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The President's Message - March 2019

DENNY RETIRED! THANK YOU!

Retire! Monday, February 25^{th} marked the first day of the last week of work (after $26\frac{1}{2}$ years of service) for Dennis Johnson here at the North Wisconsin District.

It was my turn to lead the weekly staff devotions and I had heard that the word **retire** is not in the Bible. So I did a word search and found out that some versions do have retire – Numbers 8:25 (NIV) "but at the age of fifty, they (Levites) must retire from their regular service and work no longer." God's Word translation says – "they must retire from active service." I also looked for retire in THE MESSAGE (merely contemporary English) and sure enough it was in Numbers 8:25 and also the story of the rich fool in Luke 12. "Self, you've done well! You've got it made and can now **retire**." Many of us know what happened in the next verse – "God said to him, 'Fool! This night your soul is required of you'" (ESV). Brian Betts Named 2019 LEA Distinguished Lutheran Elementary Administrator



From Sawyers to Servants



Hurricane season comes and goes each year and for most of us (who don't live near the coast) the closest we get to the devastation is what we see on the national evening news. However, even then, we only get a mere glimpse of the damage and the lives that have been affected. Not being satisfied with remaining at a distance, 10 students from Peace Lutheran Campus gave up 8 days of their semester break and departed in early January for the disaster zone of Panama City and Mexico Beach, Florida. These cities were ruined by the 3rd largest Hurricane (Michael) to hit the United States back on October 10th.

While helping the residents of the Panhandle of Florida, the students of Peace worked closely with the members of Trinity Lutheran

Church and staff of Shepherd's Heart Ministries, which specializes in tree removal and clean up through their chainsaw ministry. After receiving disaster response training, a certified chainsaw safety class and field exercises, the students soon became sawyers in their own right and used their newly learned skills in service to others.

Once the work week began and the students were able to survey the extent of the damage, the reality was hard to take in. The tree damage was so widespread that estimates for the cleanup will be years and it will be decades before mature trees once again fill the horizon. This, however, did not deter these novice sawyers from cleaning up one tree at a time. The days were long and tiring but the impact that these students had ironically wasn't with their chainsaws but rather with their hearts as they showed the people of Florida the grace and mercy of Jesus. In turn the residents, many of whom had been long overwhelmed with the struggles of the disaster including, cleanup, dealing with insurance companies, and simply trying to get back to a sense of normalcy were filled with hope once again.

Although the sound of chainsaws, skid-steers, and logging trucks filled the worksites each day, it was as if they were all muted as the homeowners paused to simply say, "thank you" and storm stories were shared. Those two simple words made these college students, turned lumberjacks, realize just how important and how easy it is to show the love of Christ to those in great need and by the end of the week these sawyers indeed From left to right became servants of our Servant, Jesus.

CONFLICT IN THE RANKS

It could not have come at a more inopportune time. In the midst of the pre-Passion, emotional drama, we find Jesus disciples at their worst.

Jesus has just disclosed that one of the disciples would soon betray Him (Luke 22:21-22). If this dark mark were not enough we find this scene next in this Gospel—

"A dispute also arose among them [the disciples], as to which of them was to be regarded as the greatest." (vs.24).

One can only begin to imagine what new emotions this mini-drama would have generated. As if Jesus didn't have enough on his plate already He now needed to deal with His disciple's arrogant self-centeredness.

Jesus was quick to address this pride agenda. In contrast to Gentile rulers this was His expectation for His followers—

""Rather, let the greatest among you become as the youngest, and the leader as one who serves. ...I am among you as one who serves."" (vss.26b &27b)

In Christ's kingdom, humility is a high quality. Jesus is the ultimate Model of humble greatness, as Paul would later emphasize (Philippians 2:5-11).

Christ's directive is timeless with application to today's pastors and other church leaders. There is also relevance in this regard—the Lord had conflict in the ranks as well, as is all-too-frequent in churches today. Some human dynamics do not change.

The apostle James gives clarity to the source of such conflict—

"What causes quarrels and what causes fights among you? Is it not this, that your passions are at war within you?" (4:1)

Pastors and other church leaders need to pay heed to Christ's Model and message. The "greatest" is always Christ. In His church there is ample room for second place. What a difference it would make if all leaders lived by the motto—"I am second."

"Raising Young Leaders and the Lutheran Young Adult Corps"

When I was in sixth grade, the Director of Christian Education at my church asked me to be one of several teen representatives on the Youth Board. It



might sound silly to ask an eleven-year-old to sit through the business agenda of monthly meetings, but I took on the responsibility with genuine passion. This one person saw me, challenged me, equipped me and ultimately moved me towards pursuing professional church work. Raising up young leaders can be a powerful thing.

In 2017, LCMS Youth Ministry did a research project on millennial retention in the LCMS. We found that congregations with a decision-making leader under 32 showed several markers of increased LCMS retention from confirmation to young adulthood. It didn't matter how many young adults were in the congregation; the impact was the same. Raising up young leaders helps children and teens stay in the church.

Rural and small-town ministries are uniquely designed to mentor new young leaders. These congregations tend to be close-knit where young people are known deeply. This can give special insight into where a young leader can best use their skills, passions and abilities and prevent ill-fitting or token leadership roles. These congregations can provide a critical safe space for young leaders to try and fail with grace.

Smaller congregations can be more open to empowering young leaders, sometimes out of necessity. When they do, leaders of all ages must work together for the sake of the Gospel. While established leaders have experience, knowledge of systems and a critical understanding of history, young leaders bring a fresh perspective and new strategies. Young leaders can learn and grow in new skills while established leaders can be reenergized and help manage change.

One example of raising up young leaders is Lutheran Young Adult Corps. Lutheran Young Adult Corps provides full-time service opportunities for LCMS young adults in urban settings. Participants grow in community and share their faith in Jesus through acts of service for 10 weeks in the summer or 10 months as a gap year. During their service, our 18- to 26-year-old participants serve in roles such as volunteer coordinators, after school tutors, communications and administrative help.

The power of young leaders should not be underestimated. Consistently the young leaders in Lutheran Young Adult Corps prove to be self-motivated, passionate, adventurous, independent, and have a desire to grow in the areas of faith formation, service and community outreach. This is true of the young people in your congregation as well. Engaging young leaders helps ministry, keeps young people connected to the church and provides a chance for all ages to live out their vocation.
