

Toxic Tit-for-Tat

Decades-Long Florida/Alabama Bay Battle Drags On...

This month we are featuring the second of a three -part series chronicling the romantic history and the tragic pollution of our community's centerpiece: The Perdido Bay

Perdido Bay pollution is a Baldwin County problem rooted in Florida dysfunction. Its waves, its grasses, its water creatures have no respect for state lines.

Sunshine State politicians saw no upside to state action forcing the paper mill or the small sewage treatment plants to change their ways. Mill money was flowing into Florida tax coffers, businesses, and the pockets of political campaigns.

Baldwin County? Not so much. The Florida-Alabama tit-for-tat over Perdido Bay would go on for decades.

In 1999, Champion, the paper mill owners at the time, held a public hearing about moving its discharge from Perdido to Escambia Bay. After all, Escambia is much closer to the mill than Perdido Bay. Pollution was so bad that in 1999, a grand jury was convened

An overflow crowd of 359 turned out at a public hearing to heckle Champion spokesman Willy Timms about the idea of dumping into Escambia Bay.

to a Florida paper mill to pollute Perdido Bay then Florida folks would complain about Alabama giving a permit to the mill in Brewton, Alabama to pollute Escambia Bay.

"The end result is that the pollution has been spread around in all bays" Lane writes.



Fireflies: Long Live the Beetles

Summer comes with a lot of problems: the heat, the mosquitos, the heat, the tourists, the heat, the traffic, the heat. It's a little bit hot these days, so please be taking appropriate precautions: lots of water, lots of breaks, protective clothing, and sunscreen. Summer is not just about the heat; it also brings out some of the best critters the Fireflies.



Know Your Critters

Whether you call them fireflies or lightning bugs, these insects are neither flies nor true bugs. Fireflies are beetles. Fireflies have a pair of hardened wing cases, called *elytra*, that the wings fold underneath. The elytra lift for flight like the doors of a 1981 Delorean, which if you don't understand that reference you must look up the movie "Back to the Future" immediately!


There are more than 2,000 species of firefly worldwide. Fireflies are found all over the world, on every continent except Antarctica—and they are incredibly diverse. There are around 170 species in the U.S. and Canada. Most of them are found in most tropical and temperate regions. Many fireflies are nocturnal, although some species are diurnal, which is a fancy term for active during the daylight hours. They are soft-bodied beetles that range up to 1 inch in length. The flattened, dark brown or black body is often marked with stripes of orange or yellow. There are most likely multiple species when you are watching them.

Fireflies produce the most efficient light in the entire world! 100 percent of their energy is emitted as light. Compare that to a regular incandescent light: it emits 10 percent of its energy as light and the other 90 percent as heat! Even LED bulbs produce heat as a side effect of light.

Firefly light is produced under nervous control within special cells called photocytes. These special cells are surrounded by air tubes. Science still doesn't fully understand the entire process of firefly lights. The belief is that light production may be triggered by nerve impulses which stimulate the photocyte to release a specialized enzyme into a "reaction chamber". The resulting chemical reaction produces light energy and a by-product, usually carbon dioxide.

Science may not have cracked the entire code of firefly lights, but Science has found uses for what they do know. The two specialized chemicals found in a firefly's tail, luciferase and luciferin, light up in the presence of ATP, or adenosine triphosphate. ATP is an organic compound found in almost every living cell that drive muscle contraction, nerve impulses, and chemical synthesis. If these chemicals from fireflies are injected into diseased cells, Science can detect changes in cells; Cells that can be used to study many diseases, from cancer to muscular dystrophy!

Like Monarch butterflies, fireflies experience the complete life cycle, which has 4 stages: egg, larvae, pupa, and adult. Fireflies spend most of their life in the



larval stage. While not all adults emit light, all fireflies have glowing larval stages. These armored grubs are vicious predators of slugs, snails, and earthworms. Larvae feed on their prey by injecting a fluid into their captive and then slurping the partly digested matter through their hollow mouthparts. They can spend up to two years in the larval stage before metamorphosing into adults.

Adults may live only a couple of weeks, and most do not eat during this time—they just mate, lay eggs and die. Those that do eat feed on pollen and

Fireflies use flashes as mating signals. The flashes are generally from males looking for females. (No surprise there!) The boys flash a specific pattern while they fly, hoping for a female reply. If a female waiting in the grass or bushes likes what she sees, she responds back with a flash of her own. They will engage in this twinkling "conversation" until the male locates the female and they mate. Each species has its own pattern—a code that lets individuals identify appropriate mates of the same species.

