A Day In The Garage by Mark Leder

Shown below is a typical garage day that most owners will experience keeping their cars in good repair. The jack stands are common and can be be purchased rather inexpensively. In recent years these stands have been made overseas and the quality is an issue. Just recently a large recall was issued as the toggle mechanism was improperly manufactured and the jacks were marketed under a few different label names. If you have any experience in welding or manufacturing quality control, many of the jacks seen for sale have questionable looking welds as well. Taking these items in to consideration ,value your safety and also doubt the safety of a jack or jack stands. Purchase from a reputable supplier and be prepared to pay for quality and if possible the pin style jack stand eliminates the toggle issue. Many have been injured and killed when the jack or jack stand failed, slipped or were placed improperly. Never use concrete blocks to place your car on while working on it. When you hammer, pull strongly on a wrench, work on natural soil while the car is up in the air it's very possible it can slip off the holding device

In the repair shown it was time to pull the rear brake drums and repack the wheel bearings, the car was lifted and placed on stands that were inspected for damage or missing pieces before the car was allowed to rest on them. A cribbing pile of 4 x4 lumber and 1" lumber was laid in this particular pattern as an additional safety precaution should the stands fail or the car slip while forces are applied to it. This is a very good idea to be used on either end of the car once its up in the air.

When pulling brake drums you need a quality hub puller as the drums are very tightly held to the tapered axle shaft. The clubs tool library has one if you don't own one. They can come off easily but many times it takes a lot of force with an extension of leverage on your wrench to brake them loose. Even the leverage many times needs help with hammer blows to the drum while pressure is applied. Sometimes drums can be so stubborn that heat from a torch is need to get the things moving. Other tricks sometimes needed are to leave the puller on under tension and walk away from it for a day or two and occasionally smack it with a hammer and then see if you can tighten the puller more if they should it not come off. It's possible you may hear a "bang" when you out of sight of it and then it's loose. Another trick said to help is to go to the other side of the car and to have the axle nut on just proud of threads and it with a hammer blow or two to the nut send a shock to the other side while the puller is under tension.

All these hammer blows and leverage on the wrench can move the car so again as a reminder be safe and support the car with good equipment.

In order to be able tighten the hub puller you need to be able to hold the drum from spinning so if you can take a steel rod that has flat surfaces on it and use two of the studs with the nuts positioned to the flat surface of the bar with one end resting on a a piece of wood as shown in the photo. A crowbar with it's hex design is ideal for this purpose.
