About the AAM

The Asian American Ministry was born at the 225th Baltimore-Washington Annual Conference in 2009 with a vision that every church brings the gospel to all God's people including the Asian Americans in her parish.

As a part of GROW CONGREGATION, AAM hopes each local church grow spiritually as well as increase her number.

AAM team, composed of the clergy and lay members, shares the demographic updates of the Asian American in our parish, brings up the spiritual leadership of the Asian American members of the local church, and develops strategies and ministry ideas to balance the mission and ministry for all.

AAM prays that all churches may call, equip and send the spiritual leaders for the transformation of the world.

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Grow AAM in Your Church

AAM explores three growth phases to develop the Asian American Ministries in a local church level.

1. Awareness Phase

A local church can begin AAM at any time. The vision and passion to offer Christ to the children of all nations are good enough to begin AAM. Awareness phase begins with recognizing the Asian American members and visitors of the local church. Here are several ministry ideas to recognize the Asian American members and friends.

Merry Christmas with Guests from the East (Adventage and Christmas)

Watch Night Banquet (New Year's Eve)
Asian American Awareness Day (Martin Luther King

Jr. Birthday)

Holy Week with Easterners (Lent)
Community Easter Sunrise Celebration (Easter)
Asian American Family Banquet (Mother's Day)
Pentecost Service of Thousand Tongues (Day of Pentecost)

Open House Month (September)
International Day (World Communion Sunday)
Thanksgiving Festival

The church can recognize the Asian American neighbors in her parish. AAM provides a variety of demographic tools to recognize the Asian Americans and their cultural insights. If the church has no budget for the Asian American ministry, she can apply for a funding opportunity for new ministry from the conference, rather than waiting for the budget process (see "resources")

2. Ownership Phase

AAM believes that the church reaches ownership phase when she has more than an Asian American ministry in the area of worship, fellowship, discipleship, service and and/or witness. The church should bring up the leadership of small group for the Asian Americans, along with the annual budget support, so that the Asian American members may:

Lead Worship Service (Music Band, Communion Steward, Altar Guild, etc.)

Be Active in Fellowship (Covenant Discipleship Group, UMM, UMW Circle, etc.)

Engage a Bible Study (Disciple Study, etc.)

Join Service Project and Mission

AAM explores a variety ways to develop the Asian American leadership and to equip the Asian American members of the church. It hosts a training event for the Asian American Ministry. AAM makes an effort to connect the churches to churches to expand the Asian American Ministry in connection.

3. Fruit-Bearing Phase

In the fruit-bearing phase, AAM envisions that the church is equipped to bring the gospel of Jesus Christ for the children of God of all ages, genders, nations and races. The church owns the assimilation process for all including the Asian American members and friends. The church not only performs the ministries for the Asian Americans but also brings up the spiritual leaders for the transformation of the world, so that all may praise God, enjoy the favor of all the people and add to their number daily those who were being saved (Acts 2:47). The church celebrates:

Grow Asian American Leadership
"Liquid Leadership"
Inclusive Ministry and Mission
Networking with Other Asian American Churches
Church as the 3rd Place
