Editorial:

THE BIBLE COLLEGE CHOIR TOUR

It is a real privilege to come to you by the way of the report again.

We have passed the mid-term of school and are well into the last half of school. During the one week break, the school choir began its tour in Cave Springs, Arkansas, on October 9. On Sunday, October 10, the choir was at the home church in Baxter Springs. Tuesday morning at 5:00 a. m. about 60 students and faculty members loaded two buses and started for Laverne, Oklahoma, where we were scheduled for a concert in the high school auditorium at 2:00 p. m. About 800 attended that concert. From there we went to the Balko High School auditorium for a service that evening at 8:00 p. m. The auditorium was nearly full with more than 500 people to hear the choir. The next day, Wednesday, October 13, we were in the Hardesty, Oklahoma, high school for a concert with about 250 present. Wednesday evening the choir appeared in the Apostolic Faith Church in Guymon with a capacity crowd of some over 400. Thursday morning we left for Rockdale, Texas, where we conducted the service that night with a real good attendance. Friday we took the day off for some time of relaxation. Then Saturday evening we appeared in the Katy church to a full house. Sunday, the day was spent in Alvin, Texas, with the students having the morning service, and the choir presented their concert Sunday night to a packed house. Monday morning found us with the use of only one bus because of some transmission trouble with the other one. So we loaded the one bus, two cars, a pickup and rented trailer and traveled to Magnolia, Arkansas, for a concert Monday night in the Bethel Church with another good crowd. Then on Tuesday morning we came on in to the school where we began class work on Wednesday.

I feel this trip was a very rewarding and successful experience, and our prayer is that God used the Bible College students to be a living testimony of the great love of the Lord Jesus Christ.

Our sincere thanks to everyone who made this trip possible. Especially those who furnished meals and lodging at each church we visited, those who supported this venture by the offerings, and those who prayed for the success of this trip. We traveled nearly 3,000 miles and witnessed to nearly 3,000 people, and God so graciously supplied every need.

A hearty thanks to Rev. and Mrs. Jack Barker who took their pickup to haul the risers and help co-ordinate the trip. Also a big thanks to Edwin Modrick and the Guymon church for the use of their bus and to Mark Adair and the Faith Student Center for the use of their bus. Also thanks to Mark Adair and Doug Hibbs for driving their bus. Thanks to Rev. Jim Wallis, Kenneth Doty, Rev. L. J. Ehrlich for the use of their cars in the absence of one bus.

The school is doing real well, and God has certainly blessed in every way.

Please plan to attend the graduation exercises on December 8, 9.

It's Your Salvation

. . . . Work out your own salvation with fear and trembling. Phil. 2: 12

Luke 2: 52 "And Jesus increased in wisdom and stature, and in favour with God and man."

Christianity is not a status at which one arrives, it is a life in which one matures. Being a Christian doesn't begin and end the moment you accept Jesus Christ as your personal Savior. That's only the beginning of a whole new life style.

There is no such thing as one form of Christianity being written for the younger generation and another one being written for the older generation (Eph. 4: 5, 6). There's only one Christianity with gradual stages of growth. It's God's will that we all grow towards Christian maturity. In other words, we must pattern our lives after the Man who said "follow me" (John 12: 26). There should be a steady development into that man or woman that God would have us to be. When it comes to making Christianity our life style, we must let Christ perfect us, because we can only be perfected by the perfect Christ.

How do we grow?

The Bible says that we grow by the Word (I Pet. 2: 2, 3). Paul said that "the Word that God speaks is alive and active: it cuts more keenly than any two-edged sword; it strikes through to the place where soul and spirit meet, to the innermost intimacies of a man's heart" (Heb. 4: 12). Just as we look to a math book to learn math, we must look to the Bible to learn the "Christian way of life".

One of the essential parts of our Christian living is our prayer life. Without a good prayer life, our Christian living is destined for a fall. Paul talked about being in a constant attitude of prayer (I Thess. 5:17). Jesus Christ thought it was so important that He would often slip away from the crowds to pray, often arising early in the morning to go out and pray. If you're a student of God's Word, and spending time in prayer, then as it has been said, "your conscience becomes a thousand witnesses to you." (II Corn 5: 11)

Sometimes while we're working out our own salvation with fear and trembling, we run into little "hangups". For instance, one hang-up might be "can I trust God?" We're afraid to just let go and let God. We may feel as if we can't trust God and that He doesn't know what's really best for our lives. The Bible says that if we "commit and trust our works unto the Lord, that He will cause our thoughts to become agreeable to His will, and so shall our plans be established and succeed" (Prov. 16: 3 Amplified Bible; Ps. 37: 5.)

