Mary, Our Mother and Our Example Most Rev. Anthony Mikovsky, Prime Bishop

During the month of May, we turn at least a part of our spiritual attention to focus on the Mother of our Lord and Savior, Jesus Christ, the Blessed Virgin Mary. During this month we sing hymns in honor of the Mother of God, some parishes will hold special Marian Devotions, others will have a May Crowning of a statue in honor of Mary or other devotional practices as well. In all of it, we honor the one through whom the Incarnation of Christ, our Lord, was accomplished.

In the first chapter of the Gospel of Luke we hear the announcement: "In the sixth month the angel Gabriel was sent by God to a town in Galilee called Nazareth, to a virgin engaged to a man whose name was Joseph, of the house of David. The virgin's name was Mary. And he came to her and said, 'Greetings, favored one! The Lord is with you.' But she was much perplexed by his words and pondered what sort of greeting this might be. The angel said to her, 'Do not be afraid, Mary, for you have found favor with God. And now, you will conceive in your womb and bear a son, and you will name Him, Jesus. He will be great, and will be called Son of the Most High, and the Lord God will give to Him the throne of His ancestor David. He will reign over the house of Jacob forever, and of His kingdom there will be no end." (Luke 1:26-33)

We reflect upon these words of Holy Scripture each and every time we gather in honor of Mary, the Mother of God. These words are so very important since they are the inauguration of presence of our Lord Jesus Christ with us, His people. So they also serve as a connection to all else that we encounter during the rest of our liturgical year, especially the seasons of Lent and Easter. The prayer that we say as a part of the Marian Devotions, the prayer which is also said daily at the Angelus, helps us to make the connection. "O Lord, we ask You, pour forth Your grace into our hearts, that we, to whom the Incarnation of Christ, Your Son, was made known by the message of an angel, may by His passion and Cross, be brought to the glory of His Resurrection. We ask this through Jesus Christ, our Lord. Amen."

As we reflect on what we pray, we say that the message of an angel was given, not only to Mary, but rather through her it was given to all of us. So therefore we must examine this passage and seek to apply it to our own journey of faith. The passage begins with the angel coming to Mary with words of greeting and announces that the 'Lord is with her.' This greeting reminds us as well that we are invited into and to partake of the fellowship of Almighty God. We are invited to bear forth the presence of Christ into the world, just as Mary did. Certainly not in a physical sense as she did, but rather in a spiritual sense to bear forth the presence of Christ, in our worship of Almighty God, in our fellowship of one Christian to another, in our teaching of others to follow Jesus, in our work to build up the kingdom of God.

When Mary is perplexed concerning the angels greeting, the angel answers her with the words, "Do not (Continued on Page 3.)

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
(Mary, Our Mother and Our Example - Continued from Page 1.) be afraid.' These too are important words which are heard many times throughout the pages of Scripture. While we may not consider them of great importance, they surely are, since quite a lot of our actions and thoughts that turn us away from God come about in response to fear. We are afraid of what might happen if we follow God instead of those around us; we are afraid of what other people will think; we are afraid that things will be out of our control, and many other fears besides. Through the message of the angel, God tells us, that when we place everything in His hands, there is no reason to be afraid, since He is in control. This does not mean that everything will go exactly right. It does not mean that everything will be easy. But it does means that God is trustworthy, and when we place our trust in Him, we are standing on solid ground.

The angel then goes on to explain at length that the Son of God, our Lord and Savior Jesus Christ will be conceived in her womb and will be born for all humanity. The angel confirms his announcement in several phrases, "Jesus: will be great; will be called Son of the Most High; will be given the throne of David; will reign over the house of Jacob; will have an everlasting kingdom." In and through this we are reminded that we, as weak and sinful humans, need continual support and reminders from God concerning our forgiveness, and especially our high calling to ioin with Jesus in building the kingdom of God. Hearing the message only once, or only on infrequent occasions, is not enough. We need continual support. This also reminds us that our religious practices must be continuous as well. We must gather weekly to worship God and receive His Son in Holy Communion; we must pray daily to receive the strength and counsel of God in our lives.

Mary is then again perplexed how all of this will happen and the angel explains, "The Holy Spirit will come upon you, and the power of the Most High will overshadow you; therefore the child to be born will be holy; He will be called Son of God." (Luke 1:35) This reminds us that if we place ourselves in the presence of Almighty God, He will come to us and lead us in the right direction. He will bring to us the answers that we need when we strive to always place ourselves before Him in worship and in prayer.

Lastly we come to the high point of this encounter. Mary's response to the angel, "Then Mary said, 'Here am I, the servant of the Lord; let it be with me according to your word." (Luke 1:38) This is Mary's "yes" to God. It is our ultimate example of cooperation of the divine and the human to accomplish God's work in the world. In our reflection on this entire passage and especially during this month of May as we reflect on the role of Mary within our faith journey, this "yes" of Mary must be an example for us and point us to assert the same "yes" within our own lives. We are challenged to examine where we can give a further "yes" to God in every aspect of our lives. God desires that we worship Him in our life of personal prayer and weekly worship. Will we say "yes" to God? Especially during this Easter season, we hear the call of Jesus to follow Him in His risen life. Do we say "yes" to this call? We are called to seek to cast aside the sins in our lives and seek forgiveness in the Sacrament of Penance. Will we say "yes" to God's forgiveness extended in this Sacrament? We are called to show love, compassion and mercy to each other in our daily journey of life. Will we say "yes" to following this way of Jesus in the world?

As we continue on in prayer and devotions in honor of the Blessed Virgin Mary during this month of May, as we continue to pray the 'Hail Mary' throughout our life of prayer, let us contemplate Mary's 'yes' to God. And let her be truly our mother and our example to say 'yes' to God as well.

Scripture: John 6 (Bread of Life Discourse); Luke 1:36; John 1:14

Reflection and Action Item:

The Blessed Virgin Mary gave her consent to God through the Archangel Gabriel: "Behold I am the servant of the Lord, be it done unto me according to your word." Then, "The word became flesh and dwelt among us." Mary's yes to God resulting in receiving Jesus into her heart, mind, body and soul and we receive Jesus in our hearts, minds, bodies and souls in receiving Holy Communion and adoring his presence in the Most Blessed Sacrament of the Altar.

From PNCC Prayer Book:

Make our dear Lord in the Blessed Sacrament your constant thought; remember that He is your friend; tell Him all your sorrows; go often in the week, if only for a few minutes, to relieve your mind in trouble, and you will find that the hardest trials will seem to pass away in a moment. Go to Him always, you will wonder at the fullness of the comfort and support which you will receive, and at the clearness of the answers that will come in time of doubt. Place your cares into the hands of Jesus in the Blessed Sacrament, and they will become light, very light.

Bearing Hope

"Then he prayed, 'O LORD, open his eyes, that he may see.' And the LORD opened the eyes of the servant, and he saw that the mountainside was filled with fiery chariots and horses around Elisha." (2 Kings 6:17 [NAB])

I think we have all faced a struggle in life before that we felt was hopeless. In the above Scripture, the servant of Elisha was gripped with fear when he saw that horses and chariots sent from the King of Aram had surrounded the city searching for Elisha because his prophecies continually thwarted their attacks against the King of Israel. Elisha should have been terrified, but he was not afraid, he knew that he had a much greater army on his side because of his relationship with the Lord.

I needed the Mass this Easter Sunday, more than ever. I received devastating news six days before about an estranged dearly beloved family member. In the years since we parted ways, they have fallen profoundly away from God to a degree I would have never considered fathomable. I was attending university at the time and had to maintain my composure for hours. When I finally made it out to the privacy of my car, all the strength I could muster was to send out prayer requests to my most trusted intercessors and break down weeping.

... But none of my classmates knew. No one knew I was breaking inside that day.

Eventually I made it through. I entrusted their soul to the Mother of God, consigned myself to devote my sufferings and my prayers on their behalf, and set my face upon trusting God for their redemption.

But what about those who don't have our hope?

