



Legend Rock Petroglyph Site contains hundreds of mysterious images associated with the Dinwoody Rock Art Tradition. Listed on the National Register of Historic Places in 1973, the unassuming sandstone cliff has long been recognized as special. Today, we understand Legend Rock as a place of great spiritual significance to Native Americans as well as a place of scientific significance. A recently opened interpretive center encourages protection of these invaluable images and gives testament to the site's power to educate and to inspire wonder and appreciation for the values of many cultures.