Another problem that might give us some difficulty in working out our salvation is the "do's and don'ts." Some of these "do's and don'ts" may be Biblical; others may be traditional. Generations have set different priorities on various things and complain about anyone who sees things differently. But Jesus says "He is The Way." Since Jesus Christ is a whole way of life, anything else that becomes a way of life is sin. We must center our Christianity around Jesus Christ. As long as we're doing this, we won't have to worry too much about what we shouldn't do. If Christ is the central point of our Christianity, then we will become so involved in the do's that the don'ts will no longer present a real problem to us (Rom. 7: 6).

If Christ is not the central point of our Christian living, if our Christian experience is built only upon the encouragement of others, or past experiences, or simply hope for the future, or if it is built around a bunch of don'ts, then our Christian living is in serious trouble. It will not stand a severe storm of trials and temptations (Matt. 7:26) The foolish build on the sand; the wise on the Rock — Jesus!

But just because some of those don'ts aren't mentioned in the Bible doesn't necessarily mean we shouldn't make them principles to live by. We need to ask ourselves "what's the reason?"

We have authority in other realms of life. Mathematics has its inviolable rules, formulas, and equations; if these are ignored, no probable answers can be found.

Music has its rules of harmony, progression, and time. To break these rules is to produce discord.

It makes no difference if you're playing a game, driving a car, or baking a cake, there are certain rules that need to be followed.

We must remember not to get too close to the cliff. We cannot wallow in mud and play in filth without getting dirty. Even an IBM machine is not a garbage disposal. If you dump your garbage into it, it will begin to produce garbage. The Bible says we are to "abstain from all appearance of evil" (I Thess. 5:22) Don't flirt or play in sin; it will eventually get the best of you (Ez. 18: 4, 20)

It is easy not to work out your own salvation, but the Bible tells us that the Holy Spirit will be a teacher who will lead us into all truth as long as we have a healthy Bible study and prayer life.

We need to ask ourselves, "would I feel right about this if Jesus were here?" God sees and knows everything anyway. So when in doubt it is better to be "safe than sorry". Remember, don't get too close to the cliff! In the final analysis you're not going to be judged by a certain group of people or by church dogma, but by God Almighty. Our salvation needs to be worked out until it becomes something of our very own, and not someone elses. It needs to be worked out to the point that it becomes between just God and you.

Have you ever thought about the enthusiasm that Paul must have had in his service to Jesus Christ? Years later he was able to look back over his past and say, "I've fought a good fight, I've kept the faith, from henceforth is laid up for me a crown of righteousness". (II Tim. 4: 8) We say some day I want to be able to say the same words that Paul said. The Bible says "greater is He that is within you than he that is in the world" (I John 4:4; Jude :24) And again the Bible says "My sheep hear my voice, and I know them, and they follow me. And I give unto them eternal life; and they shall never perish, neither shall any man pluck them out of my hand." (John 10: 27, 28)

How do we fight?

This is a spiritual warfare that we're engaged in. The Bible says that "the trying of our faith worketh patience" (James 1: 3), but God is not the tempter (James 1: 13). God may allow you to be tempted, but He promises not to allow you to be tempted above that ye are able to stand (I Cor. 10: 13). Besides an untested faith is not worth having.

Sometimes it may seem as though our own little worlds have caved in on us. Maybe they have, but maybe they needed to. Some times we need something to jar us back to reality. "Whom God loveth, He chasteneth" (Heb. 12: 26) Do you suppose that God loves us so much that He does allow us to go through some trying times so we can come out a stronger Christian for Him, thereby arriving at a greater realization that God's Way is the best and only way? Paul wrote "endure hardness as a good soldier" (II Tim. 2: 3). One of the reasons that Paul was such a great Christian is that he endured the hardness, turning every defeat into a victory for God. Ephesians 6 talks about "putting on the whole armor of God". This is a spiritual warfare we're engaged in. To insist on fighting a spiritual warfare without God's armor is to commit spiritual suicide! It's like going down the street to gather up a team of little leaguers to play the New York Mets. We must therefore be properly equipped for battle. Our faith is in Jesus Christ, our sword is God's Word, and our God is only a whisper away not willing that any should perish. (Luke 8: 24)

We have been given access to the greatest power on earth, always available in time of need, simply by asking. "Greater is he that is within you, than he that is within the world" (I John 4: 4), He has promised to "never forsake us or leave us" (Heb. 13: 5). He is "a friend that sticketh closer than a brother" (Prov. 18: 24). In your "weakness He will make you strong" (II Cor. 12: 9). Jesus says "My grace is sufficient" (II Cor. 12: 9). Rely upon His strength. "Cast all your cares upon Him, because He cares for you" (I Pet. 5: 7).

Niebur once said, "What doesn't kill me, makes me stronger." Edna Shultz has said, "When the going gets tough, the tough always get going." The Bible says, "Having done all else stand" (Eph. 6: 13). In other words when all of our spiritual resources and all of our own power seemingly has been exhausted, stand anyway! Just simply be willing and God will give you the strength. If you must lean, then lean on Jesus. Let Jesus fight your battles, release them into His Hands. He'll help you, and together you'll come out victorious.