This was the thought that came to me in the Mass after receiving the Eucharist. How many times do we pass by people we know, and they are breaking inside, and we have absolutely no idea? Where do they go when they break down alone, and they have no one to pray for them? What do they do if they don't have the Lord, or a loving Church family, or trusted friends they can confide in for prayer? This is what came to me in the Mass. We are bearers of hope. We are a family. The Church is a living body, with access to real power from God, and real hope for salvation.

Elisha prayed so that his servant would see the vast resources they had available for their protection. He prayed so his servant would have hope.

I have hope because I belong to a living God, I am a member of the Polish National Catholic Church, I have trusted brothers and sisters in Christ to pray for me, and my God is more than capable of standing by me to strengthen me through any tragedy that comes before me in life.

Share your hope. Bear your hope to another. Ask them how you can pray for them or their family.

Invite them to Church.

Start praying for them now, entrusting them to the Holy Mother. Pray she will help lead them to her Son Jesus Christ. Do anything and everything you can to let them know there is hope available, and that hope is living in you.

I leave you with the comforting words of Saint Peter, which have resounded strongly within my heart.

"... Always be ready to give an explanation to anyone who asks you for a reason for your hope." (1 Peter 3:115 [NAB])




Loving God, we thank you for the love of the mothers you have given us, whose love is so precious that it can never be measured, whose patience seems to have no end.

Intercommunion Between the Episcopal Church and the Polish National Catholic Church

Some years ago the Church received a question by a student at the Episcopal Seminary located in New York City about the minutes of the Intercommunion meetings between the Episcopal Church and the Polish National Catholic Church. He said that he was unable to find them in Episcopal Church Archives and asked whether our Archives had a copy. Unfortunately, none could be found at the Polish National Catholic Church Archives at that time.

Consequently, I was very happy to see the publication of this book by Project Canterbury. It was compiled by Richard J. Marmara, Jr., an Episcopalian Priest of the Diocese of New York; Rev. Warren C, Platt, wrote an introduction. This book has a wealth of information about fourteen (14) Intercommunion Commission meetings. The fourteen (14) meetings were: (1) June 27, 1947; (2) January 14, 1948; (3) October 27, 1948; (4) April 20, 1950; (5) November 14-15, 1951; (6) November 20, 1952; (7) June 7, 1966; (8) November 20, 1956; (9) November 19, 1957; (10) November 9-10, 1958; (11) April 24-25, 1967; (12) January 7, 1976; (13) April 8-9, 1976; (14) June 1-2, 1976. The meetings alternated between Episcopal Church locations and Polish National Catholic Church locations. Meeting number 1 was held in Albany, New York; numbers 2, 7 and 9 were held in Buffalo, New York; number 3 in Pittsburgh, Pennsylvania; number 4 in Chicago, Illinois; number 5 in Greenwich, Connecticut; numbers 6, 8 and 12 in Scranton, Pennsylvania; number 10 in Toronto, Canada; numbers 11 and 13 in Wilkes-Barre, Pennsylvania; and number 14 in Mountain Top, Pennsylvania.

The book starts with a twenty-three page survey of the development of the intercommunion discussions between the Episcopal Church and the Polish National Catholic Church written by the Rev. Dr. Warren C. Platt. It was originally published in *Internationale Kirchliche Zietschrift* number 82 in 1992.

The three points in the Bonn Agreement of July 2, 1931 concerning intercommunion between the Anglican Church and the Old Catholic Churches

"1. Each communion recognizes the catholicity and independence of the other and maintain its own, 2. Each communion agrees to admit members of the other communion to participate in the sacraments. 3. Intercommunion does not require from either communion the acceptance of all doctrinal opinion, sacramental devotion or liturgical practice characteristic of the other, but implies that each believes the other to hold all the essentials of the Christian Faith."

Bishop Valentine Gawrychowski and Bishop Jan Jasinski attended the Old Catholic Synod which approved Intercommunion with the Anglicans. The seventh General Synod of the Polish National Catholic Church voted unanimously in favor of Intercommunion with the Church of England and the Anglican Church.

