Thank you again to all who attended: 133 attendees with 47 first-time visitors. If you were there, we hope you enjoyed yourselves and we hope to see you again at next year's event. I want to thank 3rd Lt Commander Geoffry Lyster, and everyone that assisted in ensuring that this was a successful event.

What an incredible honor and emotional privilege it was to stand on the platform in front of the Tomb of the Unknow Soldiers with Imperial Sir Ed Stolze, Navy Lt Commander (Ret), my Lady Virginia, USAF MSgt (Ret), and my COS Mike Kearns, Navy Corpsman, to place our wreath before the Tomb. A memory that I will treasure for the rest of my life. To anyone considering taking a place in the IALOH line, this is truly one of the perks making it worth the journey.

April 24th through the 29th 2024, brings the annual IALOH convention to fabulous Las Vegas. The Aliante Casino + Hotel + Spa is a very clean venue located in North Las Vegas, small

by Las Vegas standards with only 202 rooms. The room rate is inviting and it's good 3 days before and 3 days after the convention dates for those of you who would like to come early or stay for some fun/sightseeing. The resort boasts 5 great restaurants, an Imax theater, a sports book, and, of course, a full casino. The Welcome Party will be a 60s & 70s theme to Welcome Home Vietnam Vets. April is one of the best months for weather in Vegas, daytime temperatures average in the upper 70s with overnight lows in the low 60s, with little or no precipitation. Perfect for lounging around the pool after a long cold winter.

I am offering a few fundraisers this year including two Henry 22 S/L/LR rifles. One is a Freemason Tribute Edition rifle, and the other is a Military Service Edition tribute rifle. Both will include the official Henry Rifle display case and the firearms transfer fee. Only 1,000 tickets will be sold for each rifle. Other raffle items are a beautiful 50" X 50" patriotic quilt with matching pillow (only 500 tickets will be sold) and if you plan on staying at the Aliante Hotel for the 4-day duration of the convention you could have those nights paid for a \$600 value. 

Subject: Proposed Bylaw Change

Russell Gray, Commander, International Association Legions of Honor David L. Smith, Adjutant, International Association Legions of Honor Tracy Coughlin, Judge Advocate, International Association Legions of Honor

Purpose: The purpose of this bylaw change is to allow an Association Commander to be authorized to vote during the International Association Legions of Honor Annual Convention if they are present at the convention and not otherwise authorized to vote as listed in current bylaws.

Bylaw currently reads:

Article 5

Section 3. VOTING: The only persons authorized to vote during the International Association Legions of Honor Annual Convention are: Legion Nobles holding Elective Offices of the International Association Legions of Honor as listed in ARTICLE III, Section 1, all Past International Commanders, the two (2) Accredited Voting Representatives from each Legion of Honor Unit and Emeritus Members. Only those members who are present with signed credentials will be allowed to vote. Proxies or absentee votes will not be allowed.

Change to Read:

Article 5

Section 3. VOTING: The only persons authorized to vote during the International Association Legions of Honor Annual Convention are: Legion Nobles holding Elective Offices of the International Association Legions of Honor as listed in ARTICLE III, Section 1, all Past International Commanders, the two (2) Accredited Voting Representatives from each Legion of Honor Unit and Emeritus Members. An Association Commander of the Legion of Honor is authorized to vote as a representative of the Association only if they are not otherwise entitled to a vote as described previously. Only those members who are present with signed credentials will be allowed to vote. Proxies or absentee votes will not be allowed.

Christmas and New Years Away From Home

As we all know serving in the military means you are going to be away from home during the Holidays. You are going to miss out on the fun of watching your family opening presents and celebrate the Holidays with a traditional holiday meal.

I know for myself I was on deployment for two Christmases during the Vietnam war. While serving in the US I was stationed close to home so I was able to go home and celebrate Christmas with my family. Then in November of 1970 I was sent to Ubon Thailand to work on



the C-130 Specter gunships. Being a navie twenty year old (just turned twenty in October) I thought I would go to work on Christmas day, we would not fly any missions and would celebrate Christmas by playing cards and eating the food from some of the packages we received from home. I was wrong. As soon as I walked into the shop the Sgt. doing the dispatching said Smitty you and Bookout grab your tool box we got a "Red Ball" (a Red Ball is a plane getting ready to take off on a mission and has a problem). We got in the dispatch truck that took us to the plane and within a few minutes we had the plane repaired and the plane was gone on its mission.

