

"Celebrating National Migration Week"

This **January** $6^{th} - 12^{th}$, 2019, the Catholic Church in the United States celebrates National Migration Week, which is "an opportunity for the Church to reflect on the circumstances confronting migrants, including immigrants, refugees, children, and victims and survivors of human trafficking". This year's theme is "Building Communities of Welcome" emphasizing "our responsibility as Catholics to engage and welcome newcomers on their arrival, and help to ease their transition into a new life here in the Unites States." – United States Conference of Catholic Bishops, Migration and Refugee Services.

Nicholas Higgins, a member of the Missioners of Christ, a Catholic lay community, who recently transitioned back to the U.S. after a two-year mission in Honduras, Latin America, shares about his experience:

Dear Parishioners,

During the last two months of my time in Honduras as a full-time missionary, I stayed in an apartment in downtown Comayagua. As I looked out my apartment window one evening, I saw a caravan of Hondurans walking by. There were families carrying suitcases, plastic bags, and whatever else they could manage; men and women, young and old. I asked the young adult Honduran missionaries (with whom I worked) what they thought of the situation. They did not support it, but they understood why people made the decision to leave. Essentially, the people in the caravans are very poor people torn between two bad options:

• leave their beleaguered homes and take the risk of a deadly journey where loved ones may be separated, violated and robbed, or even killed,

-or-

• remain in the dangerous environment of unemployment, homelessness, food shortages, gang violence, and ongoing government corruption.

I have met many of the type of people in these caravans. On our missions, we have the blessing of going into the homes of the poorest of the poor in the cities and the mountains, getting to know them over a cup of coffee, beans, and tortillas. The Honduran people have an unimaginable generosity, always welcoming others and offering whatever they have. Although gang violence is a reality, the majority of Hondurans are a humble, passive people. Also, unlike their neighboring Latin American countries, Honduras has never had a civil war.

Yet, there is much governmental corruption. The government pays actors to report the news. While I was there last November the "president" changed the law in order to extend his presidency. During the elections, after his opponent was winning, several votes were "mysteriously" lost and he was declared to be the winner of the election. For a few weeks Honduran citizens protested to no avail.

The majority of the people in these caravans are simply poor people fleeing from poverty and violence to seek a better life. They are people who deserve to be treated with the same dignity as everyone else. The Missioners of Christ aim to help young Hondurans find a better life *within* Honduras and become the leaders of their country in order to make a positive change. I have seen our mission succeed time and time again. For instance, one of the Honduran missionary girls from our very poor neighborhood served with us for two years as a missionary. Then, through our scholarship program, she studied physical therapy at a local university. This year, she graduated and is now working as a full-time physical therapist in our free clinic. However, our mission cannot reach everyone; including the thousands who have joined the caravans. The laborers are few and the harvest abundant (cf. Matthew 9:38). Please join me in praying to the Master of the Harvest to send more laborers. May we all have a spirit of Christ-like openness to all who suffer and migrate to other countries seeking a better life. May we see how Christ is present in them. May we offer a generous ear and truly take the time to listen to their stories. God bless you!
