## Susan Knight

Susan has worked in the district for 25 years and has been the manager for 16 years. They used to have a staff of 34 in 6 locations making 2,000 meals a day, but now have 75 staff members in 10 locations making up to 5,000 meals a day.

Breakfast always seems to serve about 500 kids total, the amount is between 6-7% of the kids in the district. The average of lunches they serve a day is 4800. Linn Grove serves an average of 400 a day and serves the most meals in the district (of Elementary Schools) 80% of our students eat school lunch, versus 65%-70% of the other schools.

Our kitchen makes all the meals in the kitchen and also makes meals for Wilkins who does not have a full kitchen, it is a satellite school. So in total our kitchen makes 700 meals a day. Only the new Elementary schools have a full kitchen to make meals in so they all make meals for the other schools.

The school lunches are not funded by district and there is no profit, they plan on breaking even. They watch expenses and budget their money. If they were to go negative the district would help out. It is funded by the price of meals and Government money, which is 1.2 million. That is \$950,000 given in cash and rest is used to purchase chicken and other items needed.

\$85,000 of the Fed money is spent on fresh produce and \$85,000 is spent out of pocket for fresh produce as well. We are in a buying Co-op which includes 22 other districts in Iowa, it helps keep costs low.

They will be rotating in some seasonal favorites coming up like soup, chili, turkey with potatoes and gravy!

Lion Cub Meal has been a HUGE hit, bigger than they even thought it would be. It's a great option for those kids who don't eat meat. Smaller kids like the small bites as well and it seems that if the kids don't like the other 2 options they go for the Lion Cub Meal as a backup.


The next page is about the Healthy Hunger Free Kids Act on what requirements they have to go by per the Federal Government. If we did not want to follow it we would lose the 1.2 million in funding. To make up for it prices would go up. It is recommended lunch costs go up \$0.10 each year; we have been given a waiver for 3 years so ours does not need to go up as we have a surplus of money to use so there is no reason to raise costs currently.

After they meet all requirements by the Government they need to look at what kids will eat, what they like and also what they can make 700 of, ship 300 of them to another school who can serve it as is. So even though there are things they wish they could make (egg casseroles) they would not travel and serve well when it gets to Wilkins. There is a lot more to think about than what tastes good and is good for the kids. Susan even said she wishes there was less processed food they use, but with some of the requirements and transport it doesn't work.

Anytime you have questions please do not hesitate to call or email Susan. After everything she spoke about for 45 min with the PTO members we all agreed we are glad we are not the ones who have to figure out school lunches, and that is just for the elementary schools.

# Healthy Hunger Free Kids Act



### USDA Criteria for Meal Planning at Lunch, Grades K-5

Fruit: Minimum ½ cup offered daily

Vegetables: Minimum of ¾ cup offered daily. Vegetables are broken down into dark green, red/orange, beans/peas, starchy and other. Weekly minimums are in place for each category.

Students are required to select ½ cup fruit or vegetable

**Grains**: 1 ounce offered daily. All grains must be whole grain rich. Minimum of 8 oz. offered per week.

Meat/meat alternate: 1 ounce offered daily. Minimum of 8 oz. offered per week.

Fluid milk: 1 cup offered daily. Milk must be skim or 1%. Flavored milk must be fat-free. (For students with lactose intolerances or allergies, milk substitutes must be nutritionally equivalent to dairy milk.)

Calories: Daily average over one week required to be between 550-650 calories

Saturated fat: Daily average over one week required to be less than 10% per week

Sodium: Daily average over one week required to be less than 1,230 mg per week

2017/18: Less than 935 mg per week; 2022-23: Less than 640 mg per week
