This year's stewardship emphasis will focus on the reason we give: God's grace. We are "stewards of God's grace" according to St. Peter. ["Grace" refers to God's favor and goodwill towards us]. Therefore "grace-filled" stewardship means three things:

- We are receivers of grace. Everything we are and have is a gift, unmerited and blessed by God's grace and goodwill to us
- We are bearers of grace. Everything we have is a sign of God's grace and favor. Anything we give comes from a heart of gratitude and a response to this unmerited favor.
- We are sharers of grace. Whatever we give in time, talents or money comes out of a recognition that we are sharing God's grace in all we do and say.

What a wonderful way to understand stewardship! We give, not as an obligation, but as a response to grace. We share, not to pay bills, but to communicate grace to others. Stewardship is not a contractual affair, but as Peter said, it is to "serve one another with whatever gift each of you has received." As we consider our gifts and tithes this year, let's consider this motivation first and foremost. It's all about grace!



WHERE DOES MY OFFERING GO?



First Lutheran's 661 baptized members contributed \$379,090 in 2017 toward the ministries of this congregation. That's not including gifts to special ministries that are not part of the budget, including \$10,055 towards world hunger community dinners, Lutheran World Relief, Easter/Christmas trees, noisy offerings, etc. And don't forget that these gifts are not for our use only, but are given for local ministries, also to our synod and thus reach around the world (51% of our Synod Mission Share is given directly to the ELCA).

The Missionary Outreach account within Endowment has a very important purpose of providing financial support for Christian projects, education, and services to those beyond the physical confines of our church. So far this year, we have helped fund the Service Learning Day at the

Houston by providing funds in
the amount of \$1,575 for the
18 people that attended this
event. Also, the fund provided
\$5,000 to Salem Lutheran in
Toledo for their TONY Adult
Empowerment program to
teach adults how to be selfreliant. These funds employed
two interns for a year, helped
with payroll expenses and
provided supplies for the
program.

The earnings from the investments made in 2017

provided our largest balance available for distribution in 2018. After the above projects, the fund still has \$9,563.48, to be distributed this year. If you know of a deserving project that meets the above criteria, please present your idea to a standing committee to have the request reviewed and presented to the Endowment Committee. Our committee meets the second Wednesday of the month. We hope to see deserving projects presented for requests as soon as possible.

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From our Librarian

Hello everyone. Good grief, Charlie Brown. It is the month of the Great Pumpkin.

Been working hard at cleaning Paul's mother's house. Oh my, the things she kept. Generations of paper, photos, books, letters, cards, dishes. It has been a treasure trove and a constant unveiling of my mother-in-law's life. I just wish she had shared stories and memories surroundings these items and I wish she had shared her thoughts of losing a brother in World War II. She kept it all buried deep inside herself and in the boxes of his things stacked in an upstairs bedroom.

Family secrets. Things we keep to ourselves. A similar topic of a recent book I read. Now it is not often that a piece of fiction touches me so deeply that I am brought to tears numerous times while reading. Such is the case though, with Home Front by Kristin Hannah, who has written many novels, including The Nightingale, The Great Alone, Firefly Lane, Winter Garden.

Jo Zarkades has been in love with Michael since she first met him 13 years ago. Michael, on the other hand, is getting restive in his marriage. His father, who shared the lawyer's practice with his son, has recently died. Without his father, Michael seems to be drifting, until he agrees to defend a Marine recently returned from Iraq, whose PTSD made him kill his wife.

One night, after an argument, Michael tells Jolene that he does not love her any more. The next day Jo learns that she and her best friend are being deployed to Iraq with their National Guard unit. In her military preparations to leave, there is no time to clarify or discuss Michael's comment. Jo's letters home are full of cheer and happiness and lies that swear she is far from any action. In reality, she has watched friends' helicopters crash and burn, lived with shelling day and night, and seen the many horrors of war.

At home, Michael is ever so angry that he is left with the household duties and the daily errands with the two children, (twelve and four) as well as his practice. Slowly he comes to terms with what Jo has been juggling in the home. Meanwhile, his Marine defendant is uncooperative, telling Michael nothing that will help the defense.

Jolene comes home early after her helicopter is shot down, killing one of the crew, seriously injuring another. Her friend is in a coma and Jolene herself is severely injured. She also brings with her the baggage of war...the truth of its ugliness, the pain, the horrors. Yet she pretends she is fine. But she too suffers from PTSD from the anger, guilt, fear and frustration. Only when the Marine opens to Michael does Michael begin to understand what is torturing his own wife. Only then does he first appreciate her position in the National Guard. Only then does he consider her a hero. Only then does he recognize his own selfishness.

So many times, the couple was content to misinterpret something said or done, so many lies were told in an effort to keep everyone happy, so many conversations were left unsaid. So much pain could have been avoided if all had been honest. And then there's that need to listen when one does talk. Neither was ever really listening to the other. The book is so much about what can go wrong of our own doing with a marriage. Likewise, it is a compassionate look at the effects of war on a person and on a family.

The book made me wish my brother-in-law would open up about Viet Nam. He still carries all that with him. And my uncle who died with his story still inside of being shot down over Belgium in World War II.