Your Appearance

Does the inside have enough of God to make the outside give off a good Christian appearance? Do we look like Christian men and women when we stand by the world every day? Or do we blend in with the world and can't be seen?

It is not impossible to describe the dress of Christians. First, we must come in contact with God and let Him rule our every action and thought.

When you shortened your dress inch by inch; did you ask yourself, "should I or shouldn't I"? If it wasn't wrong why did you ask yourself? Wasn't guilt present until it was seared?

Can you tell a sinner when he or she walks into the church? Or does everybody look alike; sinner and Christian? You used to be able to tell the sinner by his appearance and actions. Times have changed, but God's law has not changed.

You might say its nobody's business what I as a Christian wear. You represent Christ and the Church. The way you appear may be the only way a sinner looks for Christ in you. Read Duet. 22:5, I Cor. 11: 14-15, I Cor. 6: 19-20, and Romans 12: 2.

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GOD'S WORD

Forever it is settled in heaven, Psa. 119: 89 Till heaven and earth pass away, one jot or one tittle shall in no wise pass till all be fulfilled, Matt. 5: 18. Quality Versus Quantity

The call of God is to whosoever will and it is not the will of God for anyone to perish but there are conditions we must meet to be one of God's children.

The Bible tells us to strive to enter in at the strait gate, for many will seek to enter in and shall not be able. Luke 13: 24

Matt. 22:14 says many are called but few are chosen. Good conduct is certainly expected of Christians of any age. Please read Titus 2:12. In verses 11 and 12 Paul says, "For the grace of God that bringeth salvation hath appeared to all men, teaching us that denying ungodliness and worldly lusts, we should live soberly, righteously, and godly in this present world."

God is more interested in quality than quantity, or numbers. In Judges 7 we find where the Lord had Gideon to test his army and though he only had 32,000 men in his army, he tested them and used only 300 men who met God's conditions. God gave the 300 men a great victory. God has a standard for the army of the Lord.

In Luke 9: 57-62, three men came to Jesus but they did not meet His conditions, and Jesus said unto them, "No man, having put his hand to the plough, and looking back, is fit for the kingdom of God."

In Matt. 19: 16-22 a man came to Jesus but was unable to meet certain conditions. The rich young ruler was a good fellow but he did not meet the standard Jesus set for him and he went away sorrowful.

In I Sam. 16: 5-12, God sent Samuel to anoint a king over Israel. Seven of Jesse's sons passed before him and though some of them were trained army men, God told Samuel that they did not meet his standard for a king. Samuel asked Jesse if he had another son and he said there was another one who tended the sheep. When David was brought in, he was chosen. In verse 7 it says, "For the Lord seeth not as man seeth; for man looketh on the outward appearance, but the Lord looketh on the heart."

In Matt. 3:1-10 John refused to baptize the Pharisees and Sadducees that came to be baptized, and told them to bring forth fruits meet for repentence. John was more interested in quality than quantity or numbers.

We surely need more people in our churches, but if we lower the standard to get numbers, we will go down with the rest of this untoward generation. In John 6:53-68, Jesus was not more interested in numbers than in quality, or he would have soft-pedaled his doctrine and watered down what he told a large group who followed him for the loaves and fishes. In verse 53, it says, "Verily, verily I say unto you, Except ye eat the flesh of the Son of man, and drink His blood, ye have no life in you." They said, "this is a hard saying; who can hear it?"

In verse 66 it says many of his disciples went back and did not follow him any more. Then he asked the twelve if they were going away also, and Peter said, "Lord, to whom shall we go, thou hast the words of eternal life."

We can lower ourselves and drag others down, but we cannot lower God's standard. Ps. 100:5 "For the Lord is good, his truth endureth to all generations."

Some of the brethren are saying that the way we dress and act doesn't make any difference. Every thing of this nature should be over looked, and get larger crowds in our churches. We did not set the standard in the beginning, it is God's standard. May God help us to live by His standard.

Jesus did not expect a multitude to inherit eternal life. Matt. 7-13-14. "Enter ye in at the strait gate; for wide is the gate, and broad is the way, that leadeth to destruction, and many there be which go in there at; Because strait is the gate, and narrow is the way which leadeth unto life, and few there be that find it."

If we are not careful to obey the Bible we could be like some of the ones Jesus tells us about in Matt. 7: 21-23 "Not everyone that saith unto me, Lord, Lord shall enter into the kingdom of heaven, but he that doeth the will of my father, which is in heaven. Many will say to me in that day Lord, Lord, have we not prophesied in thy name? And in thy name cast out devils? And in thy name done many wonderful works? And then I will profess unto them I never knew you: depart from me ye that work iniquity."

Strive to enter in at the strait gate, fight the good of faith, and lay hold of eternal life.




