ewish humor is replete with jokes about arguing, food, skirting religious obligations, and the foibles of social climbing, and while am no scholar on the subject I can't think of a single joke where the punchline is "it's hopeless". I'm reminded of a joke I heard on an old tape my mother gave me called "You Don't Have To Be Jewish". The man is bemoaning "he's dead", to which the Yiddishe momma says "give him cheeken soup" (I wish I knew how to write with a

Yiddish accent, but you get the idea). "But he's dead" "give him cheeken soup" "but he's dead, it won't help" "nu, could it hurt?"

Tisha B'Av is a day of mourning to remember the destruction of two temples and, through the Kinos

(lamentations), to commemorate the many tragedies that have

befallen the Jewish people in the past 2000 years, including the Holocaust. This is why, along with the restrictions familiar to us from Yom Kippur we also sit on the floor or a low stool until midday and refrain from greeting acquaintances.

It naturally comes as a surprise, then, that in the biblical Book of Lamentations **Tisha B'Av** is also referred to as a moed, a holiday or sacred meeting with God, and this holiday status is reflected in some of our practices in synagogue. What aspect of a day of such tragedy could possibly be a holiday?

Rav Sholom Noach Berezovsky, in his seminal work of compassionate Chasidic thought titled Nesivos Sholom, says that when a Jew cries

over a loss or destruction it is always accompanied by hope for the future. We do not mourn past events to emphasize our sense of loss, but rather to bring out from within us tears of faith and hope. We believe at the very core of our being that history, national and personal, is moving towards redemption and that the tragedy of the moment will undoubtedly lead to a brilliant future.

Tisha B'Av, a day set aside to remember every tragedy in our long and painful exiles, is also

> a day which inevitably rekindles our hope for a future reconciliation with God and our national redemption. It is thus correctly called moed, a day of sacred meeting with God as each Jew reaffirms our collective national trait hopefulness.

Respectfully Yours... Hopefulness: A Jewish Trait We live not only with an

> awareness of the past but a responsibility to the present. Our struggles and the struggles of the State of Israel, the ongoing scourge of anti-Semitism, the tragedy of terrorism, the threat of assimilation--a lesser people might give up hope. We are not that lesser people, we are the Jewish people. No other nation in history has survived repeated displacement, persecution and tragedy as we have. No one could have foreseen that thousands of years after the destruction of our Temples, Judaism would be thriving the way it does today. We survive because we have hope and we have faith in a better future, not only for us but for all of the world. We are Jews, we always have hope and we will always survive.



THE CANTOR'S CLOUD by Cantor Menachem Bazian The End of the Game

Much has been written about the last month of

y mind has been occupied with three endings. As I write this article, I am also preparing for a Siyum this Shabbos as our 7:45a.m. learning group will celebrate completing a Tractate of Talmud after over two years of study. In addition, with the end of Tisha B'Av just 24 hours ago, the High Holiday season is now beginning for me (as a Cantor, I begin preparations for the High Holidays immediately after Tisha B'Av). In seven short weeks from tonight, we will be together, ushering out the year 5776 and welcoming in 5777. Both of those are significant in and of themselves, and carry with them very different emotional constructs.

The efforts involved in preparing, learning, discussing, and coming to understand an entire Tractate of Talmud are not small. Add to this the dedication of the group in consistently showing up to the Shule one hour early on a Shabbos morning, and you really have something to celebrate.

A Siyum, therefore, is a major event. It is known as a Seudas Mitzvah, a meal that it is a Mitzvah to partake in. It is so important, in fact, that during the 9 day period from the first day of Av until Tisha B'Av when it is normally forbidden to eat meat, that it supersedes these restrictions. Not even a wedding can do that, as weddings are generally prohibited during this time. Such is the importance, and the joy, of a Siyum.

The pending arrival of a New Year is another matter entirely. Unlike many other people, we do not believe that the New Year is a time for revelry but rather for judgment. As the current year comes to an end, we must be keenly aware that our actions will be brought before Hashem, He will judge our successes and failures, and render a verdict that will govern what our next year will be like.

the year, the month we call Elul, in which this **Scroll** will appear. In Jewish learning, Elul is always characterized as a time when the day of judgment looms and, as the month progresses, the fear of the upcoming judgment grows. It has been said that in the Shtetls of Europe, the tension and fear could almost be palpable. Who can withstand G-d's judgment?

So, today, as I write this article, I am faced with two very different sets of emotions. I am keenly aware of impending judgment, yet the joy of the Siyum awaits. Is there a bridge to connect the two? Can there be one?

