

Page 15 - Important Info, What's New For 2015 When the "Thompson/Chastain/Lovett' jam sessions proved to be such a success, it was rather inevitable that somebody would ramp up the fun and turn it into a real show. That person was RC Vance. Although I never heard him play a lick, I understand from many of You whom I spoke to that he was a man who could "get it done"!

It was an era of good Bluegrass Music that was really still considered part of Country Music, so the two genres of music clung to each other on stage and off. It was a time when hats were worn by many of the musicians and audience alike. It was a time when cowboy shirts and string ties were the dress of the time.....or if you were part of the "outlaw fringe", you wore the funniest beat up head cover you could find. (See the photos with this article and find a picture of the great banjo player Dennis Hensley.) If Dennis still has that "lid", it should be part of the N. KY Bluegrass/Country Hall of Fame. [Speaking of that, when are we going to recognize some of the greats from our area who have contributed so much and need to be remembered for the legacy they have created? Hmmm. I digress, but that's how ideas get turned into actions.]

The resulting Jamboree was held in a block building in Boone Co., 4 miles south of

Burlington, which now houses the Boone Co. Water Rescue equipment. The Jamboree lasted for 8 years until RC became too ill with diabetes to carry on. It takes a strong personality and good management for anything like this to go on that long. It also took a lot of good folks who were bent on having a good time every Friday night. It seemed at that time the dancers, the performers and the beloved patrons, who just loved the music, were a part of the show.It all worked around the lights of the stage and the sound made on a wood dance floor. I am told the floor wound up in the basement of the home the Vance family owns on Burlington Pike. I find it particularly interesting that the Buick Dealership just down the road held quite a jam session years later run by Gene Thompson and the elusive Ron Cornett. We will be doing an article soon about that and the move to Willis Music that has kept the music alive. Please look in your albums and computers for pictures of jams at the dealership and if you have some from Willis, we need them too.

Please take a special look at the photos on the next couple pages as many of the participants are not around anymore. If you know them, let's get them identified for future reference. Some of the pictures are from events other than the Jamboree, but

were happening simultaneously. A lot of people making a lot of music! I thank two gentlemen that have contributed so much to this article. Tom Bushelman Senior and "Trooper Bob Williams. Their photos and memories have made this a great fun trip through memory lane. There is more to this story and Jerry Schrepfer is providing the anecdotes that follow. In case you don't know who he is, please know, Jerry took over for Pam Messer who did a great job, until time constraints got to her, in publishing the News for NKBMA. Jerry and I spoke in his office very candidly at how much we are both learning about the people of our area who have contributed to the music. At this time I will let him share from that meeting and invite all who read this article to chime in to either of us. That way we'll have even more to share in the future. Thanks Ron. I moved into the N. KY area in 1980, heard Bluegrass Music for the first time at the Ground Round and was hooked on the sound of the banjo and the beat of the bass. Through our children I met Tom Bushelman, Sr. and quickly realized this man would become a friend for life. His love for all things music, in particular Country and Bluegrass was the bond between us.

If you remember the Florence Y'All Festivals on Main St., you remember some all volunteer live TV coverage of the event. Now Tom was a real believer in stage etiquette, but it seems that every time the banjo or mandolin took a break the amateur camera crew would cut to the woman in the front row eating a hot dog! This upset Tom who wanted to see close-ups of hands and fingers, and headstocks and such. It just so happened that the TV broadcast was produced by his brother, Ted Bushelman (of CVG airport fame). So after throwing a shoe at the TV he called his brother and gave him an earful......

That's when I really stepped into something that changed my life forever. It seems Ted told Tom something to the effect that if you know so much get your rear end down here! Tom immediately called me and asked if I knew how to run a TV camera. Even though I said no, Tom came by in a couple of minutes and we were off to the Festival. Not only did I learn the camera but Tom soon taught me how to read the body language of the band, anticipate the next instrument to take a break and switch to that in time with the music, get close up shoots of the skill of the musician and fully understand the genre called Bluegrass. Playing

music with Tom and learning to produce TV shows with his brother Ted dominated my hobbies for the next 25 years.

Tom Bushelman was the mentor for many of us in the late 80s and early 90s. He shared his experiences playing with some of the local bands and his love for the music of Monroe and Scruggs. But he was never satisfied with the conventional. He dabbled in lutherie and his creations were not your standard items. His basement is full of instruments with a twist. A guitar with a 5 string banjo neck, a banjo made from a stainless steel bedpan, a guitar with a toilet seat around the sound hole (his sitar) a 12 string 'dobro'....you get the point....

Tom was never in agreement with the so-called experts regarding the resonator guitar and their claims regarding the importance of wood and sound holes and such. To prove them wrong, he bought a bag of popsicle sticks from the local craft store, made a concave cut in one end of some of them and laid them out like a miniature wood floor gluing them together to form a sheet of wood sufficient to create a guitar top. Using a planer he achieved the correct thickness for the standard resonator top. Using this for the top, creating good framing and constructing sides of vertical pieces of popsicle stick, he connected a maple neck, cut the hole and attached a spruce bottom.

His contention was that the sound depended upon the resonator and spider assembly that transmit sound to the sound board bottom from the neck and strings. The top



and sides make little difference. The final creation is pictured here. It is the greatest sounding 'dobro' you will ever hear. Rich tones and loud. Proved his point.

