"Queerly U: LGBT Life at UMass"

In 1985, Mikhail Gorbachev assumed leadership of the Soviet Union, compact discs were introduced in the United States, a relatively unknown corporation named Microsoft launched Windows 1, and Madonna undertook her first national concert tour. It was also the year that the Stonewall Center opened at the University of Massachusetts, Amherst.

At the time, the Stonewall Center, then known as the Program for Gay, Lesbian, and Bisexual Concerns, was just the third campus LGBT center in the country and the first in New England. Begun and led for twenty years by Felice Yeskel, Stonewall helped establish the model for providing support services to LGBT students and educating campus communities about the lives of LGBT people. Today, the center conducts LGBT ally trainings throughout the region and offers a Speakers Bureau of individuals who discuss their experiences being LGBT and or an ally with area colleges, high schools, and community groups. The center also sponsors speakers, performers, films, and social events that are free and open to the public. With this Fall marking its 25th anniversary, Stonewall will be holding weekly events to consider the experiences of LGBT people over the last two and a half decades in conjunction with other LGBT and LGBT-supportive campus groups. Among these organizations are UPride (the LGBT faculty and staff group), the UMass Pride Alliance (the LGBT student group), the Everywoman's Center, the Office of Jewish Affairs, and the Women of Color Leadership Network.

In addition to its groundbreaking LGBT center, UMass was also a pioneer in providing LGBT support services by establishing the 2 in 20 Floor, the nation's first LGBT and ally living-learning program, in 1992. Taking its name from the often repeated statistic that 1 in 10 people is lesbian, gay, or bisexual, the residence hall floor provides a safe, supportive

community for individuals who are in the process of coming out and helps educate other residence hall students about the lives of LGBT people through sponsoring "Guess the Straight Person" panels. "It is a space where they can learn about LGBTQ history and culture, become LGBTQ activists, and live among other people who live and love as they do," explains Eboni Rafus, an Assistant Resident Director at UMass and the coordinator of the floor.

Given its long history of advocacy for LGBT students, it is fitting that UMass possesses a growing LGBT archives. Central to its holdings is the Barbara Gittings-Kay Lahusen Gay Book Collection—nearly 1,000 books donated by two of the country's early gay rights activists. The UMass Library is also the repository for the records of Mass Equality, the Freedom to Marry Coalition, and the Valley Women's History Collaborative.

Today, UMass is a national leader in providing support to transgender students by prohibiting discrimination based on gender identity/expression, offering gender-neutral housing, creating genderneutral bathrooms, and enabling students to use a preferred name on records and documents.

For its efforts to assist LGBT students, UMass is ranked as one of the top 20 LGBT-supportive schools in the United States by The Advocate College Guide and is one of the highest rated colleges in the LGBT-Friendly Campus Climate Index (http://www. campusclimateindex.org). "UMass is a great place to be queer," states Jenna Leigh Cripps, an out lesbian student and a Stonewall Center staff member. "There are always things to do and people to do them with.

Out of Northampton, MA, Monoho pronounced "muh-NO-ho" with an emphasis on the second syllable, keeps the gay male community updated and connected with the latest happenings. And, a tight knit it is!

From its website, http://www.monoho.com/index.html, you can find out more about the site itself and all it has to offer. Monoho members communicate through the Yahoo! Group, while this site provides an easy-to-browse guide to the area. According to the group's website, the Yahoo Group acts like a big gay bulletin board. Whenever a gay man posts a message to the Yahoo Group, the post goes to over 400+ members.

Although many of the Monoho events are centered in Northampton, the written welcome in its website is for ALL GAY MEN in western Mass, upper CT, lower VT, and even upstate NY or NH. And, best of all, you can get Monoho on your iPhone!

Might you Noho know that ...?

· Northampton is also located in the heart of a lively college community that includes Smith College, the University of Massachusetts, Amherst College, Hampshire College, and Mount Holyoke College.

· 19th century Northampton drew visitors like Timothy Dwight, the Marquis de Lafayette, Henry James, Ralph Waldo Emerson and Jenny Lind who proclaimed it to be the "paradise of America." Indeed, artists like Thomas Cole thought the environs of Northampton to be the epitome of the "picturesque" - the ideal middle landscape between the sordid city and wild nature. Northampton possesses two fine 19th century residential neighborhoods, Pomeroy Terrace (1850-1885) and Elm Street (1860-1920), where Gothic Revival, Italianate, Second Empire, Queen Anne and Colonial Revival Styles contribute to the City's diverse architectural heritage.

