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"Serving God through Faithful Stewardship on Our Common Home*: Equipping Good Shepherd United Methodist Church for the Anthropocene."

Over the last two decades I have served as an ordained elder at several United Methodist churches in the greater Washington area. While leading these congregations, I learned that there was a need for a discipleship pathway for the churches I served to make and empower the disciples of Jesus Christ for the transformation of the world.

In 2010, I wrote a 40-page ministry catalog, entitled *Means of Grace that Shapes Our Future*, for Saint James United Methodist Church in West Friendship, Maryland. The catalog was used mainly for new member classes and for the financial stewardship for the church.

Beginning with the mission, vision, value and beliefs of the church, the catalog helped a new disciple grow and find his or her place in the life of the church through the discipleship pathway. The discipleship pathway was developed through the Wesleyan means of grace. It offers eight assimilation tracks that bring up new members to grow to the level of spiritual leaders in the church. Each track requires a year of bible study and lay leadership practice in the area of ministry - worship, study, service and evangelism. Through the assimilation process of each track,** the members of the church learn the ministerial skills and are invited to serve eight different leadership areas of the church.

The catalog has been revised at each pastoral appointment and used for the discipleship pathway for two other congregations: Lanham United Methodist Church, Lanham; and the UMC of Savage in Savage, Maryland. Following the pastoral appointment in July, 2019, it was revised again for Good Shepherd UMC (Good Shepherd) in Silver Spring, Maryland.

Good Shepherd is a relatively young congregation compared to other United Methodist churches in the Baltimore-Washington Conference, yet it is eager to transition into a church of new generations. Established in the early 50s, Good Shepherd has gathered a multi-ethnic congregation in the greater Washington area. Over the last two decades in particular, Good Shepherd received numerous immigrants primarily from West Africa, including English-speaking Asian-Americans. Then, Hispanic and Latino residents began to move into the parish and became the largest racial group. Recently, Good Shepherd has received several French speaking members.

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The demographic study of the church's parish reveals a unique combination of residents: "silver sophisticated," – a retired, highly educated elderly group, striving "Singles and Starters," – young professionals, and "Cultural Connection," – new immigrants.* With the demographic change, Good Shepherd launched a new ministry, called, multi-contextual ministry.

Cambridge Track D: "The Winds of the Spirit and Ministries for a Changing World" program helped me to learn that the discipleship pathway of the church needs to be modified in order to face new challenges from climate change and its related environmental crisis.

The DMin project will seek to modify the discipleship pathway of the church, with new theological underpinnings for the moral vision of the church for Anthropocene. The entire church will participate in the project with a questionnaire and a survey. A fieldwork journal will be kept throughout the year. As a project for congregational transition, a sermon series will be associated with the project. Seasonal devotionals and congregational acts, i.e. a Carbon Fast during Lent, will be revamped as the church explores new insights on creation care. During the project a new small group will be organized to lead the Action and Advocacy** track as an objective of the discipleship path-

Congregation Study

Chapter One begins with an overview of on the global emergency in our common home, the earth, and the church's need to respond to the environmental crisis caused by climate change. The global emergency will include the human impact on the natural world with IPCC (Intergovernmental Panels of Climate Change) reports and the observations of several advocates, such as Bill McKibben, Amitav Ghosh, Jim Antal, and T.J. Corringe. But, the emergency will be found more in the people living in the secular age with disbelief and a lack of moral vision for God's creation. This would include Good Shepherd, which has not paid much attention to the action and advocacy needed for creation care.

A denominational research on the church's response to the global emergency will explore the collaborative act among the protestant churches and other faith traditions in the United States. The overview will help Good Shepherd engage questions around how the church can foster the interdependent acts of stewardship for the common good and built environment on the verge of Anthropocene.

Chapter Two articulates three major biblical texts that support new theological underpinnings for the church of Anthropocene. First, the Yahwist tradition of the Creation story (Genesis 2:4b-3:24) will emphasize the role of human beings in God's creation.

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Secondly, the Noaic Covenant on new creation (Genesis 8:22) will provide a broader theological horizon than Judeo Christian orthodoxy derived from the Abraham tradition (Genesis 12:1-3). The vision of a New Heaven and a New Earth (Isaiah 65:17-25; Revelation 21:1-22:5) will be discussed as the vision of God's Kingdom for all humanity. Thirdly, The Ten Commandments (Exodus 20) and The Lord's Prayer (Matthew 6 and Luke 6) will examine an ecclesiastical locale for Anthropocene. The holy observance of Sabbath prescribed in the commandments and also in the Lord's Prayer - the two fundamental rituals of Judeo-Christian spirituality - will help the church acknowledge the gift of Sabbath and Jubilee, where and when the church prospers God's Kingdom vision.

Chapter Three helps Good Shepherd to create a ministerial curriculum to equip the church with an Act and Advocacy track that will make the discipleship pathway relevant to today's tasks of the church. The track will include reading assignments on the act of the Holy Spirit and the significance of the rituals in the process of being an emergent church. John Wesley, inspired by Jeremy Taylor, will arouse a Christian duty inspired by Holy Living. Karl Barth's work on the Holy Spirit will help the church discover their new identity as the "called and sent." *

Dietrich Bonhoeffer will facilitate the church move toward interdependence. The curriculum will include suggested readings on Jewish spirituality, especially from Abraham Joshua Heschel on The Sabbath; and Martin Buber's I and Thou by Martin Buber, which will foster the reciprocal collaboration of fellow creatures on creation care. The church will be invited to read indigenous wisdom and scientific knowledge through a few other references, such as Robin Kimmerer's Braiding Sweetgrass, and Peter Wohlleben's The Hidden Life of Trees. Christian Ethicists, like Jim Antal, Stephen R. L. Clark and Larry L. Rasmussen will provide a roadmap of how to be a "climate church." **

The church will learn how give spiritual leadership to the church and community. With the new curriculum, the members of the church will learn how to write prayers, devotionals, and creedal statements for creation care.*** The Social Principles of The United Methodist Church will also be a reference.

Chapter Four contains a conclusion with findings from the project that examine about how Good Shepherd can foster the interdependent acts of stewardship for our common home. The project will explore how Good Shepherd can work with other faith-based communities in the local and global community, especially for the gathering of the faithful people who honor and sustain God's creation.

Through the growing numbers of the culturally connected, immigrants in the com-

munity, the last chapter will pose a question about how Good Shepherd will embrace these new neighbors who might not have




room for creation care because of their immediate need of settlement, and will empower them to become a part of "earth -honoring faith" body of Christ.
