## POLICE CHIEF INVESTIGATION CONTINUES

In a hearing Friday night last, Dorval City Council, sitting in committee, heard evidence by both W.W. Owen, of the Canadian Underwriters' Association, and suspended Dorval Police and Fire Chief A.R. Noel in connection with charges laid against Mr. Noel stemming from the purchase of fire equipment for the City of Dorval.

Mr. Noel was accompanied to the hearing by his legal counsel, Jacques Decary.

The investigation was not completed and will be continued at a special committee meeting called for Wednesday, Sept. 14.

His Worship Mayor R. John Pratt presided, and all councillors with the Ald. Sarto Desnoyers attended the lengthy hearing.

## Local Resident Wins Archery Championship

The Provincial Women's Championship in Archery has been won by Mrs. R.W. Weldon, Dorval. At the Provincial Championship Shoot at Sorel on September 10 and 11th, Mrs. Weldon topped all other women contestants by nearly 300 points, winning in both the closed and open competitions.

Mrs. Weldon came back from the shoot with four trophies and a medal, the cups including the Provincial Open Trophy, Provincial Closed Trophy, and City of Sorel Trophy. A part of the meet and presentation of trophies was seen on Channel 7 T.V. last Monday evening.

This is why the area in the emergency ward must be five times greater than it now is.

## Registration Opens For Y.M.C.A. Swim Class

Registration for boys and girls swimming instruction and gymnasium classes may now be made at the Lachine-Dorval YMCA. A series of 10 lessons for boys and girls who wish to participate in the swimming instructional program will be offered every Saturday afternoon at the Westmount YMCA pool starting Saturday, September 24th. The girls swimming instruction will be held from 2:00 to 3:00 p.m., while the boys will take their lessons from 3:00 to 4:00 p.m. Chartered bus transportation is provided for all youngsters who participate in the swimming program. Competent instruction is provided.

The following Saturday, October 1st will see the start of the YMCA gymnasium programs for boys and girls 8 to 12 in the Dorval area. Girls living in the North Strathmore-Pine Beach area will be able to participate in the gym class which will meet at Surrey Gardens School from 9:30 to 10:30 a.m. Boys living in this area will have their gym class at the same school from 10:30 to 11:45 a.m. A new 'Y' gym program will be introduced at the Dorval Gardens School where boys will have an opportunity to enjoy a gym program every Saturday morning from 9:30 to 11:30. Qualified physical education instructors will be in charge of all gym-centred programs. Registration for these classes may be made by calling the 'Y' at Melrose 7-2511 or by attending the classes on opening day, which is Saturday, October 1st.

## Adult Education Demonstration

The Lakeshore has been chosen for the only Demonstration in the Province of Quebec of discussion methods and materials used in adult education study groups. There is a nation-wide campaign during September under the local sponsorship of the Extension Department, McGill University.

The Demonstration Committee emphasizes that formal educational requirements are not necessary in order to join a discussion group. Only prerequisites are an enquiring mind, a desire to increase learning and a willingness to participate in group discussion.

One of the purposes of the De-

monstration is to acquaint people with the two approaches as well as with the materials and topics which are available. There are such tantalizing subjects as "Ways of Mankind", "Discovering Modern Poetry", "Great Religions of the World", to mention but a few. Records, films and readings are available to groups. Great Books has the books for each year's theme bound and packaged compactly and attractively in a portable library.

There are two advantages to this kind of liberal adult education. First, while the courses have been prepared by experts, the group requires no expert among its members—only a leader who is chosen from the group. Secondly, the ex-

## PET SHOW

## SCHOOL OPENING

The 1960 return to school has brought its problems. Children flocking to the schools are overflowing the available classroom spaces. Grade one pupils from St. Louis Marie School will be accommodated in the Recreation Centre, Dorval Gardens. School parents protested against half days for grade one classes when the plan was proposed to alleviate crowded classrooms. Courtland Park starts out the school year with three grade one classes, an indication of things to come. Surrey Gardens School so far has been able to accommodate the steady upward trend. St. Veronica's school is coping with an enrollment of over 500 pupils. At Joubert School the enrollment is nearly 400, 4 times what it was 10 years ago. Looking back ten years it is hard to imagine that ten years ago Dorval had only St. Joseph's School and Joubert School for French speaking students and the small wooden school house on Dorval Avenue for English Protestant students. Some fine schools have been built in ten years. St. Louis Marie, Dorval Gardens, St. Veronica's, Courtland Park, Surrey Gardens. And one wonders what lies ahead with the growing city of Dorval filling them to overflowing as the 1960 term begins.