Committees were established by both churches; their first joint meeting was held in Albany, New York on June 27, 1947. It was agreed that the reports of the meetings would be in both Polish and English. The statement of the Polish National Catholic Church Intercommunion Commission was discussed and accepted by the meeting attendees. It said

"In this closer relationship of the Polish National Catholic Church to the Episcopal Church and vise versa, we feel that it is necessary to proceed gradually and slowly, and that the clergy of both churches should strive for a full understanding of the principles and rules of intercommunion, and through this understanding bring both churches a positive benefit and a firm faith in the Christian Church."

At the second meeting held in Buffalo, New York on January 14, 1948, a practical issue was discussed, that of the differences in the reception of Holy Communion and confession prior to. At the third meeting held in Pittsburgh, Pennsylvania on October 27, 1948, reception of the Eucharist by members of one body while communicating at a church of the other body were agreed to.

The fifth meeting, held in Greenwich, Connecticut on November 14-15, 1961 concerned the celebration of Mass. "This meeting noted that inter-celebration really meant the celebration by a priest of one church at the altar of the other church and using the liturgy of the other church." Regulations were then agreed to define the practice. The eighth meeting held in Scranton, Pennsylvania on November 20, 1956 expanded the regulations to include all sacramental ministrations. The regulations were modified to permit a Bishop of one denomination to administer any sacrament according to the rite and liturgy of either church. Bishop Thaddeus Zielinski ordained a priest and five deacons for the Episcopal Diocese of Western New York on June 29, 1958 using the ordinal of Common Prayer of the Episcopal Church. On September 6, 1955, the General Synod of the Episcopal Church of Canada resolved unanimously:

"That this General Synod agrees to the establishment of intercommunion between the Anglican Church of

Canada and the Polish National Catholic Church of America, and that this Synod appoint a Committee on Intercommunion to confer with a similar committee of the Polish National Church on questions arising from this new relationship as soon as it is formally acknowledged by the Polish National Catholic Church of America."

The Supreme Council responded favorably to this initiative of the Episcopal Church of Canada on December 14, 1955. This was ratified by the tenth General Synod held in Chicago, Illinois in July 1958. Proclamations were made by the primates of each church at a service held in the Anglican Cathedral of St. James, Toronto, Canada on November, 9, 1958.

The Anglican Church of Canada began to send representatives to the joint meetings. The tenth meeting of the intercommunion committees as held on November 9-10, 1958 in Toronto, Canada. The topic discussed the meaning of intercommunion and full communion.

The 11th meeting was held at Kirby House in Wilkes-Barre, Pennsylvania on April 23-25, 1967. The theme of this meeting was "Ecumenism and the development of the Bond Between Our Two Churches".

Bishop Scaife spoke about the status of the discussions between the Episcopal Church and the Orthodox Church. Father Nieminski talked about the Polish National Catholic Church and its Missionary activities in Poland.

Prime Bishop Thaddeus Zielinski and Presiding Bishop of the Episcopal Church John F. Allin met in Scranton, Pennsylvania on January 7, 1976 to discuss the possible ordination of women by the Episcopal Church. Also discussed at the meeting was the reception of Holy Communion by members of one church in the other.

After the vote in the Episcopal Churches General Convention to ordain women to the priesthood and episcopate in 1976, Prime Bishop Thaddeus Zielinski suspended sacramental intercommunion. The International Catholic Bishops Conference (OCBC) on September 17, 1976 issued a declaration rejecting the ordination of Women to the major orders of the Church. The OCBC also said,

"The churches which has preserved continuity with the ancient undivided Church and its sacramental ministerial order, should jointly discuss this question as sacramental ordination of Women, being fully aware of eventual consequences resulting from unilateral decisions."

The 12th meeting was held in Scranton, Pennsylvania

on January 7, 1976. The principal discussion was on the ordination of women by the Episcopal Church. Part of this discussion was the topic of the Polish National Catholic Church as a haven for Episcopalians who are unhappy with changes in their church. Prime Bishop Thaddeus Zielinski explained the reception of a parish in South Carolina and the conditional ordination of Rev. Robin Conners, its pastor. He appointed a committee of five bishops and priests to continue to discuss inter-church relations.

The 13th meeting was held at Kirby House in Wilkes -Barre, Pennsylvania on April 8-9, 1976. The meeting began with a discussion about the Philippine Independent Catholic Church; they also have concerns about the ordination of women. Bishop Anthony Rysz celebrated Mass using the rite of the Polish National Catholic Church. A statement was prepared related to point #3 of the Bonn Agreement.

"Since each communion does not require acceptance of all doctrinal opinion or liturgical practices of the other Communion, should a church of the Anglican Communion by its processes of legislation authorize the ordination of women to the diaconate, priesthood, or episcopate and thereby hold a doctrinal opinion different from that of the Polish National Catholic Church. It is the point of the Bonn Agreement which has been of concern in these situations.

The 14th meeting was held in Mountain Top, Pennsylvania on June 1-2, 1976. There were four sessions at this meeting. The primary topic of the first was the ordination of women by the Episcopal Church. Prime Bishop Zielinski was concerned about how this would be viewed by the Old Catholic Church; presumably this will be clarified at the September International Bishops Conference to be held in Vienna, Austria.

In Session 2, Bishop Reed, Episcopal Church, proposed a paper titled Proposed Regulations For Intercommunion. It had the following sections: Introduction; 1. Sacramental Administrations; 2. Function of Clergy in each other's Church; 3. Transfer of Membership. A. Lay, b. Clergy; 4. Discipline; 5. Marriages between members of the two Churches; 6. Relations between Clergy and Parishes. Bishop Say was to prepare the Introduction and the others were to be prepared by small groups after discussing sections 1, 2, 3 and 6.

Session 3 was comprised of discussing the statements prepared by the small groups for sections 1, 2, and 3a. In Session 4, the discussions continued about the statements prepared on sections 3a, 3b and 6. It was

announced that the official church newspapers were being sent to all members and alternates of the Intercommunion Commissions, the Episcopalian to Polish National Catholic Church members and God's Field to Episcopalian members. A Paper identified as the "Intercommunion between the Episcopal Church and the Polish National Catholic Church being the recommended guidelines for relations between the two Churches prepared by the joint Intercommunion Commission named by the Prime Bishop and the Presiding Bishop Drafted June 1-2, 1976 at Kirby Episcopal House, Mountain Top, Pennsylvania." It included five of the six topics listed under the Proposed Regulations For Intercommunion; Discipline (#4) was given as pending.

The decision of the Episcopal Church to ordain women led to the termination of the work of the Polish National Catholic Church - Episcopal Church Intercommunion Commission on October 29, 1976. The Old Catholic Bishop's Conference (OCBC) at its meeting on May7-9, 1978 said that "Bishops of the Union of Utrecht will in the future not take part in consecrations in those churches or dioceses of the Anglican Communion, which accept the ordination of women." The 15th General Synod of the Polish National Catholic Church voted to terminate sacramental intercommunion with the Episcopal Church and the Anglican Church of Canada.

A fifteenth meeting was agreed to be held in Toronto, Canada; however, it did not happen. The fourteenth was the last meeting.

This book includes much information about this joint venture. The names of the attendees, chairmen and secretaries for each meeting are given. The locations of each meeting are noted. The agreed to actions are given.

Reading these minutes leads to numerous questions. The minutes were to be kept in both English and Polish; however the Polish editions are yet to be found. It would be most interesting to compare the two versions. It also would be of interest to find out why the 15th scheduled meeting never occurred. How were the meetings reported by the media? Did any secretary keep notes from which the official minutes were prepared? Why was Discipline left unaddressed in the recommended guidelines? Did any participants in the discussions to formulate the six topics keep notes?

If you are at all interested in intercommunion activities, you should buy this book and read it at least twice.



The Easter Bunny visited the parish children.



New Bedford and Fall River are rallying to aid Ukraine. Here's how you can help. Matthew Ferreira — The Herald News, Fall River, MA, March 17, 2022

NEW BEDFORD — As saddened as he is by the tragic current events unfolding in Ukraine since Russia's invasion, the Rev. Rob Nemkovich of Blessed Trinity Parish in Fall River says it's hard not to be inspired by the response he's been witnessing on the South Coast.

"It's one thing to feel bad, but it's another to actually get out and do something," Nemkovich said referring to local efforts to help those displaced or otherwise impacted by the war with Russia. "Right now, we're seeing that people want to do something."

Local church bridges Fall River, Poland

On Sunday, Nemkovich will be presenting his congregation and community members with the opportunity to send support by contributing funds that will be wired the very next day directly to St. Barbara's, Blessed Trinity's sister parish in southern Poland. Nemkovich has been in contact with the parish since the war started last month and says their facilities have been "transformed" into a shelter for refugees who fled Ukraine.

"The team there is working extremely hard to do everything they can, so any money contributed is going directly to the boots on the ground; those who are face-to-face with the people who are coming out of these horrific situations and desperately need this help," Nemkovich said. "I talk to the priest there. They're just heart-broken at the things they're seeing. It's a shell-shock."

Nemkovich said shelter organizers from the parish will use funds wired from Fall River on Monday to continue buying much-needed supplies which are made available for refugees to browse through and collect in bags that the shelter provides. Those who wish to contribute to the fund may do so by bringing cash or check (made payable to cash) in-person to Blessed Trinity Parish, 1340 Plymouth Ave., Fall River, between 8 and 9:30 a.m.

The congregation at Blessed Trinity — which is a parish of the Polish National Catholic Church — also has a number of members with personal ties to Poland who are "helping out in a variety of ways" on their own, noted Nemkovich, who has visited the country three times.

For those who don't have cash or check handy, there's another locally-based platform set up to send monetary support to those in need from the war. Last week, United Way of Greater Fall River set up the #UnitedForUkraine Fund. It is the local branch's own online fundraising platform where donors — local or not — can send money electronically. Not unlike the above-mentioned church efforts, branch Executive Director Kim Smith says the funds will go into the hands of those working directly with refugees.

"United Way has branches in the places that the refugees are going to, so this will really help them fill the needs that they're seeing as they're on the ground working with people," said Smith.

With memories of COVID-19's sudden outbreak in 2020 still fresh in mind, Smith says she hopes the exposure United Way gained through its pandemic-related fundraising efforts will bolster the current #UnitedForUkraine initiative.

"When the war started, we had a lot of calls coming in with inquiries on what people could do to help, and I think a lot of the reason people turned right to us for that information is the result of the work we did during COVID," Smith said. "We raised over a million dollars in local response funds and more people started getting to know us as a trusted source for directing resources where they're going to have the most impact."

Local Polish Church Helping Ukrainian Refugees

A local Polish Catholic Church is doing what they can to help Ukrainian refugees fleeing their war-torn country to Poland for safety. St. Mary's Parish of the Polish National Catholic Church has teamed up with their sister parishes near the Polish border with Ukraine to help get essential items to refugees trying to escape their war-torn country.

"Our presiding bishop who is in Scranton, PA, sent out a letter a couple weeks ago and he was encouraging prayers and support and he said for those who are able if we could raise monetary contributions to be sent there," said Rev. Charles Zawistowski, the Pastor of St. Mary Parish.

Rev. Charles Zawistowski has been running the church for nearly three decades and said the devastation in Ukraine ignited action from his parish here at home.

"We're probably one of the smaller congregations in South Bend and yet just last week we've collected close to \$1,000 within our parish," he added. "We have two parishes in Poland that are in South Poland so they are right there where the need is."

The century-old church has a long-standing partnership with several sister parishes in Poland, where more than two million Ukrainians have fled to avoid the Russian invasion and ongoing bombardment of certain cities.

Which is why Rev. Charles said there was no hesitation when the time came to mobilize help.

"Everything is already established so we already have the apparatus so this an easy thing for us to do to raise the cash and send it to them so that they can disperse it."

The church said they will be wiring all donations directly to their sister parishes in Poland so that they can purchase necessary supplies there.

Clergy Appreciation Weekend June 4-5, 2022