The two Christmases and New Years we flew just as many mission as we would on a regular day. The planes would take off at 1800 return at 2200 refuel, reload and we would repair any problems before the next mission which started at 2400.

As a naive twenty year old from a small rual town in Florida I quickly learned that war does not stop for the holidays; if it does take a pause it is not for long.

So on the next few pages I have included a few stories and photos about veterans bing away from home during the Holidays.

While thousands of their fellow Americans were about to enter into the Battle of the Bulge and likely face capture under harsh circumstances by the war-weary German enemy, others, already in POWs, celebrated a lonely Christmas holiday, the last of the war, in camps across Europe.


At the well-established camps, some Kriegies (English slang for the German Kriegsgefangenen or prisoner of war) were fortunate to receive Christmas parcels. The American Red Cross packed and shipped 75,000 Christmas parcels in the summer of 1944 leaving time for a Christmas arrival. The packages contained mixtures of food (including canned turkey and fruit cake), tobacco, games, and Christmas decorations.

In Stalag Luft III, they had a gigantic "bash." POWs were given freedom to roam the grounds on Christmas Eve and Christmas night. Alcohol was made in several camps by fermenting raisins from aid packages. Most of the camps had Christmas concerts and services. At Stalag Luft III the auditorium held 700 men, but even with several performances, not all of the 11,000 POWs could see the Christmas pageant. In some of the camps, including Stalag VIIA, some barracks received small Christmas trees from guards, which they decorated with snowflakes cut from tin cans, lint, food labels, and nails. Formal dinners were served in many barracks, every mouthful savored. Some of these details as well as menus, cards and programs, were recorded in Wartime Logs, journals printed by the YMCA and distributed by the Red Cross to POWs in Europe.

Less than a month later, nearly 80,000 Kriegies would begin what was referred to as the Long March. In one of the coldest winters on record—23 December 1944 at Stalag Luft III in Sagan, temperatures hovered just below 0°F—80,000 Allied POWs were evacuated from camps on the eastern edge of German territory

and forced, mainly on foot, to camps further away from the advancing Russians.







December 25, 1917 found William James Bean in quarantine at Fort Hamilton in Brooklyn, New York. Bean had been inducted into the Army a little more than a week before. Unable even to roam the camp freely, Bean was distraught to be spending the holiday far from "Dear Old Syracuse," away from his mother Harriet and his wife Mabel, whom he had married only six months earlier.

By the next Christmas, Bean was even farther from home. He sent his family several holiday cards from somewhere in France. "Although I'm many miles away," reads one. "My heart's at home this Christmas Day."

Bean's correspondence echoes a sentiment common to active duty service members who spend some or all of the holiday season far from their loved ones—a longing for home.

Military families frequently send gifts and greetings to remind their loved ones that home is still there, waiting. In 1951, Marion Gurfein tape-recorded a very special holiday message to send to her husband Joe, who was stationed in Korea. The whole Gurfein family joined in the merriment.

In 2003, Dean Baratta was serving at an Army post near Bagram, Afghanistan. The week before Christmas, he survived his first rocket attack. His spirits were lifted on Christmas Day when a number of units decorated their vehicles and staged an impromptu holiday parade through the camp. Baratta told his friends and family via his blog that the parade was "one of the coolest things I've ever seen



Joseph Brenner's December 24, 1943 letter to his wife Norma is an exception to this rule. "I want to wish everyone a very happy Chanuka," Brenner wrote. "I'll be with you all in spirit I know."

Instead of lighting a menorah himself, Brenner joined "all the Jewish boys" in his platoon at Fort Bragg, North Carolina in volunteering for, the necessary job of K.P. On Christmas Day, he peeled vegetables and prepared salads. Afterwards, he enjoyed the grandest dinner of his life. But what made the season truly special for Brenner was a far more humble meal. Another Jewish soldier in his platoon "got a whole salami and a lot of other real Yiddish stuff" in the mail, which he proceeded to share with Brenner and the other Jewish infantrymen. "It was wonderfull" exclaimed Brenner.