## Dorval Chamber of Commerce Sends Anti-Pollution Telegram To Quebec

The Dorval Chamber of Commerce this week sent a telegram to the Premier of Quebec, The Hon. Jean Lesage, deploring the pollution of the waters in Lake St. Louis and urging him to sponsor legislation for compulsory sewage treatment in the Province. The telegram was signed by over one hundred and fifty (150) Dorval residents.

Alan Capel, President of the Dorval Chamber, pointed out that this was but a token representation of the thousands of Dorval and other Lakeshore residents who were disgusted with the polluted waters of one of Canada's potentially most inviting water playgrounds. "Many others have expressed their feelings in letters to newspaper editors and to municipal, provincial and federal legislators" he remarked, and

he urged all who had not yet made their feelings known to do so in this manner.

Roy Amaron, Co-Chairman of the Chamber's Anti-Pollution Committee, discussed the committee's plans to send a cavalcade to Quebec to discuss the problem with Mr. Lesage and his cabinet personally at an early date. "We know that there is a tremendous weight of public opinion against continued pollution of our waters" he stated; "If only people would express their views to those in government office, something concrete would inevitably result."

The Dorval Chamber recommends monthly meetings shortly, after Summer vacation, and water pollution is high on its agenda.

"Gentlemen:

Further to my letters of August 17th 1959 and May 11, 1960, I would again request that immediate action be taken to cover in the open sewer which leads from the airport past the eastern boundary of my property. I have reported that this is a hazard to our small children especially during the spring, flood, a breeding bed from mosquitoes and which gives off offensive and unsanitary odours.

You will remember that this situation has been investigated by you, the Mayor and your engineer, all of whom have assured me that it was necessary to correct this condition. I had a letter from you this spring assuring me that steps were being taken and asking that I be patient.

We have lived with this stinking mess all summer and I would again ask you to take immediate action particularly so that it will not be open during the spring flood and carrying six to eight feet of water.

## John Pratt says



It has been the custom to speak of the federal, provincial and municipal governments of this country as three "levels" of government.

While this may be perfectly true in describing the comparative seniority of these governments, it should be clearly understood by the public that there are not three separate autonomous divisions of government power. Constitutionally, the government of Canada is divided into only two completely separate parts, federal and provincial.

I bring this matter up because many people apparently believe that municipalities can act independently and separately to the provinces in which they exist. This is definitely not so! The municipalities are merely creatures of the province, and everything they do must be approved by the province. The municipality is merely a branch, similar to the branch of a bank, and is absolutely responsible to headquarters for its actions and, similarly, the headquarters is responsible for the actions of its branches.

A proper understanding of this situation may help to clarify the confused thinking of some members of the public in considering where the responsibility for water pollution rests. It is obviously a joint responsibility of the offending municipality and the offending province which permits it, and, naturally, the primary or basic responsibility rests with the province itself which has complete control of the municipality.

I have noticed, over the years, that while the general public seldom hesitates to criticize its federal and municipal representatives, there has been a strange lack of such criticism, in any quantity, in the case of provincial representatives. From the amount of correspondence which I receive on all sorts of subjects, I sometimes wonder if the citizens realize that they also have a provincial member of parliament in this area. No one ever seems to direct an enquiry on local matters to him, and this, frankly, puzzles me.

I am sure that the local provincial member of parliament, the Honourable Dr. C.A. Kirkland, must be aware of the tremendous amount of controversial discussion which is continually taking place in the local newspapers concerning matters of interest to the residents

of this County, and I am sure I would help to clarify much of this discussion if Dr. Kirkland would come forward with some frank statements and information on his policies on these matters. For several years I have held forth at great length and I am sure that everyone is aware of my stand on all local questions, and I personally would most certainly enjoy hearing Dr. Kirkland's views on our many pressing and urgent problems.

Let me emphasize, at once, that I do not want this misunderstanding as a cheap political challenge to a man who does not happen to belong to my own particular party. I intend this only as a sincere, friendly invitation to a colleague in the provincial field to work with me as a team-mate in solving the many problems that beset this area. This County now has the advantage of two members who are both supporters of the particular governments in power and this should make it easier for us to obtain results if we work together.

Our local Radio Station CFOX is rendering a public service in making the people aware, each week, of what the federal member and the many mayors in this district are doing, and I think this would be a wonderful opportunity for the provincial member to join us in informing the public each week over the air and through the local newspapers of the plans he and his government have for this locality.