The flashing is a tricky business. Like an insect Morse code, it can be hacked by those that know the inner workings. There is a species of firefly where the female will mimic the flash of a different species. She does this so the male will come into her reach, hoping to mate. She will then capture and eat him! Another species of firefly, the males will sometimes flash a bad pattern hoping to chase off competing males! It is Tough To Be a Firefly!!

There's one more weird little tidbit to share. Fireflies engage in a defense called, "reflex bleeding". If attacked, they will shed a drop of blood. The blood is full of chemicals designed to make the firefly tase bitter, and it can be poisonous to some creatures!



After citizens started campaigning for a clean-up in 1986, the Florida Department of Environmental Protetion (DEP) abruptly halted the studies of small critters living on the bottom of the bay that leant scientific credence to fears about the bay's health and water quality. A consultant working for Champion took over the testing. The DEP did not look at bottom life again until 2007 when Champion stopped testing. But that DEP data inexplicably disappeared.

Pollution was so bad that in 1999, a grand jury was convened to assess local air and water quality. The jury found that Florida regulators weren't doing their jobs and that local elected officials were serving corporations rather than citizens. Immediate action, the report concluded, was urgent to stem the tide of toxins in our community.

But none came.

A long-time bar tender at Pirates Cove Marina likes to tell about the day a few decades back when he sailed with Greenpeace to blockade a bleach shipment to the mill. The Coast Guard interrupted the endeavor, but no one was detained, he recounted.

A 30-year Spanish Cove resident among the founders of the Lillian Public Library says they knew they were taking dirty money when they took \$10,000 from Champion to transform an old building into a library. She resented that the mill was polluting Perdido Bay. But Champion's money made it happen.

That's just the way it was. Florida allowed the bleach paper mill to operate under an expired permit and violate water rules for Eleven Mile Creek, a major tributary to Perdido Bay. The Florida DEP has continually renewed and extended the mill's operating permit even though it was not in compliance with environmental regulations.

During that time, International Paper owners banked \$14 million in tax breaks while the mill increased production and cut its workforce by half.

Waste in wetlands

It would be another dozen years

after the original grand jury before action came.

When it did, it was unprecedented. It was experimental. In 2012, The Florida DEP launched the nation's first-ever plan to discharge industrial waste into a protected wetland.

International Papers would get approval to build an \$85 million 10-mile pipe to funnel the toxins into the wetlands surrounding upper Eleven Mile Creek instead of straight into the creek itself.

The idea was to use the wetlands as a filter to strain out pollutants before the waste landed in lower Eleven Mile Creek and, after that, Perdido Bay. Both by then had been pretty much surrendered as polluted waterways.

"That exemption doesn't come easily," Gulf Breeze wetlands scientist Gerald Moshiri explained in news reports at the time. "Typically, you'd have to get the (wastewater) just about to drinking-water standards in order to get (state) approval."

In a curious coincidence, as officials were working out the details, Florida's top environmental official, David Struhs, stepped down to take a high-level job at International Paper.

"What the effluent transfer did, was allow IP to increase production and continue to pollute Perdido Bay for an additional 12 years," Lane said.

International Paper was supposed to do continuing studies of aquatic animals after they transferred their effluent to the wetland in 2012 to "demonstrate that there was no significant impact from their discharge". Instead, they turned to analyzing plankton and did find some hardy blue-green algae.

"Have we had any help from other environmental groups or from any particular politicians?" Lane asks. "No."

"It has become clear that our government, no matter what the political party, has supported paper mills, not us. This is one of the few industries we have left in this country, so our government has turned a blind eye to the pollution from paper mills."



SLEEP!

Insufficient sleep is associated with negative health consequences such as cardiovascular disease, weakened immune system, increase of obesity and Type 2 DM. Lack of sleep is also responsible for negative workperformance, drowsy driving, and a decline in overall quality of life. It can also affect mental health causing depression and anxiety. According to the National Sleep Foundation, the recommended amount of sleep for an adult is 7-9 hours.

Getting a good night's sleep involves a complex set of processes. A cascade of chemicals and hormones regulate the sleep cycle generating specific reactions in the brain. Melatonin is a common hormone that promotes sleep and is naturally produced as light exposure decreases. Lack of sleep can also affect the production of vital hormones that help with weight control. Leptin and ghrelin are two hormones that are responsible for regulating appetite. Ever notice how hungry you tend to be when you skimp on sleep for a few days? There is a ten-

dency to want to eat processed, quick, and easy foods. Growth hormone is also produced while you sleep and keeps your metabolism fired up preventing weight gain.

Not only is sleep important to keeping your weight in check it is also critical to keeping you mind sharp. Quality sleep is linked to cognition, learning and memory. The brain cycles through four stages of sleep and it needs approximately 7 hours of sleep to complete all its tasks. Some of these tasks include clearing out two proteins beta amyloid and tau which have been linked to Alzheimer Disease. Sleep is the time your brain does some cleaning to get rid of debris that is unwanted. Poor sleep quality impedes the cleaning process. Who couldn't use some nightly brain housecleaning?

