Burrowing Owls of El Paso Parks



Texas Parks & Wildlife's Urban Wildlife Biologist, Lois Balin, partnered with El Paso City Parks to provide habitat for burrowing owls at E.L. Williams and Thomas Manor Parks and then collaborated with <u>Creosote Collaborative</u> and <u>High Desert</u> <u>Native Plants</u> to provide burrowing owl habitat at Vocational Park Pond and the Playa Drain by Ascarate Park.

We had success at E. L. Williams Park with four fledgling owls and Vocational Park pond with one fledgling. There wasn't much opportunity to check on Thomas Manor owls but a pair was seen there in April. No adult owls and a dead owlet in one of the entrances was discovered in early June. Not sure

what happened. Owls by Ascarate Park nested in a drainage hole and have two fledglings. The habitats there were installed late in the season and have no nesting owls. We are hoping next year for nesting owls in the two habitats installed there.

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AT FEATHER LAKE

The irrigation season began this year March 17, and, during April and May, limited areas near Feather Lake's inlet and outlet were flooded intermittently with irrigation water discharged into the Mesa Drain and the Mesa Drain Interceptor. Most of the time, though, the basin has been dry.

As was the case last year, a Mississippi Kite is again frequenting our sanctuary. Will there be more? Keep your fingers crossed.

Due to the COVID-19 pandemic, our organization is currently not holding group activities, including the everpopular workdays at Feather Lake. The workday tentatively scheduled for June 6 has been canceled. The next opportunity <u>tentatively</u> on the calendar comes **Sat., August 8,** starting at **8 a.m.**

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
Under the emergency orders issued by the

City and County of El Paso to address the COVID-19 pandemic, Rio Bosque Wetlands Park was closed to public use April 2. The park's trails reopened May 23. If you visit, keep your group size small, maintain appropriate social distancing and wear appropriate facial covering.

Summer-resident birds are back in force, with good numbers of Yellow-breasted Chats, Blue Grosbeaks and Painted Buntings present, along with a very vocal Northern Cardinal. We're looking forward to the return of Yellow-billed Cuckoos in June.