Today this special instrument bears the signatures of many of the genres greatest names and is displayed in a glass case in his living room.



BILL KEITH BANJO SUMMIT

Bela Fleck and Tony Trischka join Bill Keith on Stage as reported by Jerry Schrepfer

A BILL KEITH Banjo Summit was one of the highlights of this year's Grey Fox Festival. As if this "Triple Crown of Banjo" wasn't enough, joining them on stage to honor the music and enormous influence of Bill Keith was the award-winning Noam Pikelny, Eric Weissberg, Mike Munford, Marc Horowitz, Mike Kropp and Ryan Cavanaugh. During the 90 minute gathering each had an opportunity to thank Bill for the tremendous influence they felt he had on their music and banjo players everywhere. Each demonstrated to the huge crowd at the Creekside Stage some of Bill's music and style that fueled their careers and passion for the banjo..

Banjoist extraordinaire **Bill Keith** is one of just a handful of musicians to have a whole style named after him. The 'Keith Style' was the catalyst that spawned new generations of envelope pushers such as Tony Trischka, Bela Fleck and Noam Pikelny. Bill's career includes working with The Jim Kweskin Jugband, Jim Rooney, Red Allen & Frank Wakefield, Judy Collins, Clarence White, Richard Greene and David Grisman. His 1963 Decca recordings with Bill Monroe & The Blue Grass Boys introduced his innovations to a world audience. Bill actually wrote all the tab found in the Earl Scruggs banjo instruction book. Last October, IBMA honored Bill with a richly deserved **Distinguished Achievement Award.**



Wearing a gray Keith Banjo Tuners jacket and a black NY Banjo cap, the "Banjo Jedi Master" as Ryan Cavanaugh calls him, took

his seat on the right end of the stage. Too frail to bring a banjo on stage and play anymore, he listened along with the audience from the best seat in the house to the music he made popular being played by some of the best banjo instrumentalists on the planet. The 'Keith Style' of playing was born when Bill recorded '*Devil's Dream*'. Tony Trischka asked Bill to comment on the song and Bill replied, "I first heard this tune played by a Nova Scotian fiddler and it just dawned on me, I could see in my mind how to play it in the melodic style. Fortunately, it was a simple tune because if it were anything more complicated, it might not have happened."

A conversation ensued between Tony and Bela Fleck about the difference between the Scruggs style and the method Bill created using scales to create melodies and suddenly the banjo could be used to play fiddle tunes. Bill expanded the approach by adding jazz chords and enchanting melodic effects.

Bela then played 'Devils Dream and Sailor's Hornpipe for the gathering to demonstrate the style. At this point a greeting from Steve Martin, another banjoist, actor, and comedian not in attendance was read:

"There is Pete Seeger, there is Earl Scruggs, and there is Bill Keith. They are the towering founders of modern banjo playing"

And another from Murphy Henry: "It's not only the men who have been influenced by Bill Keith," wrote Murphy. "I am just one of the many female banjo players who owes a great deal to the musical prowess of this master of the five-string. Bill Keith was my door into Scruggs style of banjo playing. As a newbie, I didn't yet know about Bill, but I had the Earl Scruggs banjo book. Knowing just enough about reading music to hurt my playing, I found I could only make sense of the tabs by slowing down vinyl LPs of Earl's playing. I would figure out as much as I could then turn to Bill's immaculate tabs to see if I got it right. I trusted Bill's tabs with my entire banjo being. Later on I came to admire Bill's own playing. Much later I got to meet Bill and hear all about the circle of fifths. I always felt honored to be in his mighty presence, and I am with you all in spirit today"

After a few words about Keith, Noam Pikelny played 'Beating Around the Bush' written by Keith. "I haven't written a lot of music, but that's one of my favorites," Keith said after Pikelny finished.

Comments and tunes followed from Mike Munford, Mike Kropp, and Marc Horowitz. All honoring Bill and his varied influences on their careers.

As an inventor, Bill Keith made contributions to the mechanical side of the banjo by developing what is known as the Keith Banjo Tuner. These specially designed pegs allow banjo players to quickly and accurately change from one open tuning to another while playing. Bill's business venture, Beacon Banjo Company, based in Woodstock, NY., still offers them in their product lineup. Bela Fleck demonstrated the Keith Tuners by playing 'Katmandu'.

Ryan Cavanaugh, the young 'Luke of the Jedi Banjo World' told a story of how, at 17, he wandered into Bill's teepee campsite during a Winterhawk Bluegrass Festival, now known as Grey Fox. Ryan had never met Bill before and didn't recognize him. He sat down with his banjo and played with the man at the teepee for a couple of hours. "It was just me and Bill," Cavanaugh said. "I said, you know I should probably leave. Thanks for sitting here for like two hours and playing with me. Who are you, man? He's like I'm Bill Keith and I was like, 'Holy Shit! You're Bill Keith!' I hung out for another two hours and we've been friends ever since."

And to demonstrate how profound Bill's influence has been on young Ryan, he and Bela Fleck surprised Bill with a special rendition of 'Nola', one of Bill's favorites. To see and listen to the unbelievable banjo performances by these incredibly gifted artists search Utube for 'Bill Keith Banjo Tribute 2015'.