Doc Bates came to Claymore Corner, a small primitive base thirty-five miles northwest of Saigon at the beginning of the 1967 Christmas season, at a time when the men there were especially down and gloomy. A few days after Bates' arrival, the new company commander, Howard "Dutch" McAllister, himself fighting depression as Christmas grew near, noticed a small, scruffy, artificial Christmas tree that sat on some flat rocks just outside the mess tent. He also noticed something peculiar going on around the tree every evening. While soldiers listlessly moved through the mess tent receiving their evening meal on steel trays, McAllister spied one soldier carefully brushing dust from the sad-looking Christmas tree each evening. Like everything else on the base, a fine patina of red dust from the day's truck convoys had collected on the tree, making the soldier's efforts basically useless. When McAllister finally drew near, he realized the man faithfully tending to the shabby tree "was the company's senior medical aid man, Doc Bates. He was short and compact with a thatch of reddish-brown hair and a quick smile."

McAllister approached the quiet medic, asking him, "What's this, Doc? First aid for the tree?"

Bates laughed and replied, "Just trying to make myself count, Captain."



A 1952 Korean War Christmas Story

I had arrived at Kimpo Air Force Base, Korea in early December 1952 and was living in a tent, eating C rations, bathing out of a helmet, using an outside john, and freezing my butt off because the Air Force didn't have any cold weather gear. That wind blowing down from North Korea was truly as cold as a well digger's fanny in Alaska. We were being promised that on Christmas Day we would get a hot meal that included turkey, and everyone including myself was pretty excited about the prospect of that. The rumor was that some canned or frozen turkey was being flown in from Japan for the occasion. Christmas Eve morning our squadron command post received a radio message that one of our remote homing beacons near the 38th Parallel that was used by our aircraft when flying missions North was down and they needed radio maintenance assistance. I was the most senior and experienced radio technician in the unit, and it was my job to respond to all such emergencies for all our remote sites in the Northern part of South Korea. I hated the thought of the long drive to the remote site in an open jeep and the cold, and most of all missing that hot Christmas meal.

My buddy, who was a power specialist, and I reluctantly grabbed our carbines, a box or two of C rations, some cartons of cigarettes, and a couple of bottles of Canadian Club Bourbon and hit the road. The CC and cigarettes were for recreational use plus trading material. In the Air Force we could get all the booze we wanted and plenty of cigarettes but few of the more practical necessities. On the other hand the Army had plenty of necessities, but little or no booze and cigarettes. So barter was the name of the game if one were to survive more comfortably.

The homing beacon site was typical of the many remote communication sites throughout Korea. A couple of mobile radio vans, gasoline generators, vehicles, and 12 to 15 guys sleeping in tents. The site was surrounded by a high fence with the tents and equipment protected by sand bags and there were plenty of fox holes. It was not uncommon for these sites to be bombed at night by civilian type aircraft from North Korea dropping mortar shells. These bad guys were called Bed Check Charlies because they usually came about bed time to keep one from sleeping as well as to do material damage. Guerrillas were also an every present danger, and the fence was also needed to keep locals from stealing supplies.

When I arrived on site, we immediately started working on the radio equipment. During the late afternoon, I noticed that a lot of Korean orphan kids were standing outside the fence begging for food. The guys didn't seem to be paying much attention, and were even sort of sheepish about the situation. GIs are usually so generous, I couldn't understand what was happening. After the equipment was restored and working properly, I finally I asked the NCO in charge, a very young sergeant, what was going on with the kids. He told me they were orphans living in caves up above the site and fending for themselves. He said they come every day begging for food, and we have given them everything we could spare plus more, and now we really don't have enough left for ourselves. I asked why don't you go to the Army supply point and get more rations. He told me they were only allowed to get supplies once a month at the Army supply depot, and it would be three days before they could get more.

So instead of celebrating Christmas Eve with those two precious bottle of CC, we took off for the supply point. We traded our two bottles of CC for a jeep load of rations and headed back to the site. On Christmas day the guys invited the kids in, and we heated up C rations and all had a Christmas feast of sorts with Spam. Lima beans, etc.. We had a communications receiver tuned into Armed Forces Radio playing Christmas tunes loudly and some of the guys were trying to teach the Korean kids to sing hymns with them. Every box of C rations had cookies and the guys gave those to the children for Christmas presents.

Christmas was a cold and snowy day, and as I looked around at all the fellows there that day, it dawned on me that I was the senior person in rank as well as the oldest person on the site. I had turned 22 three weeks before. We were all just a bunch of kids, Koreans and all. I would spend another Christmas in Korea in 1953, but the war was over then, and I finally got that hot Christmas meal with fresh turkey and stuffing, but it didn't measure up to the one with the orphans.













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
