All are encouraged to attend the upcoming February Awards Banquet, especially since this is the time of year where we take stock of past efforts and past accomplishments, while continuing to look towards the future. It should be a very nice and interesting evening.

Kathy Whelen will be receiving the chapter's Meritorious Service Award, in recognition of her success at helping the chapter with it's newsletter, it's fact sheet pamphlet and a number of its educational endeavors over the years.

The City of El Paso's Street Department will be recognized for its commitment to partnering with other community entities to aid in the management of natural areas. This City of El Paso department has been very helpful in work done at Feather Lake Wildlife Sanctuary, among other sites, and will receive the chapter's Conservation Award.

Rick LoBello, the El Paso Zoo's Education Curator, will be the guest speaker for the banquet, and he will discuss the dream [and ongoing activities] to create a great international park on the border of the US and Mexico in the Big Bend region of Texas and the northern frontier of Coahuila and Chihuahua.

An International Peace Park between the U.S. and Mexico in the Big Bend area of Texas, Chihuahua and Coahuila was first proposed in 1935, but the project was interrupted by the onset of World War II. Fifty years after the creation of Big Bend National Park in Texas in 1944, the government of Mexico designated the Maderas del Carmen Protected Area in Coahuila and the Canon de Santa Elenta Protected Area in Chihuahua in 1994.

In 1997 both governments signed a Letter of Intent calling for increased cooperation between all the protected areas and on both sides of the Rio Grande. Legislation is needed now to combine all three areas into an International Peace Park while respecting each country's sovereignty and management authority. The dream was rekindled and brought back into the public spotlight when in 1997 Rotarians from Mexico and the US agreed to work towards the project's completion, and their efforts have resulted in the endorsement of a number of non-profit conservation groups and government officials from both countries.

7th Annual Great Backyard Bird Count

It's once again time to participate in the annual Great Backyard Bird Count (GBBC), & this year's event will take place from Feb 13-16, 2004.

This project was developed and is managed by the National Audubon Society and the Cornell Lab of Ornithology. Whether you watch for birds for a few minutes or a few hours, your data will help to determine the status of birds throughout the continent. The project also teaches participants how to turn their backyards into good habitat for wild-life.

Your data can be submitted on-line at www.birdsource.org.

Last winter's event yielded 50,000 checklists from participants across North America, yielding an observation list of 512 species of birds!

Some interesting finds from last year's counts.....

- -American Crow numbers were in decline, perhaps due to West Nile Virus
- -Dark-eyed Junco numbers showed an increase, perhaps being "driven" to birdfeeders by the massive eastern seaboard snowstorms.
- -Mountain Bluebirds were reported further south in the western US, compared to the previous year's count.
 -the Eurasian Collared-Dove population's northwestward movement appears to have slowed down.

The GBBC will also highlight the newly expanded "Audubon at Home" website, where people can learn about the best ways to improve the health and diversity of their backyards.

Christmas Bird Counts

The Hueco Tanks CBC count, coordinated by Bob Johnson, saw a respectable number of species at 55, but the numbers of individuals seen was quite low at 1127. Lower overall numbers might in part be an artifact of the number of counters involved in this year's CBC (8).

The El Paso CBC count, coordinated by Jim Zabriskie, saw a new "high species" count reached at 123, but the numbers of individuals seen was quite low at 11,889. Huge flocks of blackbirds going to roost, were not observed this year, as has been typical of years past. In general, the number of seedeaters seen during the counts, were particularly low. This could in part be due to the ongoing drought.

Keystone Heritage Park



I have received information from only a very few people and am still in need of whatever information you may have! Please send me information that you have regarding bird species seen, the dates of the observations, the numbers of individuals of observed, etc.

Also, if anyone is also interested in coming out to the site when I do my weekly check, you're more then welcome to join me. Just call me during the week to verify my schedule & when /where we should meet.

It will soon also be time to get the pitfall array traps (we conduct live animal trapping and then release the animals after we note what we have found) ready for this year's reptile, amphibian & invertebrate trapping endeavors. UTEP offers free walking tours twice each month and also holds monthly community workdays at Rio Bosque Wetlands Park in El Paso's Mission Valley. Coming up:


