TRAVELLING THE CPR

Kim Zimmerman's Grade 5 class at Lord Kelvin Elementary have been exploring the big idea, 'Natural resources continue to shape the economy and identity of different regions in Canada,' this year in Social Studies. As a final project, students worked in small groups to research a specific resource, including the geographic region in which the resource is found, its importance to the Canadian economy and the extent to which the use of this resource is sustainable. With the support of their teacher-librarian, Larissa Kaminsky, students then designed 3D images of the various resources they studied using the online design program, Tinkercad, and printed out copies of the resources. Ms. Zimmerman's husband, an engineer of the CPR, then designed and built a model of Canada, complete with a miniature Canadian Pacific Railway (CPR), to display the resources and convey the importance of the CPR in connecting Canada's east and west coasts.

FRIDAY WAS SCIENCE DAY AT QMS!

Inspired by mentor and Science enthusiast, Darren Ng, early career teachers Samantha Dowdell, Astrid Hin Wong and Raymond Jang created an afternoon of experiments for their students.

Classes rotated through three experiments tied to science concepts explored this term.

In 'Ocean Potion,' Astrid and the students used cabbage juice as a universal indicator that allowed them to determine if items were acids or bases. They applied this understanding to the phenomenon of coral reef bleaching, as a result of climate change.

In 'Sublimation Station,' Raymond and the students used dry ice and dish soap to create bubbles. In this experiment, sublimation, the act of a substance changing quickly from a solid to gaseous state without first becoming liquid, is illustrated as the gas fills the soap bubbles.

Finally, in 'Electric Playdough,' Samanthan and the students learned how to create circuits using batteries, wires and homemade playdough. The students explored the conductivity of organic substances.









Students were undeniably excited and engaged throughout the three stations. Such a great way to spend a sunny Friday!



REMEDY FUNDS

A decision was made by the Executive Committee, during the EC Meeting held on June 18, 2020. The motions state:

• 2018/2019 Remedy Funds:

 "That 2018/19 unused remedy funds transferred to the NWTU by School District 40 shall be held in trust by the NWTU to be spent in a way to be decided in the future by the executive committee."

• 2019/2020 Remedy Funds:

 That 2019/20 unused remedy funds transferred to the NWTU by School District 40 shall be held in trust for individuals affected members to be used by December 17, 2021 at which time they will be transferred to the NWTU to be spent in a way to be decided in proportional representative ad hoc committee and they will report to the executive committee with their suggestions.

• 2020/2021 Remedy Funds:

 That 2020/21 unused remedy funds transferred to the NWTU by School District 40, as per the Local Letter of Understanding – Remedy 2020/2021, shall be held in trust for individual affected members to use for professional development, until June 30, 2022.

An update of of funds will be provided to individual affected members in the Fall, after the District has transferred teh 2020/2021 remedy funds to the NWTU's trust.