· Northampton is also home to a vibrant music scene. This is the result of music venues such as

the Calvin Theater, Pines Theater, Pearl Street, Iron Horse Music Hall, The Elevens, and The Academy of Music. Musicians and bands that refer to the Northampton area as "home" include Sonic Youth, Mobius Band, The Alchemystics, The Primate Fiasco, Erin McKeown, The Thungs, The Amity Front, The Nields, The Young@Heart Chorus, Ella Longpre, The Trials and Tribulations, Cordelia's Dad, Thrillpillow, Rusty Belle, The Novels, Los Hijos Unicos, Spanish for Hitchhiking, The Skeptics, Fountains of Wayne, Roger Salloom and the Winterpills. · The Northampton Independent Film Festival (NIFF, http://www.niff.org/) is held each fall. Founded as the Northampton Film Festival in 1995 by Howard Polonsky and Dee DeGeiso, it has continued to grow under a variety of directors. It is one of the largest in New England.

· Northampton also has also been the center for films such as Academy-Award-winning The Cider House Rules, Malice with Nicole Kidman and Alec Baldwin, In Dreams with Annette Bening and Robert Downey Jr., and Sylvia with Gwyneth Paltrow. The Stephen Walker movie Young @ Heart was filmed in Northhampton. (wikipedia.com)

The NoHo Pride parade and rally is on May 1st this year, a date observed by earth-honoring traditions as Beltane and May Day. This is a time to celebrate the feminine and masculine energies in nature that unite to create new life and fuel its growth. It is an auspicious day for hailing the "Rites of Spring."

For the LGBTQ community, May Day and the "Rites of Spring" is a perfect backdrop to our own united energies as they fuel the growth of pride and freedom. The demand for human rights equality has always been the centerpiece of PRIDE events so we honor this season of renewal by tending the garden of our eclectic humanity. We gather to birth new life into a collaborative vision of freedom, peace, and social justice—to celebrate, together, these "Rights of Spring!"

This wisdom from The Talmud speaks a profound truth about every living thing. 
In the garden of humanity, there is no such thing as a "weed".





Noho's very own Rainbow Times: Inside and out, a Q&A you don't want to miss!

Over 1,172 days, or three years and 5 months ago The Rainbow Times was born out of two lesbian's sense of community in a place that seemed as a utopia to them. A place they would soon start to regard as home—Northampton, Massachusetts—was these entrepreneurs choice to start a well-known business, the biweekly LGBT newspaper The Rainbow Times.

The wife-and-wife team, who have been together almost eight years and got married at the footsteps of City Hall in downtown Northampton, decided to invest their own funds to create the idea behind The Rainbow Times that we, the readers, are very familiar with today.

I sat down with these two talented, beautiful and enigmatic women this April to ask them questions that no one dare to ask them before and to make them think about why they have become icons to us, many of Northampton's TRT readers and community members. They are visible and by the amount of issues that The Rainbow Times has published, these two women are extremely busy to even have some fun at times. Gricel M. Ocasio and

Nicole C. Lashomb talked to me for several hours. I wanted to break the mystery behind these two proud lesbians. Although outspoken and extroverted, the women share a unique bond and each possesses a strength that brings uniqueness to their team. From the interview, I was able to put together the most memorable moments of it, in what is the only one-on-one in-depth Q&A with the Publisher and Editor-in-Chief of The Rainbow Times.

Q: How did you come up with the idea of starting an LGBT publication, especially after many others failed previously with other newsletters and bulletins?

Gricel M. Ocasio: We visited the area often and although we picked up literature from here and there, we did not see anything concrete about the LGBT community.

Somehow it seemed as

although together, it lacked cohesion.

Nicole Lashomb: When I looked for information about the members of the LGBT community I realized that we had never seen so many lesbians, gays, trans and bi people in such a small town and yet,

we did not know how to connect with them. We didn't even know about the Pride March & Rally the first two years that we lived in MA.

Q: Ok, so why did you move to Massachusetts, did you have a particular reason?

GO: We moved to Massachusetts seeking to attain the same civil rights that every other American person has. We lived in the south for a short period of time before deciding to go where our rights would take us. We would not settle for less. Our rights are crucial to us, so much that we moved to Massachusetts; and we proudly got married in Northampton too.

NL: I was not going to live anywhere else because the right to call Gricel my wife was deeply important to me. In Northampton, we were never seen as friends, or biological family, we were a couple from the moment we visited any establishment in the area. That is what is magical about Northampton to the LGBT community and other repressed communities.

