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FROM THE PASTOR...

We are in Lent, a time of preparation and repentance. It is a time to reflect and anticipate the Three Days at the end of Lent and get ready for the great celebration which is Easter.

Many students are gearing up for the end of the academic year and are cramming in lots of course work. This cramming in is sometimes called an intensive. As I was reading for this newsletter article, I found this comment in the ELCA's Sundays and Seasons:

"Every liturgical year, the church gathers for an intensive in Christian identity. The liturgies of Maundy Thursday, Good Friday, and the Vigil of Easter are intense lessons in hearing, singing, washing, eating, and praying that lead us to be cross and resurrection people."



We are cross and resurrection people. We gather on Maundy Thursday to celebrate and remember our Lord's Supper, to wash feet and remember what it is to be a servant. Our worship continues on Good Friday as we revisit the Stations of the Cross at noon and listen to Jesus' seven last words in the evening. The Three Days concludes with the Great Vigil of Easter in which we are immersed in the Salvation History of God for us and then end with the redressing of the altar and the great Easter Good News.

Then, the last Sunday of this month is Easter and the whole congregation gathers to receive the greatest Good News of all. Jesus lives!

So continue your Lenten journey by being people who hear, see, believe and live their faith. Come and celebrate the Good News and walk all the way with Jesus and one another.

May the God of grace fill you with hope this season.

From the Vicar...

Crossing Over from Lent to Easter

Lent is nearly over and Easter will be upon us soon. This issue of *Cross Connections* catches us in the space between disciplines of acknowledging who God made us to be along with the prayerful consideration of who that is, and the rebirth and renewal of Easter that calls us into a hope of new life. We might all find that this means different things for our individual lives or for our families. Some of us may find new, healthier habits or practices of discipline that stay with us for a while or even for life. Like New Year's resolutions, many of us will celebrate the end of Lent by returning to things just the way they were before.

Recently, I read an article in *Christian Century* that suggested that pain and difficulty can be a means for growth. The article cited G. K. Chesterton's suggestion that "if you love how a fence post looks and want to preserve it, you must repaint it every year." It seems like an appropriate sentiment for both our spiritual and secular transitions from Lent into Easter – a chance to give ourselves over to God just a little bit more, to receive a new paint job, as well as a time when we paint Easter eggs.

Of course, the reality is that we're talking about both more and less than a new paint job. It's more in the sense that our Lenten journey and re-emergence into Easter is a time for a complete change of character, one that lets go of our sinful selves for the sake of a better, closer relationship to God and neighbor. It's less in the sense that we are Lutherans, and we know that the enormous challenge of casting off our own sin will always be beyond our capacity, and simply painting over the surface only helps to seal in that part of our being.

The good news, however, is that Christ's resurrection points to the possibility of our rebirth and renewal by the power of God, for whom all things are possible. And we're reminded in the baptismal liturgy that our baptism was a rebirth that sets us free, meaning that we can participate in God's work to make us new. But if we are being made new, the next

question is who will we become?

Starting with the understanding that whose we are is God's, we have started to explore these questions during Lent with a new Council, new Stewardship program, Financial Peace University, Duke Campus Call Committee, and further exploration of the Paschall property, not to mention dozens of other considerations about who we are as St. Paul's. And just as the beloved fence post is repainted every year, we are invited to continue to ask and answer the questions of who we are, who we are becoming, and where this will all take us in the future.

George Herbert was born on April 3, 1593 in Wales to a noble family. He served in the British Parliament at the behest of King James I, was ordained a deacon in the Church of England, and became an Anglican priest in 1630. He died at the age of 39 from consumption in 1633. The

Lutheran Church honors him each year on March 1 for his lovely poetry that dealt primarily with religious subjects. His best known work is a collection of 164 poems entitled The Temple. These



poems, according to Herbert, described "the many spiritual conflicts that have passed betwixt God and my soul." Herbert is also known for the quote "Living well is the best revenge." In addition, some of Herbert's poems were set to music and became hymns including "Come, My Way, My Truth, My Life" which is 816 in our hymnal. Fowler Library owns Herbert's collected poems at 821.3 HER. These short, lyrical gems cover such themes as Lent, baptism, sin, justice, and love. In glancing through this volume you will see that some of the poems are written to form pictures with the words. Fowler has many other poetry books in the 800 section, including The Poets' Jesus, A Treasury of Christian Poetry, Chapter Into Verse, and three volumes of poetry by St. Paul's own Arnie Johanson.

Recycle/Repurpose

March tips of the month to Care for Creation:

- Running water continuously for just two minutes can waste three gallons of water!
- To save water in the shower, turn the water off while you lather up. With water flowing up to five gallons per minute from a non-conserving showerhead, showers can consume about one-fifth of water used indoors.
- Turn off the water while brushing your teeth or shaving. Fill a cup with water when brushing your teeth and fill the sink bowl to rinse your razor instead of running the water.
- Install water saving devices in the bathroom. Faucet aerators and low-flow regulators for showerheads can reduce water output by 40-50%, while still delivering a satisfactory spray.
- Report tap leaks and faulty toilets in a public place to the management.

Two Opportunities in April

Heidi B. Neumark - April 10th

Heidi will be preaching at both the 8:30 and 11:00 am worship services and at 1:00 pm will be doing a book reading from her new book: <u>Hidden Inheritance</u>.

Imagine discovering a secret – that your family has a hidden Jewish heritage. That your grandfather died in a concentration camp and your grandmother was a death-camp survivor. How did you not know? How would it change your spiritual life? Heidi Neumark, a Lutheran pastor, happened upon records that revealed her family's loss and trauma and resulted in the shocking revelation that she was

suddenly and inherently connected to the multi-ethnic, marginalized community she had been ministering to for three decades and to which she felt a deep affinity. **Hidden Inheritance** is a combination of compelling personal story and bold call for social justice that links the past with contemporary challenges.

Heidi B. Newmark is an author, speaker, and Lutheran pastor in New York City. She is the author of the highly-acclaimed book, *Breathing Space: A Spiritual Journey in the South Bronx* which won the 2004 Wilbur Award given by the Religion Communicators Council. She has chapters and sermons in numerous other books and writes regularly for The Christian Century and other journals. Pastor Neumark also serves as the executive director of a shelter for homeless LBGTQ youth. She holds an honorary doctorate of divinity from Muhlenberg College.

Christian Preismeier, Direct Descendant of Luther

Thursday, April 21 at 7 pm – Dessert and Conversation about Luther and Life

"My name is Christian Priesmeier and I am a direct descendant of Doctor Martin Luther, reformer and founder of the evangelical Lutheran Church. And if you ask yourself why my name is not Luther, then the answer is quite simple. Martin Luther's last descendant in the male line was Johann Martin Luther, died on November 9th 1756, who had besides a daughter no further descendants. At that time; Women always took over the man's name. Therefore now; there is no longer a direct descendant bearing the name Luther.

Besides my part time job as head of quality assurance in a Software Development company, I am a student of "Intercultural Theology, Migration and Congregational Leadership" at the University Hermannsburg, I am a voluntary preacher in the Lutheran Church and I am member and secretary of the Board of "Lutheriden Association" in Zeitz. This association brings together the descendants of the reformer Martin Luther and Katharina von Bora or one of his collateral relatives and altogether we are called "Lutheriden." Currently we have about 200 enrolled members, without the spouses and children of the current estimated 3000 to 4000 still living descendants. The focus is to preserve and maintain the spirit and intention of Dr. Martin Luther in the general public and especially among his descendants."




CROP Hunger Walk
