

Sick & Shut-ins: The priests are available to administer the Sacraments to those who are unable to come to Church. The Sacrament of the Anointing of the Sick is part of the healing ministry of the Church, and should be received early in an illness or before a serious operation.

Marriages: In order to provide sufficient time for the Marriage Preparation Course, please call the parish office and ask to speak with the pastor at least six months in advance of the wedding.

CLEANSING OF THE LEPER

Last Sunday we reflected on the healing of Peter's mother-in-law. We focused on the aspect of service as part of being grateful for God's gift of good health and blessings. The theme of healing continues in today's readings. The first reading sets the stage for the gospel reading.

Take another look at Moses' instruction to the Israelites in the opening of that reading from Leviticus 13:1-2, 44-46. "If someone has on his skin a scab ... which appears to be the sore of leprosy, he shall be brought to Aaron, the priest ... the priest shall declare him unclean ... the one who bears the sore of leprosy shall keep his garments rent and his head bare, and shall muffle his beard; he shall cry out, 'Unclean, unclean!' He shall dwell apart, making his abode outside the camp". My initial thoughts were, "That's so inconsiderate and I dare say, heartless! How do you treat the sick that way, when all they need is love and compassion?" But to be fair, one has to interpret the reading from the perspective of the time and circumstances.

In Jesus' day leprosy was a dreaded and incurable disease. The equivalent in our modern time would be AIDS and most recently, Ebola,



but without the cure or medications that reduce their spread and fatality. Today leprosy and small pox are no longer a scourge. In addition to the health dilemma, leprosy was then considered a curse from God. Consequently, people avoided lepers even more than a corpse. They were to keep their distance or risk being stoned to death.

They were unwanted because people, even family members, were afraid of contracting the disease.

Enters Jesus! Note that by this time, there were so many lepers in Israel. And because of this, people gave up caring for them in any tangible way. But not Jesus! He felt sorry for the leper. Now we're talking! "Pity" or better, "empathy," motivates us to help others. Because Jesus felt sorry for him, He was willing to help him.

Last Sunday was mostly about service as a sign of gratitude to God for our good health and for His blessings upon us. One way we could continue to show our gratitude would be by feeling others' pain and agony and empathizing with them. When we lose our sense of empathy and even our ability to feel sorry for someone, we lose a lot. At best we ignore lots of good **required** of us because we simply don't care. That could be manageable if we stay on that level, but we don't. When we (human beings) act cruelly towards another, it's mostly because we've lost touch with our sense of empathy towards that person. A leper at the time of Jesus was considered dead. The burial service was read over him. I've heard people say that someone is as good as dead to them. Often, they'd be talking of a family member or a formerly loved one.

Do you have someone who is alive, but to you is half dead or fully dead and forgotten? Do you have someone you overlook or ignore? Of course, we'll have thousands of reasons why we have to treat them so. But I wonder what Jesus thought of the reasons the Jews proffered for treating their own kith and kin that way, leprosy or no leprosy! And to know He expects us to treat them as He would! Happily, too! And smiling!

Wow, what a challenge the Christian life can be! But not to worry, where there's a will there's a way. His grace will always be enough for those who are willing to follow in His footsteps. Amen!

Lent begins this week on Ash Wednesday, February 18th. See the flap of today's bulletin for the times ashes will be distributed.

ASH WEDNESDAY and GOOD FRIDAY are days of fasting and abstinence. FRIDAYS during Lent are days of abstinence.

FASTING requires that only one full meal be taken per day. Two smaller meals that together do not equal a full meal in quantity may be taken to maintain strength. Fasting applies to those between the ages of 18 & 59; others are encouraged to participate to the extent they are able.

ABSTINENCE prohibits those who are 14 years of age and older from eating meat on Ash Wednesday and Fridays during Lent.

PARISH PASTORAL COUNCIL: The Parish Pastoral Council (PPC) meeting will take place this Monday, February 16th, at 7 p.m. in the school. All members are encouraged to attend.



STATIONS OF THE CROSS: Starting this Friday and every Friday evening during Lent, we have the devotion of the Stations of the Cross in the Church at 7 p.m.

(On Good Friday, Stations will be at 2 p.m. just prior to the 3 p.m. Good Friday Service). It is a Lenten tradition. Families are encouraged to

participate together in preparation for Easter.

LENT IS UPON US



Metanoia is a Greek word for Lent, which connotes a change of mind and heart, altering one's mind-set toward whole new ways of thinking and acting. Lent is a period where we take a long look at where

we are and try to see where we ought to be. It involves testing our values and discerning how they stack up against the values that our Lord Jesus offers His followers. Subsequently, Lent is a time when we acknowledge our quilt for the sins that led to Christ's passion and death.

ASH WEDNESDAY

This Wednesday, February 18th, is Ash Wednesday and marks the beginning of Lent. As the beginning of Lent, Ash Wednesday calls us to the conversion journey that marks the season. The readings assigned to Ash



Wednesday highlight this call to conversion. The first reading from the prophet Joel is a clarion call to return to the Lord "with fasting, and weeping and mourning." On Ash Wednesday the Church invites us to receive ashes on our foreheads as a sign that during the season of Lent we will make sincere efforts to cleanse our lives of sin, and discipline ourselves through almsgiving, prayer and fasting.

SYMBOLISM OF ASHES

As with all material things which are used as religious symbols, the symbolism of ashes is complex and difficult to understand. In themselves, ashes have little meaning, but they have their own biblical and historical context in the liturgical practices of today. Ashes are an ancient symbol of repentance (sackcloth and ashes). Consequently, when received in the light of God's revealing word, ashes can become a biblical symbol for us, and our desire to turn back to God. When we receive ashes on our foreheads, we remember who we are. We remember that we are creatures of the earth ("Remember that you are dust"). We remember that we are mortal beings ("and to dust you will return"). The reception of the ashes on our foreheads reminds us of the fact that we are God's chosen children on a journey of conversion, hence "Turn away from sin and be faithful to the Gospel." The ashes remind us that we are members of the body of Christ, and the blotch on our foreheads will proclaim that identity to others, too.

ASH WEDNESDAY SERVICES



Ashes will be distributed at each Mass on Ash Wednesday, February 18th; Mass times are 7 a.m., 9 a.m., 12 Noon, **4 p.m.**, and 7:30 p.m. With the exception of those who are ill, ashes will only be distributed at these Masses and Service.
