MAYOR'S TREE
CHALLENGE: #iPLANT...

It's a simple and easy way to improve property values, beautify neighborhoods, cut cooling and heating costs and protect the environment: Plant a tree!

The City of Port St. Lucie on Jan. 23 was named a 2017 Tree City USA for the 13th year for its commitment to fostering the vital role that properly maintained trees play in keeping Port St. Lucie green and beautiful. Port St. Lucie's mayor is asking all residents and local businesses to take our designation as a Tree City USA and help it grow this year.

Mayor Greg Oravec has issued a challenge for the City to plant 185,000 trees in 2018 – that's one tree for every resident in the City.

Mayor Oravec explains why? "As we strive to realize our vision for our community, that Port St. Lucie is a safe, beautiful and prosperous city for all people—your hometown, it's important for us to remember that our success won't be the result of perfect solutions and flashy multimillion dollar projects. It will be the result of sound fundamentals and getting the little things right; of working

hard, working smart and working together; and of remembering that something as simple as a tree planting drive can make the world and our city a markedly better place.


There are thousands of reasons to love and plant trees. They give us clean air to breathe, moderate temperatures, cut cooling costs, provide habitat and food for wildlife, and so much more. Research has shown that the planting of trees is one of the most cost-effective investments we can make to improve the value of our homes, businesses and communities and that the mere presence of trees helps recuperating surgical patients recover faster.

In a time when we our so focused on saving our Rivers and the state and federal government are spending billions of dollars to fix Florida's stormwater system, I think it's important to point out that large shade trees can absorb 30% of rainfall through their leaves and another 30% through their roots, meaning that most of the rain that hits a large shade tree never runs off to pick up and then carry pollutants into our St. Lucie River or Indian River Lagoon.

Imagine that Port St. Lucie—we can create a safer, healthier, more beautiful, valuable, natural city, while saving money and our Rivers, all through the simple act of planting a tree. If you can imagine it, you can do it, and I hope you will answer the Tree Challenge by planting at least one tree for everyone in your household and mobilizing others to do the same. Together, we will make Port St. Lucie, and our world, a better place. "

WHEREAS, in 1872, J. Sterling Morton, who would later serve as the third United States Secretary of Agriculture, proposed to the Nebraska Board of Agriculture that a special day be set aside for the planting of trees; and

WHEREAS, this day, called "Arbor Day", was first set for April 10, 1872, and celebrated with the planting of more than one million trees in Nebraska; and

WHEREAS, Arbor Day is now observed throughout the nation and the world on different days according to planting schedules; and

WHEREAS, trees can reduce the erosion of our precious topsoil by wind and water, cut heating and cooling costs, moderate temperature, clean the air, produce life-giving oxygen, and provide habital for wildlife; and

WHEREAS, trees are a renewable resource giving us paper, wood for our homes, fuel for our fires and beauty in our communities; and

WHEREAS, studies show that trees can improve the value of property between 10 and 25 percent; and

WHEREAS, trees can absorb the first 30 percent of most rainfall events through their leaf system and can retain another 30 percent through their root system, keeping stormwater out of our St. Lucia River: and

WHEREAS, trees, wherever they are planted, are a source of joy and spiritual renewal.

NOW, THEREFORE, I, Gregory J. Oravec, Meyor of the City of Port St. Lucie, Florida, do hereby proclaim that January 19, 2018, be observed as:

Arbor Day

in Port St. Lucie, Florida, and ask our citizens to commemorate the day by plenting a new tree.

in witness whereof, I have hereunto set my hand and caused the Official Soat of the City of Port St. Lucie, Floride, to be affixed, this nineteenth day of January in the year of our Lord, Two Thousand Eighteen.

What to Plant

Annuals/Bedding plants: Plant heat-tolerant annuals, such as coleus, vinca, and portulaca. **See** *Annuals*: http://edis.ifas.ufl.edu/topic annual landscape plants

Bulbs: Cannas thrive in the heat of summer. New varieties have colorful leaves as well as flowers. **See** *Bulbs* for *Florida*: http://edis.ifas.ufl.edu/topic bulbous flowers

Herbs: Some to start now include basil, coriander, cumin, and mint. **See** *Herbs*: http://edis.ifas.ufl.edu/topic herbs

Vegetables: Beans, Chinese cabbage, Southern peas, and sweet potatoes can still be planted. Mulch beds well and monitor irrigation if the weather is dry. **See** *Vegetable Gardening in Florida*: http://edis.ifas.ufl.edu/topic_vegetable_gardening

What to Do

Pests: Monitor insect activity and learn which bugs damage plants and which do not. **See** *Landscape Pest Management*: http://edis.ifas.ufl.edu/topic landscape pests



THE HISTORY OF EARTH DAY

Each year, Earth Day—April 22—marks the anniversary of the birth of the modern environmental movement in 1970.

