Smoke Rise Country Club Updates

We are finding a silver lining in the dark cloud that has loomed over the Club since last December's disastrous pipe break. Under the leadership of Board President, Art Wood, the Board of Directors has a plan now to not only bring the Clubhouse back, but to take it up a notch



to what it was originally intended: a high-end private country club with great restaurants, beautiful dining facilities, attractive banquet areas, efficient meeting spaces and nice areas to socialize. All that of course in addition to the five pools, eight lighted tennis courts, state-of-the art exercise facilities, and 18-hole golf course. We truly have a gem right here in our community and we have decided it is time to polish it up.

The Board envisions total renovation of our three kitchens. The Tennis Center will be first because it is what we are using now for social gatherings, and its current state makes large-group food preparation a challenge. Right behind that will be a buildout of the lower level of the Club converting the Turnstand into a pub-style sports restaurant with lots of TVs and areas to relax with friends. As that gets underway, the big project, reconfiguring and refreshing the main, upstairs kitchen will begin. A commercial kitchen design firm is being retained to layout and implement the new far more capable kitchen.

As for the Clubhouse itself, that is where you will see the most visual transformation. We have engaged Kelley Harris' firm, Harris Interiors, to design and specify the interior spaces. Kelley worked for 10 years for the firm that did the original SRCC. The Club was completed in 1998 and he joined in 2004. Loving private club design work, he started his own firm in 2014 specializing in Private Clubs. He has come full circle in a way and is back helping us bring the Club up to par with other fine, private clubs.

Harris Interiors (HINT) is a full-service interior design firm based in Atlanta, Georgia that works exclusively with private clubs. The firm has worked with over forty private clubs across the Southeast and Midwest. The firm takes time to understand the personality, culture and soul of each club membership. The result is a unique and special experience for members, future members and their guests.

Kelley's first task is getting us images we can share with the membership and community so you can see the vision for how the Clubhouse will look when complete. Check out his impressive portfolio at: https://www.hintatlanta.com/copy-of-portfolio

SRCA Report

At the board gathering on May 15, final touches were put on preparations for the successful May 20 shredding event sponsored by SRCA. Additionally, reports regarding the elementary school purchase of patio furniture funded by SRCA were presented. Also, there was a recap of an interesting experience in the Lord Park where Beverley Ojo, Eileen Stone, and Michael Huerkamp were part of an entourage to examine putative native Creek indigenous artifactual sites.

Evaluation of our low-expense membership campaign via insert in the March Smoke Signal yielded \$11,700 income, sufficient to cover about one-third of our yearly expenses. Consequently, we are planning a traditional direct-to-home mailing to solicit new and renewed memberships. It was noted that well-intentioned neighbors have been landscaping stacks with personal funds. SRCA with our landscaper has a sustainable, color-coordinated plan for those stacks located on heavily traveled roads and we encourage fully tax-deductible donations to the association where \$2 out of every \$3 donated are invested in greenspace.

The renovation project included:

- resurfacing the pool
- installing new coping
- adding new interior pool lights
- resurfacing the pool deck

We put that capital to good use by fully funding the pool resurfacing, coping, and lighting renovations. DeKalb Launches Video Camera Registry

In a previous article, I wrote about the City of Tucker's recently implemented Video Surveillance Ordinance, which mandates that convenience stores install video surveillance systems. Video evidence can often help authorities identify and prosecute criminals - especially in cases of assault, robbery, vandalism, or other crimes.

Another program, "Connect DeKalb," also uses video to enhance public safety through a private camera registry. The DeKalb County Police Department (DKPD) is encouraging residents and businesses to participate in the program by registering their security cameras in an online portal accessible only



by DKPD. The registry creates a map of the location of private cameras, allowing investigators to request permission to obtain video footage that may be related to an incident.

Participation in the program is voluntary. It allows DKPD to view registered cameras either on a 24-hour basis or upon approval when requested. There are two levels of camera integration: Level One involves registering a camera with DKPD, which enables investigators to know a camera is present at a location and easily request video evidence if an incident occurs. Level Two allows participants to voluntarily integrate their camera system, allowing DKPD direct access to the camera feed. Integration is opt-in and subscription-based, which allows 24-hour access to recorded footage and real-time streaming.

