

God's Encouraging Word ... when I am burdened with guilt

What she had done in the past weighed heavily on her conscience. She was living under the soul-crushing conviction that the death of her nine-year-old daughter was God paying her back for her sins.

He was resigned to live the rest of his life in despair. His wife had begged him to get help for his alcoholism through their entire marriage. Now suddenly, she was gone and so was any opportunity to make up for being a lousy husband and father. It was too late.

His head hung low as he dissolved into tears. When he looked up, he asked, "What kind of person would steal from his own family?" He knew the answer. That was why he was sobbing.

How does your guilt feel? Does it hit you like a wrecking ball when you are confronted with the horrifying truth of how evil you really are or how much damage and pain you've caused? Does it leave you hopeless or even horrified at the truth you have to face sooner or later? The truth that you're never going to be the person you know you should be. The truth that makes you a failure to a holy God and undeserving of anything good from him.

You should know something about all those people mentioned above. They all found relief from guilt. They found it in the only place it can be found—in the God who pledges, "I, even I, am he who blots out your transgressions, for my own sake, and remembers your sins no more."

You might think your sins and weaknesses define you. They don't. Not in God's eyes. You know how you highlight a phrase and then hit "delete" when you are editing a document? God does that with your sins. He not only doesn't see them anymore, he doesn't even remember them. He doesn't recall the worst things you've done or your habitual failings. So your sins not only don't define you to God, they don't condemn you to his punishment either.

How is that possible? God loved you with a love so amazing that he charged his Son, Jesus, with your sins and punished him in your place. All of the ways you have sinned or ever will sin, have been paid for. They are not on your record or clinging to your identity anymore.

Believe it, and in Jesus live unburdened from your guilt and in the joyful freedom of forgiveness.

Hosts

As Christians, and especially as greeters, we are representing Christ.

Colossians 3:17 says, "¹⁷ And whatever you do, whether in word or deed, do it all in the name of (representative of) the Lord Jesus." As Christians, and especially as greeters, we are representing Christ.

We're reminded in **2 Corinthians 5:20** that "We are Christ's ambassadors." What is an ambassador? The dictionary definition is: "A diplomatic official of the highest rank, appointed and accredited as a representative." Wow! We are representative officials of the highest rank! That's what being a greeter is all about—representing Jesus Christ in that first important connection.

Hebrews 13:2 ²Do not forget to show hospitality to strangers, for by so doing some people have shown hospitality to angels without knowing it.

If we agree that making people feel loved, appreciated, and important is a primary objective as a greeter, the next question would be, how do we go about doing that? • a warm handshake• a smile • to listen • talk in terms of their interests • **remember their names** • maintain eye contact I WAS A STRANGER AND YOU WELCOMED ME. MATTHEW 25:35

When we become a Christian, we are no longer a guest in this world. We become partners with God in hosting life for others. And what do hosts do?

- They welcome people into their lives.
- Their first concern is that their guests feel acceptance and love.

A good host is not a position or a task. It is a self-image ... a mindset ... a lifestyle; especially in God's house.

This is what greeting is really all about. It is a ministry for every Christian.

No one joins a church without first visiting.

Let's not call them "visitors." A *visitor* is defined as "a person who resides temporarily; one who goes or comes to inspect; one who makes a short stay at a place for a particular purpose." Rather, refer to your newcomers as "guests." And remember that they chose to visit us—in effect, they have invited us to take our best shot at hosting. A *guest* is defined as "a person welcomed into one's house; a person to whom hospitality is extended; a person held in honor who is due special courtesies."

Who Greets Your Guests?

Instead of just greeting (which is nice), let's start thinking in a bit different way. Let's think of ourselves as: "**Hosts.**"

The term is defined as "ones who receive or entertain socially; ones who open their homes for a special event; ones who take particular care and concern that guests are well accommodated."

What Do Hosts Do?

The most important question most guests are asking during their first visit is, "Is this a friendly church?" And the primary way they determine the answer is through the number of people who *initiate* a conversation with them. Friendly, but NOT over-friendly. Introduce yourself and ask a couple of sincere questions...and introduce them to someone else.

After the Service Hosts

The most common reason newcomers return to a church is, "the friendliness of the people." Interviews with visitors indicate there is a ten-minute window in their visit when newcomers are most (or least) impressed with the church's "friendliness." That moment is the ten minutes immediately following the conclusion of the service. During this relatively brief moment, more than any other, newcomers are assessing whether the people at this church are genuinely friendly, or if it is just an act. Up until the service concludes it is easy for newcomers to follow the "rules" and get lost in the crowd. But once the final prayer is said, all rules are off. If people in the church seem friendly and caring in this after-service moment, research tells us that it makes a significant impression on newcomers—particularly if they have come alone.

These are people who look for newcomers and engage them in conversation right after the service. Other churches station **after-service hosts near the pastor as he is shaking hands** with worshipers on the way out. When the pastor encounters a newcomer, the after-service hosts are introduced to the newcomers and take over from there.

<u>A HOME Mission Project:</u> Hmong Evangelist Training God has opened many doors into the Hmong community. As the Lord gathers people in Christ, he is raising up leaders who want to be equipped to serve as evangelists and perhaps to continue in studies to become pastors. Your gifts will support the ongoing expense for study materials, instructors, and assistance to the students.

<u>A WORLD Mission Project:</u> Apache Christian Training School – ACTS provides theological courses to train and equip White Mountain and San Carlos Apache Tribes for ministry. In addition to in-class work, hands-on experience gets the men and women into the congregations to practice and model ministry. The goal is Apaches serving Apaches in this life, so more attain the goal of eternal life. The program trains Apaches to be pastors, evangelists, deacons and deaconesses, and certified Apache Lutheran teachers. The time commitment is significant. Many ACTS students struggle to make ends meet while attending evening classes in various locations. In addition, most students have families and often have menial jobs. Funding for the program itself remains a challenge. While the ACTS director is currently funded by WELS, the operational costs of the seminary and ministry school are funded only by gifts and donations. Camp Phillip's new cabin

Current need

1. More lodging: Our summer camper numbers are increasing; in 2015 we had 140 more campers than two years ago. Since we did not have enough lodging, we had to turn away some summer campers and at times we had to have junior/SALT staff sleep in houses of year-round staff, family cabins and Conestoga wagons. Our maximum lodging in summer camp cabins is 135; this summer we had as many as 109 campers and 60 junior/SALT staff at the same time.

2. More handicap facilities: Our Jesus Cares summer camper numbers are increasing; in 2015 we had over 50 Jesus Cares campers (with a 1:1 camper/counselor ratio). We need lodging and bathroom facilities that better accommodate handicapped individuals, not just for Jesus Cares campers but year-round guests as well.

3. More meeting space: When we host two or more retreat groups at a time, we do not have enough meeting areas. Our only large group meeting area at the present time is our Dining Hall. The past few years we have lost out on booking several large retreat groups who would have come if we had more areas for large group meetings and breakout sessions.

Solution--New cabin

1. More lodging: Each floor of this proposed two floor cabin has been designed to have two sleeping rooms with one meeting room between them. Each sleeping room will have bunk beds to accommodate 12 people.

2. More handicap facilities: Each sleeping room will have its own handicap accessible bathroom. This cabin will be built into a hill so each floor will have access from the outside.

3. More meeting space: When the cabin is constructed, the upper level will not be finished with the sleeping rooms; instead it will be kept open so that we have a large meeting area, with the option to add the two sleeping rooms at a later time when additional cabins are built.
