Resolve to Write

The brightly lit ball has fallen in Times Square ushering in 2022. A new year is underway. Setting goals and making resolutions are traditional in spite of the fact that most fall by the wayside within a matter of weeks. For writers the intention to improve their craft is almost certainly a goal, but the question may be how or where to start. Seeking advice from successful people can provide some insight. These "Six Things Alfred Hitchcock Can Teach You about Writing" (from a website called Writers Write) are most applicable to stories of mystery or suspense, but they contain food for thought for any genre.

- 1. "*Drama is life with the dull parts left out.*" Avoid pages of backstory and endless description. Don't bore the readers; entertain them.
- 2. "Always make the audience suffer as much as possible." Readers want happy endings but the characters need to earn them. Create empathetic characters through which the reader can share experiences.
- 3. *"I am a writer and therefore, automatically a suspicious character."* Always look for the dark side of human nature. Become observers of the human condition and never take anything at face value. A complex character is a more interesting hero.
- 4. *"The more successful the villain, the more successful the story."* Many authors contend that heroes are only as strong as the characters who oppose them. Create complex antagonists who are heroes in their own stories. They don't have

To be villainous, but they do have to have a believable story goal that opposes the protagonist's.

- 5. *"I can't read fiction without visualizing every scene."* The result is a series of pictures rather than a book. Setting is important and adds layers of mood or mystery to a story.
- 6. *"I am a typed director. If I made Cinderella, the audience would immediately be looking for a body in the coach."* Stick with a genre that suits your writing style. Most writers enjoy writing what they enjoy reading.

If your New Year's resolutions include improving your writing or increasing output, I hope your resolve stays strong throughout all of 2022. Abilene Writers Guild will provide numerous opportunities for you to hone your skills. Monthly meetings will offer presentations on a variety of topics and the opportunity for lively discussion and camaraderie. The AWG Members Only Contest opens in February and will run through August with monthly exercises designed to encourage our members to write. The 2022 Workshop will be held on March 26 and will feature journalist and award-winning novelist, Laura Conner Kestner. Our Annual Contest will open in October and has categories appropriate to any writing style.

Consider the words of Alex Morritt, writer and poet: "New Year – a new chapter, new verse, or just the same old story? Ultimately, we write it. The choice is ours."

# 2022 Members Only Contest

Exclusive: For current members of AWG only. All entries eligible for Annual Contest. No fees!

Judging: Judges are professionals who may or may not choose to critique entries. Judge's decisions are final. If there are fewer than four entries per category in double category months, categories will be combined. Six entries per month are required for judging.

Prizes: \$20 first prize and \$15 second prize. You are encouraged to attend the meetings to pick up your check. Otherwise, they will be mailed to the physical address provided.

Pay careful attention to all guidelines

Deadline: Submissions may be sent any time after the 12th of the previous month, but no later than the 12th of the contest month.

Enter by Email Only: Send documents as attachments and in Word format only. Subject Line should state: AWG Contest and "Month" (e.g. January). Entries will be returned to the email on coversheet. Warning: some devices may not transmit document correctly, thus disqualifying entry. AWG will respond within five days. It is entrant's responsibility to verify and resend.

Mix & Match: Submit up to 3 entries per month. Enter poetry, prose, or both. Blended themes are acceptable. Must be original work unpublished at deadline (includes Internet posts).

\*\* You may send up to 3 entries and accompanying cover sheets in the same email, but all cover sheets and entries must be separate attachments.\*\*

Cover Sheet Format: Top left: author's name, physical address (to mail prize check), telephone number, and email. Top right: Chosen month of entry, word count for Prose and Flash entries or line count for poetry. (Do not count the title when determining line or word counts.) Title of entry should be centered midway down the page.

Entry Format: Do not include author name on any page. Minimum one-inch margins; prose double spaced; poetry single or double spaced. First page: center title at top, double space then start text. Number subsequent pages at the top center or top right.
