Pastor's Word

There is, amazingly, only one month remaining before my sabbatical begins. April 24 will be my last Sunday, with my sabbatical beginning May 1. I will return on Sunday, July 24. This will be my last *Spire* column for awhile.

What follows is an effort to give some perspective and answer some questions you may have about my upcoming sabbatical.

I am now in my 23rd year as pastor of First Baptist. This is the longest pastorate in the church's 154-year history, and I attribute that longevity in part to having had two sabbaticals over the course of these years – opportunities for personal and spiritual renewal that have been wonderful experiences. Beyond that, for the church to offer these sabbaticals says a lot about the kind of church this is – a caring and supportive church, which is another big factor in my having been here so long. In fact, the deacons approached me last summer and given how tough the pandemic had been, they encouraged me to take a sabbatical - even without knowing that according to our policy, I would be eligible for a sabbatical in 2022.

The past two years have been tough ones for churches in general. For many churches, attendance is down, finances are tight, and there has been increased conflict, including fighting over COVID mitigation measures. Many pastors have been caught in the middle on this, and have found leading in a time for which they were not necessarily prepared to be very stressful. The number of clergy leaving the profession is alarming – one 2021 survey showed that 38 percent of pastors had "seriously considered" leaving the ministry in the past year. That was a 9% increase from the 2020 survey (which at 29% was already high). Pastors have certainly been a part of the "Great Resignation."

Our church has weathered these past months better than many congregations. In person attendance is at this point far less than before the pandemic, but when Zoom is included, overall attendance is actually up. Members have been generous and we have done well financially; we have actually increased our mission giving, including assistance for those in need here in Ames. We have not had the division a lot of churches have experienced, and we have shown faith, flexibility, and grace toward one another as we have navigated some difficult days. God has blessed us even through some hard times. Nevertheless, it has not been easy.

All of this is backdrop to saying that after the last two years, I am looking forward to time away to recharge my batteries. Having turned 60, I am thinking of this sabbatical as a time to rest and get ready so that I can finish strong. To use a basketball metaphor (and why wouldn't I?), if my first sabbatical was after the first quarter and the second came at halftime, this will be the break before the 4th quarter.

My goals for this time are rest, reflection, and renewal. We will take a trip to the North Shore in Minnesota and I will attend the Music Conference at Green Lake. We will have a chance to visit family and I will do some genealogy work in Illinois. A good part of the time, I will be in town. I hope to do a little woodworking and some projects at home. I will do some reading and I am also looking forward to worship where I am not "in charge." There are things I hope to do, but more than a big to-do list, I am looking forward simply to time for rest and renewal.

The hope for a pastoral sabbatical is that it may be a renewing time both for the minister and for the church. To that end, the worship committee, deacons and others have been working to plan for the coming months. There will be some outstanding guest preachers, but for most of the Sundays church members will be leading in worship. The plans are exciting! We will be sharing some of these details soon.

But for the next month, I am still here! I am looking forward to the weeks ahead and to the celebration of Easter. But I did want to update you now on what is ahead. I ask for your prayers for me during the time of sabbatical, and I will be praying for all of you.

I am so grateful for this opportunity the church has offered. Thank you!



Last summer she worked remotely for Microsoft. Following graduation, Morgan will be moving to Seattle to work for Microsoft as a software engineer.





Jacelyn Rudderow is a native of Pedricktown, New Jersey. She will be graduating from ISU with a BS in Biological Systems Engineering. While at ISU, Jacelyn was a member and officer of Cardinal Swing Society, Cantamus Women's Choir and a member of ASABE. One of her favorite memories from ISU is singing at Carnegie Hall with all four ISU Choirs and the Symphony Orchestra.

Jacelyn has been very involved in the life of our church throughout her time at ISU. She has sung solos, served as a worship leader, and been a part of our choir when her schedule allowed. She will be moving to Austin, Minnesota in July to work for Hormel Foods as an Associate Quality and Process Control Supervisor. She hopes to become an involved community member in Austin by joining a church, the local curling club, and hopefully a local theater group. She would like to thank the members of FBC for supporting and embracing her throughout her four years in Ames and says "I will dearly miss you all!!"





COVID-19 UPDATE



Please note that we are welcoming but not requiring the wearing of masks. This policy fits the updated CDC guidelines. Also note that we will be having Easter Breakfast and that smaller groups in the church may have food at gatherings if they wish. (If the community COVID-19 level reaches the "high" level, this policy may change.)

We also ask you to be mindful of those who may be immunocompromised or otherwise vulnerable. The Singing Group and Boxing Group for those with Parkinson's Disease, for example, are requiring masks. If you are aware of others around you who are vulnerable, please help care for them by wearing a mask.



Forum on Baptist Response to the War in Ukraine

The American Baptist Churches of Los Angeles, the Southwest, and Hawaii (ABCOFLASH) hosted a forum on Ukraine on March 23 that is available on YouTube (click here to go to the recording). This session informs viewers about the history of the conflict between Ukraine and Russia and how Baptists in Europe and American Baptist Global Servants are ministering to refugees. There is information on how we may support the humanitarian response, and the session closes with prayers for Ukraine. Participants include:

- Van Tarpley, pastor of First Baptist Church of Bostonia, California, who teaches history at San Diego State University. Van has worked, studied, and researched in Lviv, Odesa, Moscow, and St. Petersburg and served as a missionary in former-Soviet Kyrgyzstan. He provides historical context for the current war and humanitarian catastrophe.
- Charles Jones, who serves with International Ministries as the area director for Europe, The Middle East, and Liberia. Jones gives an update on regional and national relief efforts related to the war in Ukraine.
- Nora and Pieter Kalkman, who serve with International Ministries with the European Baptist Federation. They will share about refugees coming to the Czech Republic where they live, and how Baptists in Europe are responding to the crisis.
- Amanda and Jon Good, who serve with International Ministries in Hungary. They, like many churches and individuals, are offering hospitality and hosting refugees in their home. They will share what God is doing through them to alleviate some of the sufferings of the refugees from Ukraine.

22 Fleece Blankets from FBC sent to Ukrainian Refugees

22 child and adult size fleece blankets from our church were recently added to make over 300 new quilts, blankets, and comforters gathered for Ukrainian refugees in two-and one-half weeks. That number does not include the used quilts, blankets, and comforters donated and delivered to the Orphan Grain Train location in Clemons, Iowa. By the end of March, eleven carloads filled with those items as well as new underwear, socks, t-shirts, bedding, towels, diapers, and personal hygiene items made their way to a shipping container bound for refugee settlements in Moldova, Poland, and Romania. How did that happen so quickly? Word spread rapidly among women in a variety of church and quilt related organizations. The power of this amazing generosity will make a huge difference in the lives of Ukrainians who lost their homes, family members, way of life, and who are now refugees in neighboring countries. Thank you FBC for you contribution!