Q: From the time that I have personally known you, you seem to keep your personal lives very private. Why is that?

NL: We enjoy having one-on-one alone time with each other. Because we go to events, and are in meetings or managing our team, etc. we tend to value our time together more.

GO: Believe it or not, I'm a very private person (smiles).

Q: What had you heard previously about Northampton?

NL: We had heard that it was the "Lesbian Capital of the World" and wondered what that meant.

GO: I had heard almost the same lines that it was referred to by many as "Lesbianville USA." Upon getting acquainted with Northampton, however, we realized it was more than that. To me it is an

LGBT Mecca where lesbians are more prominent than men, but where gay, trans and bi men—and women—have a voice, place and a history in this town too. It happens to be different to Boston, California or NY in the sense that those areas have a more prominent gay male population, and as well have other prevalent pockets of the LB&T community too. Northampton happens to be more lesbian, but it is very much composed of members of all of our communities—LGBT and our straight allies.

Q: How did The Rainbow Times start?

NL: The Rainbow Times grew out of the need to have a unified LGBTQ media presence first in western Massachusetts. Shortly after, we received requests from other regions to have the paper sent or be delivered to them. That is how we grew almost immediately.

Q: What other products came out of the creation of The Rainbow Times?

GO: There is an online presence via our website, which launched in November, 2006. In addition, there is our biweekly e-blast The Pony Express.

Q: How many people work for you? How many people advertise with you?

GO. We have free-lance reporters and writers throughout the mainland and contractors that deliver the paper to all of our distribution points. We have such great people working from us and our team is composed of LGBT and straight allies. **NL:** We have many companies that target and advertise to the community in the quad state region that The Rainbow Times goes to (all of Massachusetts, Rhode Island, north central Connecticut and southern Vermont).

Q: Why NightTimez? Many people have said it goes against your mission?

GO: NightTimez was an idea that grew with us when we hired our Sales Manager, Mr. William Berggren. He is very much in touch with the night life in the gay community and, as such, NightTimez was born in September, 2009. It was a segment of the community that TRT had never tapped into, but that was very much alive, like it is for other seaments of our society. They are really two stand-alone publications now, since

Mr. Berggren bought NightTimez.

NL: NightTimez was created for a different audi-

NL: Night Timez was created for a different audience. TRT has always remained true to its mission, however. Now both publications will remain branded for a while, but ownership, mission and vision are completely separate from each other.

Q: There are rumors that you were allegedly threatened by some residents because of the LGBT publication and that your property was vandalized? Are those rumors true? Were you shocked that this was happening to you in this "utopia?"

NL: Yes, we were astonished to have found discrimination of this type in Northampton. In the same manner, however, we have found more openness, acceptance, support and friendliness in Northampton than in any other place that we have lived in.

GO: Yes, they happened, but they were very much isolated incidents. The Northampton Police Department was pivotal in making us feel safe from the moment those incidents took place. Not everyone will agree with your life, but we can all learn from each other's experiences. We continue to hope that TRT is an educational tool that breaks some of those barriers that still exists, even in "utopia."

Q: What do you do for the communities that you serve? Do you give back to them?

NL: We certainly do! We sponsor events in all of the areas that we cover, we inform our readers of important LGBT news and services in the communities we serve and we try to united them in our struggles.

GO: We also promote non-profit events through our Calendar of Event's website page and donate services to be used for Auctions, etc. We always want to give back, because our community deserves it.

Q: Do you feel everyone, especially business owners, are welcoming and supportive of queer people in Northampton?

NL: In my experience, most companies and organizations are open to work with the LGBT community, some more than others, of course. And, we as a community know our supporters, of course.

GO: We have received comments that are positive and others that are not so positive. I think that the LGBT community and allies give so much to Northampton in so many ways and Northampton does the same for us. We do not live in Paradise, even when we may think we do. All in all, I think that Northampton is a very special place in America and I think that every LGBTQ American should experience what it really means to be out and proud LGBTQ in Northampton. It is a one-of-a-kind experience. I would not change it for the world.

Planning already afoot for second annual New England **Trans United Pride March**

land Trans United (NETU) Pride March and Rally are making plans for the 2010 march and rally, which will take place in Northampton, Massachusetts, this fall.

Once again the Rally will assemble at 11:00 a.m. at Lampron Park. Marchers will step off at noon and proceed down Main Street for a rally at 1:00 p.m. at the Armory Street parking lot.

