#### Growing God's Kingdom in a Material World Series - Growing the Stewardship Garden, Fr. John Weckend

The analogy of comparing the various plots of a garden to different ways in which stewardship applies to many facets of our everyday lives was first introduced to me a number of years ago in a talk given by Robert Morneau, retired auxiliary bishop of Green Bay Wisconsin. What I would like to do in this presentation is to expand on that analogy and explore 12 areas relating to stewardship that might be a little surprising. (12-Part Series continued in coming weeks):

#### 8. Our Historical Garden

The Bible, for example, relates stories of our ancestors in the Faith and of their relationship with the Creator. Wisdom is gleaned from these stories and experiences which have been handed down in various forms from generation to generation. Good stewardship involves knowing and cherishing these traditions and being able to pass them down to those who come after us. Ignorance of our ancestry whether, biblical, familial or cultural can often lead to false assumptions in dealing with current issues. Our relationship with the indigenous people of our country is a good example of this. Stories emanating from First Nations sources have assisted me personally in a better and fuller understanding of our Canadian society. Cherishing and preserving our cultural traditions and heritage is something entrusted to each generation and that includes you and me. It's a plot in our Life Garden worth visiting again and again. 'Lest we forget'.

#### July 26, 2020 - 17th Sunday in Ordinary Time – Stewardship Message

# Should we send our child to a Catholic school? Luckily, we can afford it. But what are the advantages?

# Wising Up

There are various kinds of wisdom: the kind you get by watching carefully to discover how something works, or by learning from a mistake; the wisdom in taking advice from someone and not making the mistake he made; the political, social, or religious wisdom learned by those who work in these vocations. There is also wisdom that is just beyond our reach, the kind that is found only in God.

This Sunday's readings discuss various kinds of wisdom. King Solomon asks for "a listening heart" (1 Kings 3:9), the knowledge needed to rule his people wisely. He is told he can ask for anything: long life, riches, security from his enemies, all blessings that would certainly benefit him. Instead he asks for something to benefit his people. It seems he is wise enough to know he needs such wisdom. The psalm response praises the law, the religious tradition that provides instruction for living a life of holiness and thus reaping the rewards of such a life.

The parable in the Gospel describes various life situations in which decisions have to be made. In the first two instances, a question is posed: What is the kingdom of heaven worth to you? What are you willing to give up in order to attain it? The third depicts fishing with a net, a very strenuous task. A question here might be: Are you willing to work hard at this? Are you discerning in separating good actions from bad? It takes real wisdom to answer such questions. —Sr. Dianne Bergant, CSA
