#### First reading

#### Joshua 24:1-2,15-18

Joshua gathered all the tribes of Israel together at Shechem; then he called the elders, leaders, judges and scribes of Israel, and they presented themselves before God. Then Joshua said to all the people, 'If you will not serve the Lord, choose today whom you wish to serve, whether the gods that your ancestors served beyond the River, or the gods of the Amorites in whose land you are now living. As for me and my House, we will serve the Lord.'

The people answered, 'We have no intention of deserting the Lord and serving other gods! Was it not the Lord our God who brought us and our ancestors out of the land of Egypt, the house of slavery, who worked those great wonders before our eyes and preserved us all along the way we travelled and among all the peoples through whom we journeyed? #### Second reading Ephesians 5:21-32

Give way to one another in obedience to Christ. Wives should regard their husbands as they regard the Lord, since as Christ is head of the Church and saves the whole body, so is a husband the head of his wife;

and as the Church submits to Christ, so should wives to their husbands, in everything. Husbands should love their wives just as Christ loved the Church and sacrificed himself for her to make her holy. He made her clean by washing her in water with a form of words, so that when he took her to himself she would be glorious, with no speck or wrinkle or anything like that, but holy and faultless. In the same way, husbands must love their wives as they love their own bodies; for a man to love his wife is for him to love himself. A man never hates his own body, but he feeds it and looks after it; and that is the way Christ treats the Church, because it is his body – and we are its living parts. For this reason, a man must leave his father and mother and be joined to his wife, and the two will become one body. This mystery has many implications; but I am saying it applies to Christ and the Church.




#### Two frogs in the milk

Probably you have heard the story of two frogs written by Melissa D Zartman. One frog was fat and the other skinny. One day, while searching for food, they accidentally jumped into a vat of milk. They couldn't get out, as the sides were too slippery, so they were just swimming around. The fat frog said to the skinny frog, "Brother frog, there's no use paddling any longer. We're just going to drown, so we might as well give up." The skinny frog replied, "Hold on brother, keep paddling. Somebody will get us out." And they continued paddling for hours. After a while, the fat frog said, "Brother frog, there's no use. I'm becoming very tired now. I'm just going to stop paddling and drown. It's Sunday and nobody's working. We're doomed. There's no possible way out of here." But the skinny frog said, "Keep trying. Keep paddling. Something will happen, keep paddling." Another couple of hours passed. The fat frog said, "I can't go on any longer. There's no sense in doing it because we're going to drown anyway. What's the use?" And the fat frog stopped. He gave up. And he drowned in the milk. But the skinny frog kept on paddling. Ten minutes later, the skinny frog felt something solid beneath his feet. He had churned the milk into butter and he hopped out of the vat.

The story is very inspiring. Like the two frogs paddling and swimming in the vat of milk, we too often find our lives paddling and swimming in the vat of problems. They often push us to the wall and challenge us to quit or hold on. Actually, quitting or holding on depends on how we respond to problems. The two frogs encountered the same problem but had different way of responding to it. The fat frog was rather pessimistic, lacking of perseverance and focusing too much on the problem. He thought he was in a hopeless situation. Meanwhile the skinny frog was more positive, persevering and hopeful. While searching for a solid ground to hop out he continued to paddle and swim. And finally, he made it

The skinny frog teaches us an important lesson that in the face of hardships we need to have a positive attitude, perseverance and looking for solid ground to hold on. What is the solid ground that may help us hop out of our problems? Jesus' disciples, as this Sunday's Gospel tells us, were divided into two groups after listening to his teaching of giving his flesh for them to eat. The first group quitted as they found the teaching was difficult to understand. The second decided to hold on despite their lack of understanding of the teaching. Challenging the second group, Jesus asked: "Would you also like to leave?" Peter replied, "Lord, to whom would we go? You have the words that give eternal life. And now we believe and know that you are the Holy One who has to come

from God." It is clear that faith in Jesus was the solid ground which helped Peter and his group to hold on to Jesus. Although they failed to understand his teaching, they didn't fix their attention onto the problem. They fixed their attention onto Him. Peter teaches us an important lesson here that in the face of hardships we must fix our eyes on Jesus. He is our solid ground on which we stand to hop out of the problems. Our problems may seem to be unbearable but with Jesus nothing is impossible.



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


