# **Unearthing History**



On the plateau between La Joya's water tank and Contreras on Highway 304 you will occasionally find a cluster of cars on the side of the road and a small group of people to the west. The people are not digging for gold in the classic sense, but for the golden nuggets of history.

A group from the University of New Mexico Archeology Department spearheads the regular digs in an area where residents have always found pottery shards and miscellaneous arrow heads. In fact, they are unearthing and



mapping a long-gone community.

It is believed that one of the dirt mounds may

be the site of the original chapel. It was pointed out how certain mounds, based on the shape, are the types of landscape archeologists always look for. When mounds meet certain criteria, they are almost always

able to locate a building or structure of some type.

So far they have located a kiva, one long building with multiple rooms, an area where it is possible that a corral and barn were located, and a couple of shrine sites.



According to old records, the community was abandoned during the time of the Pueblo Revolt, and subsequently inhabited again for a short time several years later. As shown in the picture on the left, partial walls have been unearthed and are being carefully dug out to follow along the top to determine the length and width of each. This enables them to calculate what each structure may have been.

It is not clear whether they will dig out all the structures to the floor, but at the present they are working at mapping exact building locations.

#### Library Leaves May 2016

The careful work being carried out is fascinating and many on the site are volunteers. In fact, it was made clear that anyone wishing to help them would be welcome.

As items are found, they are catalogued and set aside. If La Joya Community Development Association is successful in establishing a museum, many of the items will be on display there.

Although the "dig" is not an everyday occurrence, the entire site is taking shape. It is fascinating how much they can learn about the people that once lived there from the buildings and the items they are finding. \*\*

# Before You Buy a Livestock Guardian



# Dog / Puppy

With the increasing use of livestock

guardian dogs (LGD), more inappropriate breeds or crossbred dogs are being marketed as livestock guardian dogs. LGD breeds are a specific group of breeds and were developed through centuries to be perfectly suited to this work. They inherit a set of genetic behaviors and traits that are not trainable to other breeds.

Some of the inbred traits include: a longer period of bonding; low prey drive; nurturing and protective instincts toward their charges; sufficient size to deal with large predators; a coat adapted to living outside; and the independence, self-thinking, and defensive aggression to respond to predators or threats.



Guidelines for Selecting a LGD Pup or Adult

DO NOT ADOPT A PUP UNDER THE AGE OF 8 WEEKS AND PREFERABLY ONE CLOSER TO 12 WEEKS OLD.

Pups learn important lessons from their littermates on how to interact with other dogs and bite inhibition. Only raise one LGD pup at a time; working pups do not need a playmate (especially littermates). Two pups can be overly focused on each other instead of you or your stock and encourage each other to get in trouble as they pass through their troublesome teens. In fact, its best to stagger the ages of your LGDs if possible.

DO NOT SELECT A PUP THAT IS SMALL, FINE-BONED, OR HAS A POINTED MUZZLE. Most LGDs average 20 lbs at 8 weeks of age. At 16 weeks, they should weigh 35-40 pounds. If the pup is significantly smaller, it probably has non-LGD in its parentage and will not grow large enough to deal with a predator. Avoid sickly or undersized puppies. A LGD pup is an investment in protecting your valuable stock and farm.

IF YOU ARE OBTAINING AN ADULT LGD, HE SHOULD WEIGH 80-120 LB OR MORE, DEPENDING ON THE BREED. Avoid oversized and massive dogs, which may result from crosses with other breeds. LGDs need to be large enough to deal with predator threats, but also fast and agile with great stamina. Some very large dogs were bred for dog fighting or guard dog work, not as livestock guardians, plus overly large dogs are prone to hip or joint injuries and a reduced lifespan.

DO NOT SELECT AN ALBINO DOG OR A DOG LACKING DARK COLORING AROUND THE EYES OR ON THE NOSE. Pink skin on the nose or around the eyes poses a serious risk of sunburn and skin cancers, especially for a full time working LGD. No LGD breeds have pink coloring in those areas.

# Avoid a Pup or Adult LGD with These Characteristics

- Blue eyes or red or blue merle coloring. Speckling and freckling of color in white areas indicates another breed in the dog's parentage mostly likely a herding breed.
- Ears that are semi erect, pricked, or set high on the skull like they want to stand up. All LGD breeds have low set, drop ears unless they have been cropped.
- Straight, thick tails. LGD tails are typically long and often curved, sabre-like, curled, or have a crook at the end. Some breeds may have cropped tails.
- Very short, single or smooth coats. All LGD breeds (except for the extremely rare Laboreiro) are double-coated.