Just recently, I was given that bridge. A bridge that crosses from the fear of judgment to an honest acceptance, and perhaps even celebration, of the end. It is the third ending I have had on my mind and, to be honest, most dominant of all. You see, I am about to lose a friend. Her name is Bambi.

I wrote about her once before. In the May, 2015 issue of **The Scroll** entitled "Roller Coasters," I told how she married on Erev Pesach. In that article I wrote of my adopted sister - for she is that to me and Chana - in her joy. Today, I am thinking of her in hospice.

Bambi is my link. Let me tell you why. When I found out that she was losing her battle with cancer, I called her immediately. Our conversation lasted about 10 minutes, and I have no shame in admitting that I could barely speak for choking back tears. When we hung up, I sat at my desk sobbing and praying that no one would walk by and see my anguish. I have, since that call, called her several times a week. Our conversations are of similar length, and in them I have learned something truly wonderful. You see, not once have I heard her complain.

Even when my call caught her in terrible pain, all she said was that she was having a difficult time and could we speak later. I have not heard one negative word from her. What I have heard from her is equanimity, calm, and even laughter. As she put it, she has made her peace with her situation.

As Bambi nears the end of her life, a life that has been marked by uncounted acts of kindness not only to my family but to an entire community, she has chosen to accept Hashem's judgment and meet it head on. She is ending her Tractate, the Tractate called life, and she has decided to end it with her own Siyum.

Judgment is supposed to be scary. Who goes before a judge and does not feel a knot in their stomach? I cannot believe that Bambi does not feel that knot at all, but she has chosen her faith above all and is prepared to meet Hashem with a smile (and, knowing her, a joke, a laugh and a call for a Scotch L'Chaim).

I think our Siyum is the perfect way to enter into our time of judgment. We celebrate a process that we hope we did properly. We have faith that we learned Hashem's Torah as He would want us to, and we wish to celebrate that. After that, we have a Mitzvah that we can take into our time of judgment, and that gives us strength to carry us through the season. Yes, we must

prepare for that judgment, but maybe we can do so with a smile too.

Our Siyum this weekend is dedicated to Bambi Fass.

THE ALEPH BETS OF HEBREW by Bill Bradin

ebrew is not such a difficult egg to crack. Each month, I plan to try and define Hebrew words and expressions that we commonly use in our daily vernacular.

This month, let's look at the word **ACHDUT**. In "Ashkenazit", the pronunciation of the word is **ACHDUS**. No matter how it is pronounced, it means the same thing: UNITY. **Achdut** is a very powerful word. The *shoresh* (root) of the word is (**aleph – chet – daled**) and simply means one. The infinitive of *echad* is *li-a-ched* and means to unite.

The concept of unity among our Jewish people is a very central theme. When we come together as one, we can accomplish anything that we want.

AM ECHAD, LEV ECHAD!
One Nation, One Heart!

The word **ACHDUT** is connected to all of the events; both good and bad that have taken place during the course of our Jewish history.

During times when we act as one (*echad*) people, miracles happen. An example is the miracle of the establishment of our State of Israel. All Jews came together (**ACHDUT**) in this

common cause. We were rewarded by acquiring our own independent state in our Jewish Homeland.

During the previous year, I do not have to tell you that Congregation Shaarey Israel was without a Rabbi. The entire congregation pulled together as *echad*. We were triumphant and remained very strong during this period because we were united and because of the **ACHDUT** between all of us.

Conversely, when we are fragmented, we have seen tragedy befall our people. There is no better example than the destruction of our 2nd Holy Temple in 70 CE. We lost our Temple because of *sinat chinam* (baseless hatred) among the Jews. Tisha B'Av (commemorated in August) is when we mourn the destruction of our 1st and 2nd Holy Temples along with so many other catastrophes that our Jewish nation has endured.

The word **ACHDUT** is the only word that goes against everything that we have learned during the course of our lives. We have always been taught that 1 + 1 = 2.

Regarding **ACHDUT**, we all know that $1+1+1+1 \dots + 1=1$

THE MIRACLE OF SHABBAT KORACH Bill Bradin

hings happen in life that have an impact upon all of us. There are events that we all remember so vividly and will never forget. Everyone remembers where they were and what they were doing when JFK was assassinated on November 22, 1963, or when the planes crashed into the Twin Towers on September 11, 2001.

There are many other events in our lives that affect us and do not have the caliber of the above mentioned events and are of a lesser scale, however, they will also be remembered in a very meaningful way.

That is the case with Friday night, July 8 and Shabbat, July 9, 2016. A miracle took place in our wonderful Congregation Shaarey Israel that I will not forget nor will many of the other Congregants present on that weekend.

