## HARMONICA HANDBOOK



## How to Hold the Harmonica:



To start, hold your harmonica between your thumb and first two fingers on both hands. The side of the harmonica that has the numbers above the holes should be on top.

## How to Play the Harmonica:

Unlike other wind instruments, you make sounds on the harmonica while breathing both in and out. DRAW means INHALE like you are drinking from a straw.
BLOW means BREATH out like you normally do (not a hard breath like blowing up a balloon!) (Think "ah" for draw and "hah" for blow.)
You should feel your stomach go in a bit on the blow and out a bit on the draw.

whisper "It doesn't take much air" into your harmonic gently. Try "drawing" as you say this phrase too!


## Good tone test:



Hold the harmonica with just your mouth-between your teeth. This gets your jaw, lips and tongue out of the way. Listen to your sound as you
draw and blow. This is the kind of tone you want to get when you are playing your harmonica the correct way.

Here are some other ways to help your tone:
$\int$ Imagine your mouth is a really big cave
$\&$ Think about how a scuba diver breathes
$\AA$ Blow gently like a cat slowly purring
$\boldsymbol{J}$ Shape your mouth as if you are yawning

If you're feeling lightheaded,
whisper "It doesn't take much air" into your harmonic gently. Try "drawing" as you say this phrase too!


## Good tone test:



Hold the harmonica with just your mouth-between your teeth. This gets your jaw, lips and tongue out of the way. Listen to your sound as you draw and blow. This is the kind of tone you want to get when you are playing your harmonica the correct way.
