Whoever wants to become great among you must be your servant

The Scripture readings of this Sunday introduce us to a new vision of leadership which focuses not on the leader but on those he or she serves. A leader is no longer at the centre and at the service of others but others at the service of a leader. This leadership style is called Servant leadership. To help us better understand it, let me share with you a story which involved a corporal and the first president of America. During the American Revolution, a man in civilian clothes rode past a group of soldiers who were busy pulling out a horse carriage stuck in deep mud. Their officer was shouting instructions to them while making no attempt to help. The stranger who witnessed the scene asked the officer why he wasn't helping. With great anger and dignity, the officer replied, "Sir, I am a Corporal!" The stranger dismounted from his horse and proceeded to help the exhausted soldiers himself. When the job was completed, he turned to the corporal and said, "Mr. Corporal, next time you have a job like this and don't have enough men to do it, inform your commander-in-chief, and I will come and help you again." Too late, the proud Corporal recognized General Washington.

The Corporal is an example of the world's leadership style. He wanted to be at the centre and the service of others. General Washington, on the other hand, is an example of the servant leadership. He understood that those who aspire to greatness or rank first among others must serve the needs of all. Helping the soldiers pushing the horse carriage stuck in the mud was his opportunity to demonstrate servant leadership. Where did Washington learn such leadership skills? Surely, he learned from these words of Jesus: "Whoever wants to become great among you must be your servant."

Jesus spoke these words to His disciples, especially, James and John who were seeking an assurance from Jesus that they will be the first- and second-in-command in the coming Messianic Kingdom of God. Both aimed at the seats on the right and left sides of Jesus for they have ambition for positions of power and prestige. Other disciples also had the same ambition as they showed indignance to James and John. Correcting their wrong understanding of leadership, Jesus warned them of the dark side of the world leadership. He said, "You know that among the pagans their so-called rulers lord it over them, and their great men make their authority felt. This is not to happen among you. No..." He then taught them the true leadership. He said, "...anyone who wants to become great among you must be your servant, and anyone who wants to be first among you must be slave to all." At the end, Jesus presented Himself as a perfect model of the servant leadership. He said, "The Son of Man did not come to be served but to serve, and to give His life as a ransom for many." Jesus was true to his words when He gave his own life in loving service of others. With great humility He suffered the tragic death on the cross. And the fruit of His service is the salvation for all.

How about us? Like George Washington, we are invited to offer our lives in loving service of others. Our service to others, however, demands suffering for it is impossible to serve others without some personal sacrifice. Suffering and service go hand in hand. It is understood, then, why Jesus asked James and John "Can you drink the cup that I must drink, or be baptised with the baptism with which I must be baptised?" The cup and the baptism are symbols of sacrifice or suffering that we accept when we offer our loving service to others. We pray that we may have the courage and confidence of James and John to answer:
"Yes, we can."

Working With Children Checks (WWCC):

It is a requirement of the Catholic Archdiocese of Melbourne that all clergy, employees and volunteers over the age of 18 are required to maintain a current Working With Children Check throughout their involvement in parishes, Agencies and entities. This is to ensure that we all stand united in creating safe environments for children and young people. The application process can be commenced online and finalised at a participating Australian Post Office. While most of our frequent volunteers already hold updated WWCC that are recorded in our parish register, we urge volunteers who have not yet applied for a Check or whose Check has expired or not linked to the parish do so via the WWCC website:
