Jennie D'Amato. Barbie: All Dolled Up: Celebrating 50 Years of Barbie. 2009. Friendly, succinct look at the evolution of Barbie

Cindy Eagan and Amy Bates, *The Story of Barbie and the Woman Who Created Her.* 2023. Great choice for kids ages 4-8 years

Robin Gerber. *Barbie and Ruth*. 2010. The only full-length biography of Ruth Handler. Focuses especially (but not only) on her work developing Barbie. My top pick

M. G. Lord. Forever Barbie: The Unauthorized Biography of a Real Doll. 2004. Fascinating (often academic) exploration of the many cultural meanings of Barbie

Jacqueline Shannon and Ruth Handler. *Dream Doll: The Ruth Handler Story*. 1994. Hard to find but fascinating autobiography. Recommended for die-hard fans

Carol Spencer. Dressing Barbie: A Celebration of the Clothes That Made America's Favorite Doll and the Incredible Woman Behind Them. 2023. Engrossing memoir

Tanya Lee Stone. *The Good, the Bad and the Barbie*. 2010. Grade 6 and up. Fun look at the various conflicts over Barbie and what Barbie has meant to people over time

*Tiny Shoulders: Rethinking Barbie.* Documentary, 2018. Available on Hulu. Directed,, written, and produced by Andrea Blaugrund Nevins. Explores the history of Barbie, her meaning in American culture, and the development of the Fashionistas line.

## Barbie Timeline

- 1959 Barbie, aka Barbara Millicent Roberts, introduced at New York Toy Fair on March 9. First Barbie TV commercial airs during Mickey Mouse Club
- 1961 Ken Carson, Barbie's boyfriend, introduced in response to consumer requests
- 1962 Barbie gets her first car and her first dreamhouse
- 1963 Midge introduced as Barbie's friend (later joined by Allan, Ken's friend)
- 1964 Skipper, Barbie's younger sister, debuts
- 1967 First celebrity Barbie, Twiggy
- 1968 Christy, the first African-American doll in the Barbie line, debuts
- 1971 Malibu Barbie introduced, with a suntan and eyes that look forward (not to the side)
- 1980 The first African-American (and Hispanic) Barbies debut. Previous black dolls in the lines had been friends of Barbie
- 1992 Totally Hair Barbie, the best-selling Barbie ever, debuts
- 2004 Mattel announces that Barbie and Ken have broken up (they will reunite in 2011)
- 2016 Mattel introduces the Fashionistas line (classic, petite, tall, curvy)
