

3rd Sunday Advent Year A Matthew 11:2-11



"When John the Baptist heard in prison of the works of the Christ, he sent his disciples to Jesus with this question, "Are you the one who is to come, or should we look for another?" Jesus said to them in reply, "Go and tell John what you hear and see: the blind regain their sight, the lame walk, lepers are cleansed, the deaf hear, the dead are raised, and the poor have the good news proclaimed to them. And blessed is the one who takes no offense at me." As they were going off, Jesus began to speak to the crowds about John, "What did you go out to the desert to see? A reed swayed by the wind? Then what did you go out to see? Someone dressed in fine clothing? Those who wear fine clothing are in royal palaces. Then why did you go out? To see a prophet? Yes, I tell you, and more than a prophet. This is the one about whom it is written: Behold, I am sending my messenger ahead of you; he will prepare your way before you. Amen, I say to you, among those born of women there has been none greater than John the Baptist; yet the least in the kingdom of heaven is greater than he."

Out of the wilderness came this prophet of fire and repentance, his voice a flame igniting souls out of darkness to witness the Messiah. Wherever he went bonfires reddened the night air. He wore a tunic of camel hair, and a rope cincture binding unruly flesh from appetite; he lived on locusts and burr- nested cones. When he entered the Jordan it flowed east, away from the sin-crusted west.

Each wave was engraved with grace as he plunged sinners heavy with the world's woes under only to lift them up toward the light.

But not the Pharisees. Stones would rise sooner. When he announced Christ passing by, the birds of the air carried each honeyed syllable to every open heart and sin-ridden soul.

Eucharistic Renewal Meditation

"The decisive question of liturgical formation is this: As Romano Guardini says, "The first practical task of liturgy renewal is that carried along by this inner transformation of our time, we must learn anew how to relate religiously to each other as fully human beings." This is what the Liturgy makes fruitful. For this we must be formed. Guardini does not hesitate to declare that without liturgical formation "then ritual and textual reforms won't help much." I do not intend to treat here in an exhaustive way the very rich theme of liturgical formation. I only want to offer some starting points for reflection. I think two aspects can be distinguished: formation for the Liturgy and formation by the Liturgy. The first depends upon the second which is essential" (Pope Francis Desiderio #34)

Pastor's Study Desk Notes



Dear St Pius And St Anthony Churches,

3rd Sunday Advent Year A Matt 11:2-11

"Have your people call my people." That is what is going on in our gospel today! We hear about John the Baptist sending some of his disciples to Jesus with the question, "Are you the one? The Awaited Messiah?" John is sending his people, to Jesus, with the certain confidence that the minute they encounter Christ personally, then they will know for themselves, that, yes, Jesus is the ONE (the true one to follow). Some people get troubled by the insinuation from these lines that maybe John is unsure or has questions, about Jesus being the Savior. But surely John knows, right? John is a kinsman of Jesus (Lk 1:36), and he is aware of Jesus' wonders (Lk 1:42-44), and John even baptized Jesus (Matt 3:14-17) complete with the announcement voice of the Father claiming Jesus as His Own Son. So why is John acting unsure about Jesus' identity here? For the sake of his own disciples who may be having a hard time letting go of their time together. It is commendable of John's disciples, how faithful they were to him. Back in Matthew 4:12, we heard that Herod jailed John the Baptist in the attempt to silence him. Of course, this doesn't deter John, and he apparently had a dynamic ministry of preaching conversion to others, even from jail. From today's reading while John is still jailed (Matt 11:2), obviously his disciples were still clinging to him and keeping an audience with him from jail. And we will hear of their devotion to him even after John's martyrdom, as his disciples will come and carry his body away respectfully for proper burial (Matt 14:12). So they were strong followers of him. This is all the more reason for John to take the extra steps necessary to send his disciples' over to Jesus personally, for an introduction and Q&A period with him, where they can witness for themselves the divine presence within Jesus. Then John knows they will discover and know firsthand by their conversation and observation of Jesus' works, that Jesus is the expected Messiah. So this whole exchange is about John's followers coming over fully to Jesus, and accepting Jesus as the ONE John had been preparing them to receive when He came!

This gospel reading is certainly a transition point, leading to an 'Exit Stage Left' kind of moment. John is about to leave the earthly stage, ending his ministry and allowing the light fully to shine on Jesus (He is the LIGHT). John's actions here remind me of the Prophet Simeon who when he looks upon the face of Jesus, Simeon knows his ministry of waiting is over! Jesus is the ONE. I think John echoes here what Simeon said, "Now, Master, you may let your servant go in peace, according to your word, for my eyes have seen your salvation which you prepared in sight of all the peoples...." (Luke 2:29-31). Just a few chapters later than today's gospel reading, we will hear of John's death and burial (Matt 14:3-12). So, like Simeon, John is ready and he is taking care of some final details, like ensuring that all of his disciples transfer properly over to Jesus' company, before he leaves the scene. And like a good movie that has to run the final credits before it ends, Jesus takes the opportunity to recognize and celebrate the greatness of John the Baptist. Jesus honors John by saying he John is a divinely sent messenger (Matt 11:10- that fulfills Exodus 23:20; Malachi 3:1). Jesus adds that John is 'more than a prophet' (11:9) and is the man 'greatest among all born of women' (11:11). It is fitting that Jesus holds off on such praise of John until his death, so that people would not be further confused to mis-take John to be the Messiah. Though John was consistently clear that he was not the ONE, like when he said "I must decrease and He increase' (John 3:30) and that 'one mightier than I, is coming after me' (Matt 3:11), inevitably some people may have felt so persuaded by John that they clung to him. So John's parting act is to fully transfer and make clear to his students that they need to take up Jesus' discipleship now. John was saying, 'Let me go – Jesus is the One to follow'. John is the humble leader who knows when his time is fulfilled. When his mission work is complete, he can gracefully bow out! Peace. Fr Brian
