
Preface

This cup is the new covenant in my blood, shed for you and for all people for the forgiveness of sin. Do this for the remembrance of me.


Remembering, therefore, his death, resurrection, and ascension, we await his coming in glory.



Dear Congregation members:

At the end of last year and the beginning of 2024 we had significant expenses for Heating and Air Conditioning issues. We needed a new compressor in the sanctuary, a new heat and cooling control system with new baffles in the office wing of the newer portion of the building and an inline heat exchanger in the major unit in Trinity Hall. The total expense was slightly over \$40,000. Thanks to a grant and a gift from the DeVries family \$27,000 was given toward these expenses. The final \$13,500 is now due. We will take this from Capital Reserves unless we receive other donations toward the expense. If you'd like to make a contribution please mark it for HVAC expenses.
