Library News

"September tries its best to have us forget summer." Bernard Williams

Thank you to all of you who have made book recommendations to me. I love hearing from all of you. Books are my door to open communication with others... books are fun, books are an opening into others' minds, books are an open door to my mind. So many books; so little time!

So, in a short visit to California, I helped my nephew go through his mother's (my sister's) last ten boxes. I find the following: "The Six Super Foods Every Woman Needs" (Keep in mind that Mary Beth was a health nut...had never been sick.)

- #1. Low-fat yogurt. 3 to 5 servings a week. Enjoy a cup of yogurt at breakfast, lunch, or snack to meet the U.S. guidelines for low fat dairy each day. Skip the fruit -on-the-bottom. Too much sugar.
- #2. 2 to 3 servings a week. Fatty fish like salmon, sardines, and mackerel. Fatty fish not only plays a vital role in health of the membrane of every cell in our body.
- #3. Beans. 3 to 4 servings a week. Beans are a good source of protein and fiber and may have protective effects against heart disease and breast cancer. Beans may also play a role in stabilizing female hormones.
- #4. Tomatoes (or watermelon, red grapefruit, red navel oranges). 3 to 5 servings a week. The powerhouse nutrient in all these fruits is lycopene; while lycopene has protective effects against prostate cancer, research has also shown it has tremendous benefits for women as well. It may protect against breast cancer. And it helps women fight heart disease...and it may help women keep younger looking by protecting against UV damage from the sun.
- #5. Vitamin D fortified low-fat milk or orange juice. Vitamin D helps the bones absorb calcium from the gut. Vitamin D helps reduce the risk of osteoporosis and may be vital in reducing the risk of diabetes, multiple sclerosis, and tumors of the breast, colon and ovary.

#6. Berries. 3 to 4 servings a week. These fruits may protect your body with powerful anti-cancer nutrients known as anthocyans, which are believed to play a role in cell repair. These anthocyans may decrease the risk of several cancers.

What slows down aging???

Fruits and vegetables Lean protein Strength training

Aerobic exercise – move for a minimum of 30 minutes five times a week Sunscreen and shades- sun exposure can damage DNA Weight loss – lose those extra pounds around the mid-section

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The ELCA is a Sanctuary Denomination; What does this mean?

(As approved at the 2019 ELCA National Assembly)



In its simplest form, becoming a sanctuary denomination means that the ELCA is publicly declaring that walking alongside immigrants and refugees is a matter of faith. The ELCA Churchwide Assembly, the highest legislative authority of the ELCA, declared that when we preach on Sunday that Jesus told us to welcome, we will use our hands and voices on Monday to make sure it happens.

Being a sanctuary denomination does not call for any person, congregation, or synod to engage in any illegal activities.

We have a broken system regarding immigration, refugees and asylum-seekers. To declare ourselves a sanctuary church body is to say that we seek to provide concrete resources to assist the most vulnerable who are feeling the sharp edges of this broken system.

Being a sanctuary denomination is about loving our neighbors. While we may have different ideas about how to fix this broken system and may have different ways of loving our neighbors, our call to love our neighbor is central to our faith.

Being a sanctuary denomination will look different in different contexts. It may mean providing space for people to live; providing financial and legal support to those who are working though the immigration system; or supporting other congregation and service providers. We cannot mandate or direct our congregations and members to respond in specific ways. Each must work out what this means for them in their context.
