FROM COMFORT ZONE TO THE UNKNOWN

(Gen. 12:1-4a; Ps. 33:4-5, 18-22; 2Tim. 1:8-10; Matt. 17:1-9)

Brothers and sisters, during this season of Lent, in the Holy Name of our Lord Jesus Christ, I exhort you to "Bear your share of hardship for the gospel with the strength that comes from God."

As a young girl, Maggie had everything she wanted. Life was comfortable at home. She could go and come, as she pleased. Her parents lovingly provided for most of the things she wanted in life. They helped her secure a scholarship and an admission into one of the best colleges in the country. Unfortunately, the college situated out of State, requiring Maggie to leave home and reside on the college campus. It was never going to be an easy transition. It was difficult for her to get out of her comfort zone to the unknown. She spent many days trying to convince her parents why she should not leave home. She cried and became very depressed. Her parents encouraged her and assured her that everything would be just fine. She should give it a try, and if after a few weeks she did not like her new environment she could come back home. She was afraid to take the challenge!

In today's first reading, the Lord called Abram to leave behind his comfort zone and to "Go forth from the land of your kinsfolk and from your father's house to a land that I will show you...I will bless you...make your name great..." Abram did not hesitate; he went as the Lord had commanded him. In the same vein, during this season of Lent, the Lord calls you and me to leave behind our comfort zones of sinfulness and pride. We are to take a long and painful walk with Him to a new and unknown land of peace, joy and happiness. God is requesting you and me to leave our sinful ways behind and turn back to Him. He is asking us to leave behind any vices that may prevent us from serving Him faithfully. You and I must be detached from those habits and actions that conflict with our Christian values. Whenever we do this, like Abram, we shall experience the power of God's love and forgiveness.

It is often very difficult and challenging to leave behind our land of laziness - our household of sin - our comfort zone to go to an unknown land. Like Maggie, we hate to venture out of our comfort zones. As the old proverb goes, "Bad habits die hard." On the contrary, like Abram, you and I should trust in God's promises. In today's second reading, St. Paul exhorts you and me to "Bear your share of hardship for the gospel with the strength that comes from God" who is calling you to take the leap of faith into an unknown land. Surely, it is difficult for you and I to kick the old habit of sinfulness, but that is the challenge and the hardship Saint Paul wants us to "bear for the sake of the gospel" which you and I profess. Most often when God challenges us to change our ways, we are stricken with awe and uncertainty. Sometimes we become overwhelmed by the demands He makes of us. As a result, we fear to abandon our old ways and kick the bad habits that we have depended upon for so long. In moment like this, Jesus exhorts you to "Rise, and do not be afraid." Do not be afraid because Jesus is there with you as you struggle with temptations during these forty days of Fast.

As Christ was transfigured on the mountain, during this season of Lent God invites you and me to make a trip to the mountain of His love (the Sacraments), to be transformed by the presence of His light and thus experience His mercy. Let us ask God to transform us and to enable us to see "no one else but Jesus alone" in times of temptations and trials.





THE ANNUNCIATION OF THE LORD MARCH 25 (SOLEMNITY)

The feast of the Annunciation goes back to the fourth or fifth century. Its central focus is the Incarnation: God has become one of us. From all eternity God had decided that the Second Person of the Blessed Trinity should become human. Now, as Luke 1:26-38 tells us, the decision is being realized. The God-Man embraces all humanity, indeed all creation, to bring it to God in one great act of love. Because human beings have rejected God, Jesus will accept a life of suffering and an agonizing death: "No one has greater love than this, to lay down one's life for one's friends" (John 15:13).

Mary had an important role to play in God's plan. From all eternity God destined her to be the mother of Jesus and closely related to Him in the creation and redemption of the world. We could say that God's decrees of creation and redemption are joined in the decree of Incarnation. As Mary is God's instrument in the Incarnation, she has a role to play with Jesus in creation and redemption. It is a God-given role. It is God's grace from beginning to end. Mary becomes the eminent figure she is only by God's grace. She is the empty space where God could act. Everything she is she owes to the Trinity.

She is the virgin-mother who fulfills Isaiah 7:14 in a way that Isaiah could not have imagined. She is united with her Son in carrying out the will of God (Psalm 40:8-9; Hebrews 10:7-9; Luke 1:38).

Together with Jesus, the privileged and graced Mary is the link between heaven and earth. She is the human being who best, after Jesus, exemplifies the possibilities of human existence. She received into her lowliness the infinite love of God. She shows how an ordinary human being can reflect God in the ordinary circumstances of life. She exemplifies what the Church and every member of the Church are meant to become. She is the ultimate product of the creative and redemptive power of God. She manifests what the Incarnation is meant to accomplish for all of us.

COMMENT: Sometime spiritual writers are accused of putting Mary on a pedestal and thereby discouraging ordinary humans from imitating her. Perhaps such an observation is misguided. God did put Mary on a pedestal and has put all human beings on a pedestal. We have scarcely begun to realize the magnificence of divine grace, the wonder of God's freely given love. The marvel of Mary - even in the midst of her very ordinary life - is God's shout to us to wake up to the marvelous creatures that we all are by divine design.
