### **Raising Up a Deacon**

Our Bishop Santosh Marray has not only a pastoral heart, but a heart for evangelism and social justice. That is one of the many reasons I believe he was elected and accepted the call to be our 11<sup>th</sup> Diocesan Bishop.

One of his many goals has been to expand the opportunities to serve as an ordained vocational deacon in the diocese. A "vocational" deacon is called and prepared to serve in this ordained role for life. "Transitional" deacons serve from six months to a year or so prior to being ordained to the priesthood. Fr. Steve and I were deacons. He served in Washington and I served in Baltimore before being ordained to the priesthood. The diaconal role, while separate and not considered less than the priest's role, is a distinct ministry in the life of the Church. Among many other duties and services, the deacon's contribution is "to communicate the needs of the world to the Church" (BCP 543). She/he spends time in the parish on Sundays assisting with the liturgy and may often participate in parish life as an ordained member of the congregation she/he serves. Bishop Marray is quite adamant when he says, "I am not interested in deacons being window dressing, but evangelists and people involved in the world and the communities they serve." To be a vocational deacon is to have a heart for evangelism, social justice and SERVICE.



It was not a surprise to me when Peggy Samuels approached me about entering the discernment process to examine her sense of God's call to the diaconate. Having known Peggy now for nearly eight years and having journeyed with her in her role as a highly committed and talented lay person and having seen her "in action" with all kinds of God's children, leads me to believe in my heart that she is, indeed, sensing God's call to the diaconate.

Peggy has served Shrewsbury as Sunday school directress, Newsletter editor, VBS teacher, DOK member, and now, Vestry member. She is often found Sunday mornings serving as a Lay Eucharistic Minister and Lector. Recently, she has begun working at The Benedictine School as an employment specialist supporting an individual with disabilities. In many ways, Peggy is doing diaconal work right now. She is committed to a life of prayer, worship, and service.

Yet, something is stirring within her prompting her to investigate in a deeply personal and now a communal process the sense that she can do more with and for God as an ordained member of the Church. She attended the Vocational Deacon Retreat with the Bishop in May. She continues to pray and reflect on her call and her future life as an ordained woman in the Episcopal Church.

Now, Peggy will begin meeting with a group of parishioners assembled to dialogue with her about her sense of God's call and the many aspects involved in ordained life. One member of the Discernment Committee will be from another parish and Fr. Nicholas Sichangi will act as liaison from the Commission on Ministry in the diocese. Following her time in this stage of the "process, the group will issue a full report to me and the Vestry, which is required by the Canons of the Church to formally endorse Peggy as a Postulant for Holy Orders. Her training and education would take place in the diocese.

At this juncture, I ask for your prayers for our friend and child of God, Peggy Samuels, for her spouse Larry, and their children Paul and Rebecca. She will need our love and support and gentle encouragement along this path, which at times, can be arduous. Please pray as well for her discernment committee and for Fr. Nicholas, her COM liaison. Pray for me, her Rector, and Santosh, her Bishop.

Though much of this report to you has been centered on ordained ministry, let me also remind you of something I believe is crucially important: each of us, whether ordained or lay, is called to ministry. It may be that the very active roles you once held have changed pace a bit and your primary desire now is to come to church on Sunday. That believe it, or not, is a form of ministry. You may be involved in work outside the doors of the church and not able to do much here. That is ministry. Maybe you are involved in the daily and weekly series of events in the Church and the parish. That is ministry. You see, ministry takes place whenever and wherever you are sharing God's gift of goodness with others. You are all ministers of Jesus Christ. And for that, we give thanks and praise, and glory and honor to God.

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### From the Senior Warden . . .

As we seem to really be following through from the Summer now, there have been several exciting activities and accomplishments that have taken place throughout our Church family these past seasons. Although I may be highlighting various selected items, there are members of the congregation serving in other capacities who may also contribute to these highlights or who can provide additional details as we share in worship and fellowship.