The height of counterculture in the United States, 1970 brought the death of Jimi Hendrix, the last Beatles album, and Simon & Garfunkel's "Bridge Over Troubled Water." War raged in Vietnam and students nationwide overwhelmingly opposed it.

At the time, Americans were slurping leaded gas through massive V8 sedans. Industry belched out smoke and sludge with little fear of legal consequences or bad press. Air pollution was commonly accepted as the smell of prosperity. "Environment" was a word that appeared more often in spelling bees than on the evening news.

Although mainstream America largely remained oblivious to environmental concerns, the stage had been set for change by the publication of Rachel Carson's New York Times bestseller Silent Spring in 1962. The book represented a watershed moment, selling more than 500,000 copies in 24 countries, and beginning to raise public awareness and concern for living organisms, the environment and links between pollution and public health.

Earth Day 1970 gave voice to that emerging consciousness, channeling the energy of the anti-war protest movement and putting environmental concerns on the front page.

The Idea

The idea for a national day to focus on the environment came to Earth Day founder Gaylord Nelson, then a U.S. Senator from Wisconsin, after witnessing the ravages of the 1969 massive oil spill in Santa Barbara, California. Inspired by the student anti-war movement, he realized that if he could infuse that energy with an emerging public consciousness about air and water pollution, it would force environmental protection onto the national political agenda. Senator Nelson announced the idea for a "national teach-in on the environment" to the national media; persuaded Pete McCloskey, a conservation-minded Republican Congressman, to serve as his co-chair; and recruited Denis Hayes from Harvard as national coordinator. Hayes built a national staff of 85 to promote events across the land. April 22, falling between Spring Break and Final Exams, was selected as the date.

On April 22,1970, 20 million Americans took to the streets, parks, and auditoriums to demonstrate for a healthy, sustainable environment in massive coast-to-coast rallies. Thousands of colleges and universities organized protests against the deterioration of the environment. Groups that had been fighting against oil spills, polluting factories and power plants, raw sewage, toxic dumps, pesticides, freeways, the loss of wilderness, and the extinction of wildlife suddenly realized they shared common values.

Earth Day 1970 achieved a rare political alignment, enlisting support from Republicans and Democrats, rich and poor, city slickers and farmers, tycoons and labor leaders. By the end of that year, the first Earth Day had led to the creation of the United States Environmental Protection Agency and the

passage of the Clean Air, Clean Water, and Endangered Species Acts. "It was a gamble," Gaylord recalled, "but it worked."

As 1990 approached, a group of environmental leaders asked Denis Hayes to organize another big campaign. This time, Earth Day went global, mobilizing 200 million people in 141 countries and lifting environmental issues onto the world stage. Earth Day 1990 gave a huge boost to recycling efforts worldwide and helped pave the way for the 1992 United Nations Earth Summit in Rio de Janeiro. It also prompted President Bill Clinton to award Senator Nelson the Presidential Medal of Freedom (1995)—the highest honor given to civilians in the United States—for his role as Earth Day founder.

Earth Day Today

As the millennium approached, Hayes agreed to spearhead another campaign, this time focused on global warming and a push for clean energy. With 5,000 environmental groups in a record 184 countries reaching out to hundreds of millions of people, Earth Day 2000 combined the big-picture feistiness of the first Earth Day with the international grassroots activism of Earth Day 1990. Earth Day 2000 used the power of the Internet to organize activists, but also featured a drum chain that traveled from village to village in Gabon, Africa. Hundreds of thousands of people gathered on the National Mall in Washington, DC for a First Amendment Rally. Earth Day 2000 sent world leaders the loud and clear message that citizens around the world wanted quick and decisive action on global warming and clean energy.

Much like 1970, Earth Day 2010 came at a time of great challenge for the environmental community. Climate change deniers, well-funded oil lobbyists, reticent politicians, a disinterested public, and a divided environmental community all contributed to the narrative—cynicism versus activism. Despite these challenges, Earth Day prevailed and Earth Day Network reestablished Earth Day as a relevant, powerful focal point. Earth Day Network brought 250,000 people to the National Mall for a Climate Rally, launched the world's largest environmental service project—A Billion Acts of Green®—introduced a global tree planting initiative that has since grown into The Canopy Project, and engaged 22,000 partners in 192 countries in observing Earth Day.

Earth Day had reached into its current status as the largest secular observance in the world, celebrated by more than a billion people every year, and a day of action that changes human behavior and provokes policy changes.

Today, the fight for a clean environment continues with increasing urgency, as the ravages of climate change become more manifest every day. We invite you to be a part of Earth Day and help write many more chapters—struggles and victories—into the Earth Day book.