For those who are not familiar with the story, let me share a bit of background. Rabbi Weinbach started with our shul on June 1st. One of the conditions to his coming on board at that date, was predicated on that he and Yocheved had a pre-planned vacation from July 5th to July 15th. No problem, that was fine with all.

In addition, Cantor Bazian, had requested a vacation during the first two weeks of July. The vacation was approved prior to Rabbi Weinbach being chosen as our new spiritual leader. The Cantor and Chana made their necessary arrangements to go on vacation in July as well.

We found ourselves with an overlapping Shabbat which turned out to be Shabbat Korach that fell on July 9th. Al Bernstein and I had the task of finding a Torah reader for that Shabbat. Numerous telephone calls were made only to find ourselves back to square one. Many people were away, and no one was available. As Shabbat Korach was approaching, the pressure was mounting. Many different possible solutions were explored; only to come to the conclusion that those solutions were not viable.

In the past, when situations like these arise Jules Stern and Marsel

Amona step up and work in tandem to guarantee that we enjoy a Torah reading. Jules was on a cruise, and Marsel was in Israel. That was not going to work either.

On Thursday, just two days before, Morty Julius was approached to read the Torah with the trope from the Chumash. He graciously agreed to do so. Jack Perel was asked if he could follow along with the yad (pointer) as Morty read. Jack did not hesitate and agreed immediately. We had a new tag team in place. Al and I were happy that we had a solution for the Congregation and the Torah reading, even though it was not the ideal solution.

Come Friday evening, we came together for our regular Kabbalat Shabbat Service at 6:30pm. That evening only eight male Congregants showed up. We were short two. What were we going to do? As we were preparing to daven, in walks a very observant Jewish family from Canada that happened to be staying at the Crowne Plaza for Shabbat. Under other circumstances, many would see that we have mixed seating, turn around, and walk out. That was not the case this time. The guests were a father, mother, and their son who was already a Bar Mitzvah. They stayed for the service, prayed with us. At the end of the Ma'ariv Service, the father approached me and thanked me for allowing him to do a Mitzvah and complete our Minyan. I was taken aback because this was such an unexpected, however, beautiful reaction. Shabbat was off to a wonderful start.

The following morning, I was somewhat apprehensive (to say the least) regarding the morning's Torah reading. As the time was approaching, Jordan Dubbs reminded me that he was scheduled to leyn the Cohen Aliya that Shabbat. I welcomed it with open arms. Jordan did a tremendous job (as he always does). Now, we only had to make it through seven more Aliyot.

Earlier that morning, I was surprised to see an Ultra-Orthodox Jew enter our sanctuary.

He found himself a seat in our pews and davened with us. To be clear, this was *not* the same gentleman that attended our service from the prior evening. The only thing that they had in common was that he too was staying at the Crowne Plaza for Shabbat. The guest was offered the third Aliya and accepted the honor.

Jack and Morty tag teamed their way through the second Aliya. Lenny Kroog, who was covering for Gadi, came to me and suggested that I ask our guest if he knew how to read Torah. I cautiously approached him and quietly asked the question. I prepared myself to be disappointed when he would turn me down. To my jubilant surprise, he said that he does know how to read Torah and would gladly leyn for us. He was called to the Bima for his third Aliya. He recited the blessings and proceeded to read from the Torah. He went one step further and pledged a donation to our shul. He was asked if he could and would continue reading. Without batting an eyelash, he said yes. He explained that his trope was different than ours. It did not make a difference. He was there and did what he needed to do to help our Congregation out.

After our Shabbat Services, he was bestowed the honor of making the Motzi on the Challah in our Kiddush room, which he was more than happy to do. He even stayed a while and ate from the food that we were offering. Many of our congregants, approached him to

thank him for reading from the Torah that morning. He engaged them in conversation very comfortably.

Soon, he was getting ready to part ways. I asked him if he was available to read from the Torah during our Mincha Service that afternoon. He responded, "Can I come wearing my streimel?" I answered that he could come dressed however he wants.

He came back for Mincha, davened with us in our small sanctuary even though we had mixed seating. After the service, he excused himself and said that he was going back to the hotel to daven Ma'ariv and make Havdalah with his wife.

I continue to reflect on what took place that Shabbat Korach at Shaarey Israel. I cannot believe that what took place on that Shabbat was just random. In our time of need, a plan was being implemented.

For me, it certainly changed my attitude. This Shabbat was the product of real teamwork among members of our Shul family. In addition, we are all guilty of judging other Jews based upon their attire and how they look. The events of that Shabbat taught me not to stereotype others. For me, the experience showed me that we Jews have much more in common than what divides us. That is the Miracle of Shabbat Korach. This is the true definition of ACHDUT!