The initiative to increase our partnership with the congregations of St. Luke's in Church Hill, and their partnership with St. Andrews in Sudlersville, has moved forward. For example, regularly-scheduled weekly Bible study, and the Lenten series dinners, which included guided discussions on St. John's Gospel, were carried out with great enthusiasm.

Based on the Diocesan-wide initiative to address the need for improved oversight of adult, youth, and juvenile safety, all members of the Church who are responsible for interaction with children had participated in a mandatory three-hour Safeguarding God's Children training session on Sunday, December 3, 2017. The training also applies to those of us who will be participating in Vacation Bible School (VBS) during the week of July 9 - 13, 2018. In order to accommodate remaining Shrewsbury members who still require this training for day-to-day operations, and for VBS, the next training session was conducted on Sunday, June 10<sup>th</sup> following the 10:00 a.m. service., from 12:00 noon – 3:00 p.m. A light lunch was provided.

Regarding youth ministry and leadership, here at Shrewsbury, and throughout the Diocese, Joanne Fisher, Youth Missioner for the Diocese of Easton, had made a presentation to the Vestry discussing the Diocese's initiative to equip churches in the development of a healthy and sustainable ministry through a children's and youth cohort. She discussed that successful ministries must invest in providing their adult volunteers with the tools necessary to minister to and to lead youth, as well as to train other adults, to build relationships with children and young adults.

In conjunction with this initiative, the Diocese had recently engaged the firm of Ministry Architects to partner with churches, in customizing strategic plans involving clergy, parents, key volunteers, and others for building sustainable models of ministry. The program model provides practical training for participants who are ordained, lay, paid, or volunteer. The benefits of the program include the development of a clarity for children's and youth ministry in the church's congregation, the development of a plan for whole-church family ministry, the incorporation of children and youth into the life of the church, and to cultivate leaders.

By strengthening leaders through teaching and coaching, churches can build systems and processes with individual context, to interact with students, schools, sports teams, or other community organizations. In this regard, several members of Shrewsbury, with teams from other churches in the Diocese, attended an extremely thorough, well-organized session on Saturday, March 3, 2018 to learn key concepts and best practices in developing a sustainable youth ministry. More than focusing on youth, however, the session also reviewed many valuable concepts and practices for improving general leadership skills.

Additional training and coaching sessions in this series are anticipated to be held with team members throughout the Fall, 2018, schedule to be announced. In the meanwhile, the Youth Cohort Team at Shrewsbury is actively working on the description and requirements of a program to address the needs of our youth, with the anticipated implementation of an individual mentoring model.

Concerning selected capital improvements, we issued bid documents to effect masonry repairs and other work for the Church building. The Vestry reviewed and approved the recommendation of Junior Warden and Property Chair, providing for moving forward on chimney repairs, and improving access and safety in the attic for servicing mechanical equipment. The work was scheduled during June 2018 and has been completed; following this work, the plan for renovating the Sacristy, in coordination with the Altar Guild, will proceed. In addition, the Vestry approved an agreement for a masonry contractor to investigate the condition of the Parish Hall patio, based on the report generated by our architect. Work will be scheduled following VBS, to determine the deterioration and to proceed with restoration, which will include, for example, the installation of a handrail at the steps and fencing material at the edge of the patio.

Current Vestry Member Ran Crawford volunteered to become the Deputy Cemetery Warden, to provide additional operational support in coordination with our Cemetery Warden, Greg Jones. Based on this action, the terms of office for Bob O'Connell and Cherilyn Widell continued, in addition to new Vestry Members Maggie Cummings and Peggy Samuels being approved by Parishioners' acclimation at the February 18, 2018 Annual Meeting.

As previously reported, to support the various on-going categories of Church ministries, the formation of several Vestry committees was initiated two years ago. These committees, with established Mission Statements, are focusing on Stewardship & Hospitality, Spiritual Formation, Communication & Prayer, and Social Ministries. Regular meetings have been continuing throughout the past two years, involving the dozens of ministries and activities that Church members take part in.