Let's forget the past and concentrate on the many problems that face us in the future. Dr. Kirkland is a member of the new government that has taken over at Quebec, and therefore is in a position to help clear up some of the difficulties in which we find ourselves today. I hope he will not mind my making this suggestion through the public press, but, in view of the present disturbed state of public opinion on many matters in this area, I thought it best to express my opinion

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# The Future Of Tennis In Dorval

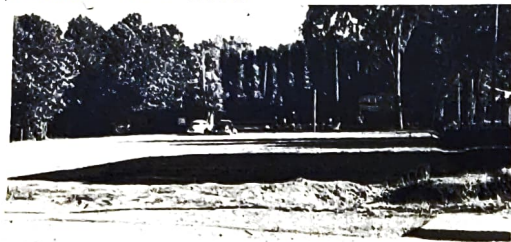
The Dorval Tennis Club, for years hidden behind a screen of

trees at the end of Brunet Avenue, has recently opened up its property to Dawson as work progresses on two new courts. The club now has ninety junior members and eighty-five senior members. The exceptionally well constructed, fast drying courts with deep cinder base, clay and grey stone-dust surfaces, are two of the best on the lakeshore. A series of competitions are held for the Ballantyne Trophy, donated by the late Hon. C.C. Ballantyne, for Ladies Singles; the J.W. McConnell trophy for men's singles; and the mixed-doubles trophy donated by Mr. Tom Williamson. There is keen lakeshore competition, also an encouraging factor in the tennis picture. The Dorval ladies have held League championships for two years and are presently leading in the Lakeshore League. The men were runners up in the finals this year and last year.

Now known as The Dorval Tennis Club, the club had its beginning in 1925 as part of the Dorval Country Club incorporated which comprised Tennis, Cribbage, and Lawn Bowling. The present club house stands on the old bowling green, once a favourite sport for Country Club members. 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# AUTHORS and ARTISTS

## 'A NICE NIGHT FOR MURDER'

That's what my uncle used to say when the rain was pouring and the wind was howling, as the night, in the wake of Donna. Now it may be a good night to commit a murder, when no one is about to check up on your evil deed, but it certainly is a good time of year to settle down by the fire, or in bed with a good detective story. I have recently had the pleasure of meeting M. Maigret of the Paris police force. He is the literary creation of Simenon, whose matter-of-fact, moral-less tales of crime and sudden death have long pleased the connoisseur of the unusually macabre. Meticulously accurate, unimpassioned as a camera Simenon tells a story completely without the addition of an or a moral judgement. This adds up to some very intense experience for the reader, and once one has acquired a taste for Simenon's reporting, one wants to go on reading book after book, and there are quite a number of them.

"HAYOG BY ACCIDENT", which contains a magnificent story set in Africa, is one of his best, but if it is pure murder you seek, which is not simple read "MAIGRET SETS IT OUT" published by Penguin. The first story in the book, "The Lock at Charenton" is a mysterious tale in which the character of one gross, dominating figure permeates every corner from beginning to end. If you want suspense with a difference do read Simenon!

Strongly reminiscent of G.K. Chesterton's "Father Brown" stories is a new book, by Leonard Holton, called "A PACT WITH SATAN", published by Dodd, Mead & Company, priced at \$3.50. Father Bredder, though humorous, saintly and astute lacks the warmth and charm of Father Brown. An odd kind of murder, this with no motive save sheer diabolism, but it is refreshing to go back to pre-fraudulent days when pure senselessness was called by its proper name and the criminal could not hide behind the cloak of an unhappy childhood. This is a fast moving tale, which though one guesses the ending near the beginning, one is held by the chess-like puzzle of how the pieces fit together. This is a fair to middling murder mystery.

In speaking of murder, I cannot resist commending to you William

Rowhead, A Scottish gentleman who has written a number of books in which famous real-life murders, both agent and victim, are literally expounded in all their glory, medical detail, evidence at the trial rehearsed, and the whole tale retold with a wealth of innuendo and supposition calculated to make one's flesh creep. "THE SLAMMY SIDE" which deals, amongst others with those ghastly fiends messers Burke and Hare, makes very good reading for an evening such as this.

### THE BAD SEED OPENS M.R.T.'S FALL SEASON.

And if you are not by now sipped full with horrors, don't miss Maxwell Anderson's chilling play on hereditary vicious environment. Directed by Rochester Denny, it starts its run at the Playhouse on Gloucester Street, September 20.

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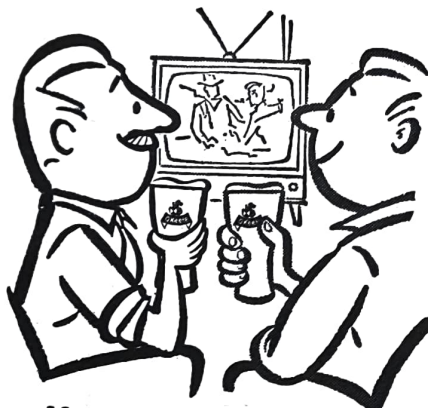