"Last year's event in Northampton drew around 600 people who Marched for Transgender civil rights while braving the rain that fell that day," said Christa Hilfers, (NETU) Director.

"We need to educate the public about our lives and experiences as transgender people."

This year, there is a continuing need to rally for critical gender-rights bills making their way through state legislatures such as H1728/S1687 "An Act Relative To Gender-Based Discrimination and Hate Crimes" bill, along with "Issues including transgender health care, medical insurance, removing gender identity disorder as a psychiatric diagnosis, bullying in schools, and discrimination in the workplace" to name a few.

The organizers of the New England Trans United (NETU) Pride March and Rally (www.newenglandtransunited2010.org) invite community organizations to march for transgender civil rights with us this fall in Northampton, Massachusetts.

"We welcome not only transgender and LGBI (lesbian, gay, bisexual, and intersex) individuals and

age schools, businesses, labor unions, religious and civic organizations, and all who support the equal rights of transgender people," said Hilfers. "Last year, the March and Rally drew over 600 people. We're hoping to double or triple that number this year."

One-of-a-kind children in one-of-a-kind-families **LGBTQ** foster parents share stories of the unique families they have created

Gary Gosselin and Matt Heyer, an East Longmeadow couple that has been together for seven years and married for four, always knew they wanted to have children—their only disagreement was about how many to have. Now, they have been foster parents for three years. They have three children: Alivia, a four-year-old daughter they fostered before adopting her, and a sibling pair they've fostered for nearly a year.

"Being gay did not play any part in our decision to foster and adopt—aside from the realization that as gay men, we weren't going to be making babies on our own," Gosselin says. "We were still exploring our options when Alivia first came into our lives. We had talked about private adoption, and were considering surrogacy. To be honest, we hadn't given much thought to fostering."

Their journey into foster care started in an unusual way.

"A friend of a friend knew of Alivia and her biological parents," Gosselin explains. "Social Services was in the process of removing Alivia from their care when we first learned of her. After meeting with the biological parents and learning of their interest

in having Alivia be adopted, we jumped at the

Becoming "child-specific" foster parents is a different process from what most people go through to become foster parents, according to Gosselin. He and his partner have now experienced both routes to foster parenting.

"After many ups and downs with trying to adopt Alivia, when it was all coming together, we decided that fostering, and adopting through the department of children and families was a wonderful way to grow our family and help children in need," Gosselin says. "The process of becoming foster parents was not as difficult as we thought it was going to

be. Sure, there were a lot of forms to fill out, and a lot of people wanted to come over to inspect our house, but overall it was not that difficult."

Many people in their DCF foster care class were concerned about the

home-study—including Gosselin and his partner.

"But there was really nothing to be worried about," Gosseling explains. "Again, there are a lot of questions, but nothing scary. They are basically just trying to write the story of your life, the life of you and your spouse together, and the story you want to write as a foster parent/parent."

In addition to support from DCF and other foster parents in the Fostering Our Future network, Gos-

selin says he and Heyer have had support from family and employers. Heyer's employer has allowed him to switch to part-time schedule in order spend more time at home with their young children.

Parenting has its challenges, Gosselin admits. Yet those challenges come with great rewards.

"Watching a child grow, and strive, and be healthy and happy is a wonderfully rewarding experience," Gosselin says. "You really know that you are making a difference, regardless if they get to be with us forever. And you are giving them a stable, loving and secure environment that is so important to a child."

Ultimately, Gosselin and Heyer hope to adopt the two children they are currently fostering, but even if that doesn't happen, they know they have made a difference.

"When our foster daughter first came to our home, she was terrified of new people," Gosselin says."It was quite clear that at 15 months she had seen and experienced more in her little life than

> anyone at any age should. But over time, with love, and affection, and providing a secure stable home, she has

thrived. She is a chatty, outgoing, happy little girl, and I feel that we can take some credit for that. Even if she isn't with us forever, we know that we had a hand in her development."

Maura and Tasha Geary, who recently moved to Easthampton, echo Gosselin's sentiments when they talk about a heart-rending year during in which one of their foster children was returned to his birth parents.

We knew that even if we never got him back, we had had a permanent effect on him," Maura Geary says. She describes a baby who "never really woke up" transformed into a healthy, happy baby who was always laughing.

Although it was difficult, they knew that a child's reunification with his or her birth family can be the best option.

"If possible and safe, we definitely feel that the best place for kids is with their birth parents," Tasha


In their child's case, the reunification lasted for a year. When the child entered foster care again, he was returned to their home. They are working with the birth family, now, to set up an open adoption. The hope is that the child can stay with the Gearys but remain in contact with his birth parents.