For example, members of the Social Ministries Committee have been participating in the initiative that evolved from the Kent County Diversity Dialogue Group, with the formation of a County-wide Social Action Committee that has been meeting at Sumner Hall in Chestertown. Other activities have included targeting education needs, economic development, employment issues, and racial inequalities.

Another example involved members of the Prayer & Communications Committee developing updated Shrewsbury informational brochures and signage for selected events. For another illustration, the Senior Warden was invited to make a presentation to the Unitarian Universalist Church in Crestview on Sunday, March 4, 2018 speaking on the Bayside H.O.Y.A.S., Inc. (Helping Our Youth Achieve Success). The Senior Warden serves as Secretary of the Board of Directors of this tournament sports and academic mentoring nonprofit organization for middle school and high school youth. Although presenting on the H.O.Y.A.S. program, my representing Shrewsbury Parish Church at this service was included prominently in my remarks.

In addition, several members of Shrewsbury Congregation, including Fr. Henry, with Parishioners from various Churches in the Diocese, and Bishop Santosh Marray, participated in a Reconciliation Service and luncheon on Saturday, May 5, 2018 at the Harriet Tubman Museum in Cambridge.

This event was in coordination with the several activities in progress leading to the 150<sup>th</sup> Anniversary Celebration of the Diocese of Easton.

This very moving service at the museum was followed by an insightful and poignant discussion on the varieties of institutional racism in our nation, and the responses and positive actions being taken by many in our shared communities. Participants also had the opportunity to tour this very important and informative cultural facility, hosted by friendly, knowledgeable staff. The day was filled with the continuing recognition of suffering that needs to be eliminated, and enduring hope to be embraced.


As everyone should be aware, the Episcopal Diocese has established the new Sagrada Familia de Jesus as a mission of the Church here at Shrewsbury, the first new mission in the Diocese since the 1960s. The new mission is comprised of the Spanish-speaking congregation that has been meeting at Shrewsbury for the past twenty years. In conjunction with this initiative, a leadership team was formed with oversight by Bishop Santosh Marray, consisting of a Senior Warden, Junior Warden, Treasurer, Registrar / Secretary, and three additional members.

In support of the new mission, at the Shrewsbury Church's Vestry meeting of March 19, 2018, a donation of \$5,000 was approved to be provided as start-up funds. In addition, a planning meeting is anticipated to be scheduled as soon as possible with Fr. Thom Sinnott, the Spanish Mission team members, and representatives of Shrewsbury's Vestry, to discuss various organizational, procedural, and spiritual topics. As mandated by the Canons of the Diocese, formal recognition of the Mission is required to be approved at the Diocesan Convention in March 2019.

Providing some highlights of our Church life for this issue of the Newsletter is one way of serving our Church in the capacity of Senior Warden. Thanks to all for participating in our journey.

### Lesson 3: on Soil

The land we tread produces our food, is as a reservoir for our water and provides a habitat for organisms, animals and humans. The way soil is cultivated determines crop success, the possibility of erosion and over fertilization, which can cause runoff of vital nutrients into our water sources. While it may be a mundane topic to some, soil holds many of the mysteries of life on earth. Ordinary soil contains an array of microbes, and is the home of most insects and plants. Seeds germinate and grow underneath the ground – a mystery of life taking place out of sight – until the plants emerge with new growth. Soil is ever changing; subject to the elements of wind and rain and human interference by being moved somewhere else. These truths might speak to our own spiritual lives as we are moved, inspired and even transplanted by the work of the Holy Spirit, working quietly like soft breezes and gentle rains, or in thunderstorms or flash floods. We might see the mystery of darkness in our lives, where growth and new life may be occurring unacknowledged or even unbeknownst to us. Soil is indeed a gift from God. Those who live on land cultivated for crops are mindful of this gift and dependent on God for their livelihood each day. For those who do not live and work as farmers, this teaching module will guide children and their leaders in appreciating the labor, tools, knowledge and gifts of nature required to successfully tend the soil that will produce the crops we all need to survive. This lesson invites children to think about how, in their lives they might tend to their own environments to best allow the work of the Holy Spirit to sustain and maintain their lives as part of the body of Christ.
