SCENARIOS TO USE AT COACHES MEETING



Scenario 1: You are leaving Busch Stadium and run into some of our student-athletes who are carrying beer bottles and obviously very drunk. They recognize you and get rid of the bottles. They proceed to their car which is parked next to yours. What to do you do?

Scenario 2: You are playing a school in soccer or field hockey and we are winning in the first half of the game 8-0. What do you do? Same scenario: Playing basketball and winning 40-4 after two quarters. What do you do?

Scenario 3: You overhear that one of your players got a minor-in-possession citation over the weekend. What do you do?

Scenario 4: You have an away game and one of your players is 10 minutes late for the bus. What do you do? Does it matter if he or she is 20 minutes late?

Scenario 5: A parent calls you at 9:30 p.m. about his daughter's lack of playing time. What do you do?

Scenario 6: In preparing for the season, you are thinking about captain selection. How do you pick your captains?

Scenario 7: One of your players says she will miss a couple of practices due to a college visit, but other players share with you that she is really playing in a club tournament in another sport. What do you do?

Scenario 8: One of your best players won't hustle in practices but is great in games. What do you do?

The coaches enjoy discussing these scenarios and they report back to the whole group. The captain then represents the teams. This discussion produces great dialogue and debate by your coaches. It also gives you the opportunity to share policies regarding some of the scenarios. The coaches want to be heard and this is an opportunity for this to occur.