As of this writing, 458 cameras have been registered on the system and 211 cameras are now integrated to give DKPD direct access to the camera feed in case of an emergency. Visit connectdekalbcounty.org or call (770) 724-7435 to learn more and to register your camera and join hundreds of others working together to create a safer community. The registration process should take less than one minute, via a secure online portal.

This is the Season for Swimmer's Ear

The pools are open and summer is finally on the way! For many this means swim team, beach trips, and the swimming pool! Unfortunately, for some, it can also mean a painful condition called swimmers ear. Swimmers Ear, or Otitis Externa (OE) is an infection of the ear canal that is usually caused by one or more types of bacteria or sometimes a fungus.

The ear canal is a fascinating structure that is protected from infection, 'critters' and debris by a slight curve and a hairy skin surface covered with a thin layer of wax. The ear usually 'self cleans' by moving the wax in a spiral direction to the outer canal, where it drops off or is in reaching distance of your finger. Some people make excessive amounts of earwax. Build up of this wax can prevent water from draining properly during showers or trips to the pool. Prolonged exposure to fresh water -like swimming pools- can create the perfect environment for bacteria to multiply. If you combine this with trauma to the ear canal (e.g., cleaning out ear wax with Q tips), or certain common skin diseases of the ear canal like eczema, seborrheic dermatitis, and psoriasis, which disrupt the natural skin barrier to infection, you have the perfect set up for Otitis Externa (OE). Other causes of wax build up -like ear canal malformations, foreign bodies in the ear canal (you would believe what kids put in their ears!), wearing hearing aids and extra hairy ear canals are also predisposing factors for OE. Type A blood (no clue why this is a cause!) and reactions to certain kinds of soap are less common causes of OE.


Symptoms of Swimmer's Ear include pain and/or itching in the ear canal, and drainage coming from the ear canal. Some people have redness and pain when their ear is even touched or moved. Rarely, the infection can be quite severe, especially in diabetics and those with immune deficiencies. These people are sick and know it!! Pain extending toward the bone behind the ear, pain on opening the mouth and extremely high fever may mean the infection has invaded the bone or facial structures. These patients need to be hospitalized for intravenous antibiotics immediately!

No good studies prove that these preventative measures work, but they are definitely worth a try! Most ear, nose and throat doctors recommend them: Earplugs before jumping in the pool. These are required (!) if you have an ear perforation of any type or ear tubes. Wicking moisture away with a tightly twirled piece of Kleenex; drying the ear with a hair dryer on the low setting and using Acetic Acid drops (Vosol is one) may be preventative if used after swimming.

Treatment of swimmer's ear is simple. Most doctors prescribe antibiotic drops with or without cortisone. The cortisone component helps decrease swelling and inflammation. It is important to be able to get the drops past the debris in the ear canal, so sometimes the doctor will physically remove the debris before writing a prescription. Oral antibiotics are not used unless the infection has spread beyond the ear canal, or there is a dual infection in the middle ear.

Pain is a very common complaint. Tylenol or Ibuprofen usually help. Occasionally, the pain is severe enough to require stronger pain medication.

Most patient's symptoms are better in 24 hours. If no improvement occurs within 49-72 hours, or if symptoms increase, you should be seen again. Symptoms usually disappear by ten days, but can take weeks to completely resolve.




options available to clean your bottom, clean the toilet, and provide music to cover the noise!

for its pottery. Their tea bowls were the favorite of shoguns. The texture of the pottery has been compared to the feel of human flesh!





Peachtree Street, the Fox has hosted countless premieres, shows, movies and celebrities for more than 90 years, beginning with the introduction of Mickey Mouse in a Walt Disney cartoon in 1929.

Now, Stone Mountain artist and long-time Fox supporter Olivia Thomason has painted a tribute to the theater, a whimsical retrospective incorporating memorable appearances over the years. "I saw Elvis there in 1956," she said, denying, however, she was screaming during his performance. Over the years, the award-winning artist enjoyed Broadway productions like "The Phantom of the Opera," and others like "West Side Story." One of the most memorable, she recalled, was Liberace. "Toss in 'The Nutcracker,' and you have just a glimpse of my Fox experience."

The painting is an interior view of the stage with memorable performers on the stage. Above are the words of Rock and Roll legends Lynyrd Skynyrd-who performed a benefit to save the Fox from the wrecking ball-that began with the words, "Play it Pretty for Atlanta." I didn't realize how important this message was to the Fox legacy until my son, who worked on Fox concert productions for Elton John and others told me that this is permanently written above the main stage entrance."

