## **PRESIDENT'S MESSAGE BY DIANE M. GREENWELL**

Greetings HBPOA Members!

I hope everyone along with their families has gotten through the COVID-19 crisis thus far and remained healthy and safe during this trying time for our HBPOA, our community, county, state, and nation. We have been fortunate to live on the water so that sheltering at home has allowed us to still enjoy the great outdoors and get to experience the qualities of our community that we sometimes forget to appreciate.

Our association has gone through some struggles in recent times. Our Fall Festival had to be rescheduled last year due to weather issues. This year the COVID 19 caused cancellation of our April Membership meeting, possibly our May meeting, the community Roundtable, and delayed Board of County Commissioner hearings on issues relevant to our community. Our bylaws which we expected to present at the April meeting were unable to be presented, and we are still hoping we can meet to go over them in order to present them to our Membership at the next meeting in May or June. Meanwhile, we encourage you to review the current bylaws on line at our website, <http://www.hernandobeachpoa.com/hbpoa.html> and send us any suggested changes that you believe would strengthen our association or bring clarity to our bylaws going forward. Our membership which has grown by 78 members came to a halt with the announcement of shelter at home, and has overall caused our community as a whole to suffer economically and socially.

Through this time, one of our members, Joy Martinez, realized the shortage of medical supplies, masks, disposable gowns, gloves, N95 Respirator masks for hospitals and first responders and organized a Medical Supplies Drive allowing people to order supplies on line and have them shipped directly to the EMS Logistics for distribution throughout our county.

Diane Ziemski organized a poll to name our Beach Bear, who we learned

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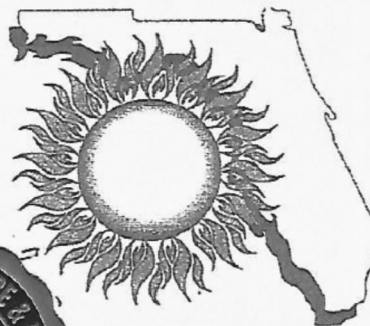
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## GOVERNMENT AFFAIRS COMMITTEE (GAC)

The HBPOA Board voted on March 30, 2020 5-3 to suspend all activities, responsibility and authority of the Chairman of the Government Affairs Committee and the committee. The vote was a result of the Board's due diligence undertaken in an exhaustive effort to review our statutory duties and responsibilities, Articles of Incorporation, current bylaws, and the applicability of Robert's Rules of Order Newly Revised 11<sup>th</sup> Edition. The establishment, limitation of authority, term limits, and oversight of HBPOA committees is the responsibility of the Board. In relevant part, Robert's Rules also state:

*"Standing committees are constituted to perform a continuing function, and remain in existence permanently or for the life of the assembly that establishes them. In an ordinary society, the members of such a committee serve for a term corresponding to that of the officers or until their successors have been chosen, unless the bylaws or other rules otherwise expressly provide. Thus, a new body of committee members is normally appointed at the beginning of each administration."*

The primary mission of the Governmental Affairs Committee as described in Article VII of the bylaws as follows:

- To keep abreast of County, State or Federal activities which may affect the membership interests or the Hernando Beach Community.
- To advise the President, the Board and the membership on actions that they recommend be taken to influence these governmental entities to best represent the interests of Hernando Beach property owners and community.

The committee changes are intended to ensure better transparency and subordinate committees' compliance with the Board's directives. If you are interested in applying for membership on the GAC, please confirm your interest and identify others you may recommend for the 2020 Board's consideration. In addition, at our next membership meeting we will be inviting persons from the general membership who are not officers and directors to apply to become part of a new body of committee members with a new chairperson to be appointed by the 2020 Board.





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## PORT AUTHORITY UPDATE



Although the monthly Port Authority meetings were cancelled for March and April due to our need to prevent the spread of the COVID-19 virus, a lot has been going on in the background and through e-mails and telephone conversations with Waterways and the County. There is a high likelihood the May meeting will be cancelled as well. I'll keep you all posted on that. While this has been unfortunate there is a silver lining: it gives some relief to County staffers who help plan and promote our Port Authority meetings, and allows for "catch up" on the paperwork required to get Pot 3 of the BP oil spill money flowing for the many projects we have slated for those funds.

To fill you in on what I can for now here's an update on Bayport Pier. It will be open to the public soon (however that is a moot point at this time because we are all supposed to stay home to prevent the spread of C-19.) The good news is that most likely it will be ready when we are able to get back out and about.

The oyster reef that was created a couple of years ago is producing oysters slower than expected but the location placement is beginning to recruit mangroves! That was an unexpected, but welcomed outcome. The next oyster reef site will be a bit further out and north of the original one. We have done a test "Bay Ball" in that area which has grown oysters in mass due to having less surge than the original site. We will update you later on when buildout for this new site will begin and hope to have the community support and assistance we had the last time.

We now have 39 reef balls ready for deployment out on Bendickson Reef. That permit is still open and Keith Kolasa (Aquatic Services and Waterways Manager) will deploy them as soon as practical. This will help enhance the already very popular reef site.

The Board of County Commissioners has approved the Boat Ramp Master Plan and will be moving forward as soon as possible in making the changes outlined at the public workshop many of our property owners attended.

The Senate passed house bill HB1061 on or about 3/11/2020 creating the Nature Coast Aquatic Preserve. The bill was dummed down quite a bit from its original form which encompassed all waters from US 19 all the way out to 9 miles off the gulf coast. In the bill's final form, it encompasses only the waters from





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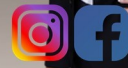
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the high tide line along the coast out 9 nautical miles. It specifically excludes inside canals and grandfathered any Restore projects already in written form and approved. What this means for people living in waterfront homes is that if you live on the inside canals, there will most likely be no additional permits or scrutiny for docks or seawalls other than that which you are already required to have. Those whose properties touch the Gulf *may* have additional requirements in order to build or repair anything, but it can still be done. Supposedly making this area an aquatic preserve will not inhibit recreational or commercial fishing, but we will have to see how that goes. This new aquatic bill encompasses Citrus, Hernando and Pasco counties to fill in the only remaining gap that was left from the panhandle all the way to the Keys.

That's it for now. I look forward to seeing you all again at an upcoming meeting (whenever that may be). We'll have an abundance of items to catch up on and re-ignite our efforts to keep our coastal marine environment, rivers, and lakes as beautiful, user friendly and healthy as we can. Until then please stay safe and follow the new boating mandates and safe distancing guidelines so we can rid ourselves of COVID-19 sooner rather than later!

Because of COVID-19 there isn't much to report with the Water Monitoring Program. I have been taking water samples out of our canals monthly since November 2019. The University of Florida has suspended its travels for the collection of the water samples and has asked the volunteers to refrain from taking any samples for the month of April.

There has been some interest in forming some kind of environmental awareness group, and any and all ideas on how to accomplish this are welcome. 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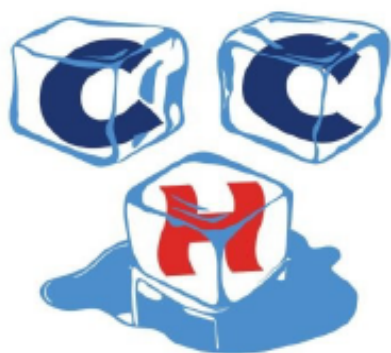

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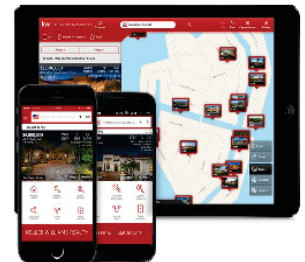
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