# Breeds and Coloring

Read the standard and look at pictures.

Breeds have typical coats, colors, and color patterns. An unusual color, like black or black and tan, can be an indication of outcrossing. The Big White Dogs or BWDs (Great Pyrenees, Akbash, Maremma, Polish Tatra, Kuvasz, Komondor, and crosses of these breeds) should not be colored black and white or resemble a Border Collie.

Concern about LGD color is very helpful in determining a dog's appropriate ancestry. Unusual colors or patterns should always raise a red flag because they suggest that the pup has another breed in its background. Even in breeds that appear in many colors,

some colors are not very likely at all. If you have any doubt, seek a second opinion from a breed authority or LGD expert.

When shopping online, remember the good advice – buyer beware. Be especially cautious if the breeder cannot produce any registration, pedigree, or breeder information for a dog that is labeled as a purebred. You should not be asked to pay a purebred price for a dog without documentation.

Keeping these guidelines in mind will help you avoid the pitfalls or potential problems of LGD shopping, and will greatly increase your chances of success.

# Natural Health Tips

#### **Sinusitis Season**

Pain in the forehead or between the eyes? Upper teeth ache? Face feeling full, nose stuffy and congested? You may have sinus trouble. Sinuses are air spaces in your skull lined with mucous membranes. Most people have four sets of nasal sinuses:

- Two in the forehead above the eyes,
- One inside each cheek bone.
- A group of cavities behind the bridge of the nose, and
- Sphenoid sinuses, behind the nose and underneath the brain

Sinuses are like fingerprints; everybody's are different. Some people have no frontal sinuses or just one.

What Is Sinusitis? When infections or allergies make sinus tissues inflamed, red, and swollen, that's called sinusitis. It usually starts with inflammation triggered by a cold, allergy attack, or irritant.

Most people get a stuffy nose and pain or pressure in several locations around the face or teeth. There's usually a nasal discharge that may be yellow, green, or clear. Other symptoms may include fatigue, decreased sense of smell and/or taste, cough, sore throat, bad breath, headache, pain on bending forward, and fever.

Inflammation of the sinus cavity lasting more than three months is chronic sinusitis. Bacterial infections are not the only cause -anatomy, allergies, polyps,
immune deficiencies, and dental
diseases may also cause chronic
sinus problems. Chronic sinus
symptoms may also be caused by a
deviated septum or another
treatable condition.

When sinuses remain inflamed, sinus membranes may thicken and swell, and can cause grape-like masses called polyps. Polyps may protrude from the sinus into the nasal passage and partially or completely block the nasal airway.

Nasal decongestant sprays open swollen nasal passages and allow your sinuses to drain, which can help during the worst days of a cold or during air travel. However, only use these sprays for a few days otherwise the sprays will cause swelling. Oral decongestants may help, but also have side effects. If symptoms persist, see your doctor.

The common cold is a viral infection. Colds can lead to sinusitis symptoms, but these usually clear up in 7-14 days. Antibiotics do not treat viruses, so they won't help the sinus symptoms of a cold.

What can help <u>allergy</u>-related sinus symptoms is irrigation with saline solution, either with a neti pot or squeeze bottle. Nasal steroid sprays sometimes help with sinus symptoms from allergies (not infections). Antihistamines may help, too, especially for symptoms of sneezing and runny nose.

Yellow or green mucus can mean a bacterial infection, but even if severe, it usually clears up in 7-14 days -- without antibiotic treatment. But, if you keep feeling worse and severe symptoms

persist, or if you get a fever, it's time to see a doctor.

Can Chronic Sinusitis Be Ignored?

One layer of bone separates your sinuses from your brain. If a sinus infection passes through the bone, it can infect the lining of the brain -- meningitis -- or even the brain itself – which are life threatening. A sinus infection can also spread into the orbit of the eye, causing an infection around the eye and possibly blindness. Less severe complications include asthma attacks and loss of smell or taste.

#### **Preventing Sinusitis**

There's no sure way to avoid either acute or chronic sinusitis. But here are some things that can help:

- Keep sinuses moist -- use saline sprays, nasal lubricant sprays, or nasal irrigation often.
- Avoid very dry indoor environments.
- Avoid exposure to irritants, such as cigarette smoke or strong chemical odors.