The Fabulous Fox continues to entertain and is one place where you might just see a famous face. "Bob Dylan's last Atlanta concert was at the Fox. Jimmy and Rosalynn Carter were there. Two Nobel Prize winners-close friends-under the same star-studded indigo ceiling."

Olivia Thomason's popular Decatur art gallery "The Primitive Eye," was a center of arts activity for many years and named "Gallery of the Year" on multiple occasions. Ms. Thomason's children's book, "The Great American Pie Contest," (Austin Macauley Publishing USA, 2022), features 28 original paintings and her next book, "The Dinosaur Grocery Store," is scheduled for publication soon.

An active citizen, Ms. Thomason belongs to the Stone Mountain Women's Club, the Stone Mountain First United Methodist Church and paints from her home studio in Stone Mountain Historic Village.

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GARDENING: Are you feeling that itch?

Think the plantings in front of your house are looking old and drab? Is it time to renovate your foundation plantings? Our foundation plants make a statement and provide curb appeal. They are the entryway to our home and generally very visible to others. Does yours welcome your guests? Maybe, it's time for a change. It might seem overwhelming to take on this kind of project. You could hire a landscape designer or, if you are more adventuresome, take it on yourself. It can be fun and rewarding – and a little hard work! However, it is the focal point of your home, so well worth the effort.

Whether you hire someone or do it yourself, you need an idea of what you want it to look like. Take a good look at what you have now. Do you want to keep any of it or change the whole look? Is the area in full sun, shade, or a mixture? This will make a difference on what you can plant. Looking through magazines or on the internet (by searching foundation garden plans) for ideas is certainly a way to go. You can also take some leisurely drives through neighborhoods and see what you like. You'll see that many houses have traditional evergreen shrubs that were probably planted with the building of the house. As with designing a garden in any area of your yard, adding different plants, foliage colors, textures, and contrasts may make it more appealing. Adding plants that provide four seasons of interest will be a joy to look at year-round. Take your time, draw out a plan.

Think about how you now use this area. Is it rarely used, or is it a place to hang out? Do you want to change how you use it? This will reflect on what kind of plantings you might consider. If it's going to be a gathering place you might even want to think about adding a water feature, making sure you buy fragrant plants, and add areas for seating.

Other details you want to consider include the type of appearance you want. Do you want a formal look or a more casual cottage style design? Will that look be in harmony with your house? What colors do you like? Think about breaking up monotone plantings (like all green shrubbery) with contrasting colors. Have a colorful front door? Include some plants of the same color to a little pop to the garden. Add different heights and textures to soften the hard lines of the house. Use a mixture of trees, flowers, shrubs, (evergreen and deciduous) to create visual interest. Do you have a bare wall? Think about planting a small tree, large shrub, vine-covered trellis to fill in the space. Make sure not to block windows or gutters. Plant for the ultimate size of what you want at maturity not for what the size of the plant is now. Planting dwarfs will help to keep pruning at a minimum and provide a more maintenance free landscape. Don't plant too close to the foundation. Don't overplant in your haste to make it look wonderful. Give it time to fill in. Add more annuals or containers to help fill the spaces as the shrubs and perennials mature.

Think outside the box – beyond just the evergreen shrubs you see so much of. There are many options – azaleas, rhododendrons, dogwoods, Japanese maples, hydrangeas, roses, dwarf lilacs, peonies, ornamental grasses, spirea, weigela, lilies, hosta, ferns, phlox, and the list goes on.

If you're interested in pursuing this type of renovation project, take your time, do your research, make notes about what types of plants you like, colors, etc. and explore! It's easy for me to go to a nursery and indulge! Buy what interests me and come home and find a place to put it. However, a plan for your foundation garden will provide you with a cohesive look and should last you until you get another itch to try something different!

May's Smoke Rise Morning Glories meeting was all about tea! As most of you know, tea is made from leaves of the Camellia sinensis bush. Native to Asia, it has a long and storied history. In fact, it is said that the first tea was consumed in

2737BC when the Chinese Emperor happened to have a cup of hot water that a tea leaf fell into. He delighted in the taste and an industry was formed. White tea, green tea and black tea are all made from the same plant. It is the method of preparation of the raw tea leaves that distinguishes each variety. The Camellia sinensis grows in Zones 7-9, is evergreen and has a small white bloom in September. The leaves are much smaller than the Camellia Sasanqua or Japonica but the light and soil requirements are the same for all varieties. I have two in my garden in Smoke Rise.

Tisanes are beverages made from plant material other than tea such as herbal teas. The most common are mint, basil, thyme and chamomile. Our speaker, Brandon Brenis, works at the Atlanta Botanical Garden with Mo Hemmings who is the Outreach Community Coordinator for the garden. Brandon's lively and fascinating talk entertained the crowd of appreciative tea drinkers.

In club news, the Morning Glories celebrated winning many awards at the annual DeKalb Federation April awards meeting and happily won several Garden Club of Georgia awards at the April convention held at the Evergreen Resort. Some of these awards come with cash prizes that will be used to fund our many projects in the community. May's meeting was the last gathering until our September meeting.

Amen, Let's Eat! by Joyce Ray



Happy Father's Day to all you dads. Whether or not you enjoy cooking, this month is all about your favorite foods and sharing some of our favorite food from the men in our lives. Frank Luten cooks this meal for his family when they are at the beach together and can get fresh shrimp. The entire family loves it, so I think we will, too!

Shrimp Feta

2 cups chopped onion

2 Tbsp. butter

4 cups chopped, peeled and seeded tomatoes

1 tsp. dry mustard

½ cup chopped parsley

½ tsp. pepper

½ cup white wine

2 cloves garlic, minced

2 Tbsp. olive oil

1 tsp. dill weed 1 tsp. basil

1 tsp. basii

1 tsp. sugar

1 tsp. salt

2 lb. large shrimp, peeled and deveined

½ lb. feta cheese, crumbled

In a large skillet with cover, sauté onion and garlic in butter and oil until golden. Stir in tomatoes, dill, basil, mustard, sugar, parsley, salt, and pepper. Simmer for 5 minutes. Add shrimp and wine. Continue stirring and simmering for about 3 minutes or until the shrimp has cooked through. Turn off heat. Sprinkle with cheese, cover with lid and let sit for 2 minutes or until cheese is slightly melted. Serve over rice with toasted bread.

When you have a conversation with a man who cooks, it is usually all about the "method" rather than the item by item and step by step recipe that women who cook often describe. I think that is why men do better at mastering cooking on the grill. Here is Joel Gilbert's description of how to cook tuna on the grill as described by him in the June 2021 edition of Smoke Signal.

"The absolute best fish for first-time grillers is tuna because you can treat it just like a steak. Marinate it the same way you would any other piece of meat and be sure to coat it with olive oil before you put it on the grill (which should be wiped carefully with rag and olive oil) before you fire it up and just before you put any fish on the grill. Be careful here that oil does not drip on the coals, or it can flare up and burn you. Grill until the amount of rare center section is to your liking. (115-125°F) for rare and 125°F for medium rare. Do not cook tuna all the way through unless you really like it that way; the longer it cooks, the more moisture and flavor it loses."

Mississippi Mud Cake

My husband, Gene, has won more than one blue ribbon for this special dessert at our church's Men's Bake-Off competition. It is a classic recipe and sure crowd pleaser. Someone once asked Gene how long it takes to bake this. He said, "You go in your kitchen at about 2:00 on Sunday afternoon and you should be done by around 4:30." (Actually, allow 45 minutes for the cake to bake at 350°).

2 cups sugar

1 cup shortening

4 eggs

1/2 cup cocoa

¼ tsp. salt

1 cup chopped pecans (optional)

3 tsp vanilla extract

With electric mixer, cream sugar and shortening. Add eggs. Sift dry ingredients and add to mixture. Add Vanilla and nuts. Pour into a greased 13x9 inch baking bap. Bake at 350° for 45 minutes.

1st icing layer: 1 small bag of miniature marshmallows. Remove cake from oven and immediately add marshmallows on top of cake. Return to oven and melt for about 10 minutes, watching carefully to not let them burn. Cool slightly.

2nd icing layer: 1 box confectioners' sugar (3 ½ cups) ½ cup cocoa, ½ stick softened butter, ½ cup evaporated milk, 1 teaspoon vanilla extract, 1 cup chopped pecans.

Sift together the powdered sugar and cocoa. Slowly add the canned milk and butter and beat with electric mixer until it becomes smooth. Add vanilla and pecans. Pour over marshmallow layer and allow to cool before cutting.
