for filing with the County Recorder's offices.

without success. Many times thereafter Taylor traveled the country "two sleeps" beyond Deep Hole, searching canyon after canyon for the right stream. Eventually he felt that the nugget-filled canyon was the one located just south of Virgin Valley.

Legend has it that Indians had worked this canyon before white men ever settled the area. Another legend infers that the canyon is in reality the site of the lost Blue Bucket gold of Oregon fame. The canyon is now nearly impassible except on foot, and if gold is there it will be a long time before it will be found.