Ways to Improve Sleep Hygiene

If you struggle with getting quality of sleep, there are strategies that may help to improve your sleep pattern. Sleep hygiene begins with recognizing sleep is integral to our health and environmental. Lifestyle habits play a big role in how well we sleep each night. It is also important to remember that you must do a little prep work to

get yourself ready for sleep. A sleep routine is a great way to wind down. Experiment with works such as a taking a bath, reading a book, or journaling at least an hour before going to bed. Make sure your room is dark and cool and turn off the electronics. Limit caffeine at least five to six hours before going to bed and watch your alcohol intake. Finding the best way to get good sleep is not a one size fits all strategy so it may take some experimenting. It is also important to remember if you suffer from chronic insomnia, excessive daytime sleepiness or excessive snoring regularly it may indicate a medical condition such as obstructive sleep apnea and it is important to talk to a health care provider.

Spiritual Maturity: It's Time for Us to Grow Up!

In Ephesians 4:14-15, the Apostle Paul tells us, "We are no longer to be children, tossed here and there by waves and carried about by every wind of doctrine, by the trickery of men, by craftiness in deceitful scheming. But speaking the truth in love, we are to grow up in all aspects into Him who is the head, even Christ." Over and over in the Bible we are told that God wants us to grow up. "We are to grow up in every way unto Him who is the head, into Christ. (Ephesians 4:15) "So let us stop going over the basics of Christianity again and again. Let us go on instead and become mature." St. Monica Was a Model of Patience

Saint Monica, (332-387) is better known as the mother of Augustine of Hippo. The circumstances of St. Monica's life could have made her a nagging wife, a bitter daughter-in-law, and a despairing parent, yet she did not give way to any of these temptations. Although she was a Christian, her parents gave her in marriage to a pagan, Patricius, who lived in her small hometown in North Africa. Patricius had some redeeming features, but he also had a violent temper and was more than a little promiscu-

Monica also had to bear with a cantankerous mother-in-law who lived in her home. Patricius criticized his wife because of her charity and piety, but on the side respected her. Monica's prayers and example finally won her husband and mother-in-law to Christianity. Her husband died in 371, one year after his baptism.

Like many women at that time, Monica may have had many children but only three survived infancy. The oldest, Augustine, is the most famous. At the time of his father's death, Augustine was 17 and a rhetoric student in Carthage in present day Turkey. Monica was distressed to learn that her son had accepted the Manichean heresy that said, "all flesh is evil"—and was living an immoral life. For a while, she refused to let her son eat or sleep in her house. Then one night she had a vision that assured her Augustine would return to the faith. From that time on, she stayed close to her son, praying and fasting for him. In fact, she often stayed much closer than Augustine wanted.

When Augustine was 29, he decided to go to Rome to teach rhetoric. Monica was determined to go along. One night he told his mother that he was going to the docks to say goodbye to a friend. Instead he set sail for Rome. Monica was heartbroken when she learned of Augustine's trick, but she still followed him. She arrived in Rome only to find that he had left again, this time for the city of Milan. Although travel was difficult, Monica pursued her son to Milan.

In Milan, Augustine came under the influence of the new bishop, St. Ambrose, who also became Monica's spiritual director. She accepted the Bishop's advice in everything and she became a leader of the devout women in Milan.

She continued her prayers for Augustine during his years of instruction. At Easter of the year 387, Bishop Ambrose baptized Augustine and several of his friends.

Soon after, Augustine and his friends left to return to Africa taking with them the knowledge of Christianity brought by the Holy Spirit through the teaching of Bishop Ambrose.

Although no one else was aware of it, Monica knew her life was near the end. Before Augustine left, she told him, "Son, nothing in this world now affords me delight. I do not know what there is now left for me to do or why I am still here, all my hopes in this world being now fulfilled." She became ill shortly after and suffered severely for nine days before her death. Almost all we know about St. Monica is in the writings of St. Augustine, es-

pecially in the book he titled his Confessions.

Today we seek instant information and immediate answers to our prayers. We can send text messages, tweets, and tic tocs, so we have little patience for things that take time. Monica is a model of patience. Her long years of prayer, her nights of tears, coupled with a strong, welldisciplined character, finally led to the conversion of her hot-tempered husband, her cantankerous mother-in-law and her brilliant but wayward son, Augustine. Who among us has just one of those three things – a spouse, an in-law, or a child that we have named to the Lord in prayer time after time. Have patience. St. Monica understands. As do many of us. Share your burdens with each other. Share your requests with the Lord.