The Geary's have three other children in their home. The oldest, José, had been in a group home for boys in the foster care system.

Tasha Geary had worked with José at the group home and was convinced he would thrive in a stable family home. She also knew that few families were open to older children, and at 12 he was unlikely to find a family. She and Maura had recently begun the process of training as foster parents with the hope of adopting an infant.

"I just felt: how could we go through the whole process but not be open to him?" Maura Geary says.



The Gearys experience with José drove home the truth that children are much more complex than they seem on paper. José's file was full of negative comments, but said nothing about his strengths.

"When you look at a kid on paper, it's only the negative stuff. If there's an incident, that gets written down but if he has a great day, that doesn't," says Maura Geary.

The other two children also arrived through the foster care system. The youngest is fifteen months old and has been with them for virtually all of her life. Bea, a bright eight year old, has been with Maura the longest. Maura and her expartner, Mary Martone, adopted Bea as an infant when they lived in Washington state. Today, the Gearys and Martone all live in Easthampton and share custody in an arrangement like an extended family.

Siobhan Hinckley has two foster children in addition to her two biological children—and she's passionate about the subject of LGBTQ foster parenting.

She is especially concerned about the dire need for safe homes for LGBTQ teens in the foster care system, but worries about how few families are open to teens of any kind.

Maura Geary is concerned about this, as well, and knows how close José came to never having a stable family life. She also notes that there is a huge shortage of families for newborns.

Both women feel strongly that many of these children could find homes in LGBTQ families. Hinckley believes many LGBTQ people are interested in fostering children, but may have reservations about pursuing it.

"Sometimes I think it is a matter of people knowing that they are not only invited, but they are welcome," Hinckley says. "We can make a difference. We have a responsibility to our communities."

Fostering Our Future is a group of foster parents and allies that aims to support foster parents in their unique role in creating peace for foster children. The group will have sessions on fostering children on April 11th, at 2 p.m. at the office of Lange Chiropractic (300 Pleasant St.) in Northampton. Lesbians in and around Northampton are as diverse as the community at large. In the 1970's and early 1980's, dykes from Smith, Mount Holyoke and other area colleges stayed here after graduation. There have been several lesbian immigration waves over the last 30 years.

The original Lesbian and Gay Pride marches here

were 90 percent lesbian, 10 percent gay men, and virtually no heterosexual allies.Today is a different story. Youth are out, and heterosexual marchers are parents, children, friends, and colleagues of LGBT com-

munity members.

Six years ago, a few lesbian couples contacted me about officiating at their weddings. At that time, I was simply serving our community in the moment. Many lesbians in our region continued to honor their partnerships without the convention of marriage. Many surprised themselves as they opted to go for it. Many more could not wait five more minutes.

> In 2004, I would not have imagined that

many lesbian couples would call me in ensuing years to get married in time for the birth of a child so both names could be on the birth certificate. Twenty years ago, I would have thought this was science fiction!

I would not have imagined that several lesbian couples I have worked with would include one transgendered (male-to-female) partner. And, I did not know that there were so many lesbians trapped in gay male bodies (you know

who you are).

We are integrated into our communities at large, we are single by choice, we are couples with furry children, we are moms who hang out with parents of all stripes, we are doctors, attorneys, chefs, fire

fighters, professors, teachers, social workers, police officers, business owners, carpenters, elected officials, and clergy.

When I see close to 800 of us at once at those films, I am amazed that there are so many lesbians I have recognized for 25 or more years and also

how many lesbians are new faces and who may not feel "new" at all if they have been here for a few

This idea of lesbian community is fluid and subjective for each of us. Some women miss the days when there were fewer lesbians and we gathered more regularly. Others move here and expect to find some central lesbian place. I sometimes explain to them that we are everywhere, and that the search is not the thing. It is both invisible and incredibly visible.

We can just live. We can be. We have the privilege and responsibility to create our own circles of intimate friends, acquaintances, and communities.

We share in the ownership of what we have created. It is not a panacea for universal suffering, and yet living in or around Northampton is easier in many ways than living elsewhere. We still experience financial struggles, heartbreaks, health issues, and misunderstandings.


I cannot imagine how lesbians experience life's difficulties and do it without support, without acknowledgment, with fear of revealing one's authentic self, and with constant duplicity.

Utopia—no such thing. Northampton—wonderful place. It will continue to be this as we give it energy, accept our diverse needs and evolve.
