Kerry's Corner

For the next two months, I will be presenting a sermon series called "The Seven Deadly Sins vs. The Seven Heavenly Virtues." Although there is not a specific section within any Bible translation titled the "seven deadly sins", the early church founders brought forth the seven deadly sins based on various scriptures throughout the Bible. This was used as a tool to help people in their spiritual walk. Each of these mortal sins were assigned a color and animal, along with a specific punishment in Hell, to help in the memorization process. Each sin was also assigned a specific heavenly virtue that could be used to combat each specific deadly sin. The concept of the "seven deadly sins" also made it into many of our classic literature pieces such as Dante's Inferno.



The seven deadly sins, also known as the **capital vices** or **cardinal sins**, are a classification of the most objectionable vices. They are, ranked from lesser to worst and (*coupled with their Heavenly Virtue*): 1. Lust (*Chastity*), 2. Gluttony (*Restraint*), 3. Greed (*Generosity*), 4. Sloth (*Diligence*), 5. Anger (*Patience*), 6. Envy (*Contentment*), 7. Pride (*Humility*).

Beginning in the early 14th century, the popularity of the seven deadly sins as a theme among European artists of the time eventually helped to ingrain them in many areas of Christian culture and Christian consciousness in general throughout the world.

One means of such ingraining was the creation of the acrostic "SALIGIA" based on the first letters in Latin of the seven deadly sins.

Superbia (*Pride*): Is excessive belief in one's own abilities, that interferes with the individual's recognition of the grace of God. It has been called the sin from which all others arise. Pride is also known as Vanity.

Your punishment in Hell: You'll be broken on the wheel.

Associated symbols: Pride is linked with the horse and the color violet.

Avaritia (Greed): Is the desire for material wealth or gain, ignoring the realm of the spiritual. 'It is also called Covetousness.

Your punishment in Hell: You'll be boiled alive in oil. Bear in mind that it's the finest, most luxurious boiling oil that money can buy, but it's still boiling.

Associated symbols: Greed is linked with the frog and the color yellow.

Luxuria (Lust): is an inordinate craving for the pleasures of the body.

Your punishment in Hell: You'll be smothered in fire and brimstone. Not kisses.

Associated symbols: Lust is linked with the cow and the color blue.

Invidia (Envy): is the desire for others' traits, status, abilities, or situation.

Your punishment in Hell: You'll be put in freezing water.

Associated symbols: Envy is linked with the dog and the color green.

Gula (Gluttony): is an inordinate desire to consume more than that which one requires.

Your punishment in Hell: You'll be force-fed rats, toads, and snakes. **Associated symbols**: Gluttony is linked with the pig and the color orange.

Ira (Anger): is manifested in the individual who spurns love and opts instead for fury. It is also known as Wrath.

Your punishment in Hell: You'll be dismembered alive.

Associated symbols: Anger is linked with the bear and the color red.

Acedia (Sloth): is the avoidance of physical or spiritual work.

Your punishment in Hell: You'll be thrown into snake pits. That should get you moving.

Associated symbols: Sloth is linked with the goat and the color light blue.

Be still, and know that I am God. The only way you can be silent around God is if you're comfortable in His presence. OR if you want to LEARN to be comfortable in His presence. You see, the way to learn to be truly comfortable around God is to start practicing being quiet in His presence.

We want to invite you to start the practice of being still before God. Every Monday from 8:00 am to 10:00 am we are opening up the sanctuary for a time of prayer and silent meditation. Consider it a way to kick off the work week putting God first and seeking God's direction.



Membership and Information Class



Health and Wellness

I recently gave blood when the blood bus was on campus at Burton. The blood bus comes on a regular basis to Burton and many other locations in our community. The staff are very professional and proficient in their procedures as well as their techniques. I am a regular giver of blood and I was inspired to encourage others to consider blood or blood product donations.

Sometimes I tell myself all kinds of excuses why I can't give on a given day when I see the bus. Some of them have been: I do not have time, I will feel tired, I need my blood, plenty other people donate so there is an abundance of blood, etc.

This year I have flipped those negative thoughts around to some of the positive reasons why I should want to give:

--There is no substitute for blood. It cannot be made or manufactured. Generous blood donors are the only source of blood for patients in need of a blood transfusion. Someone needs blood every three seconds. One 20-minute donation can save three lives (WOW, so powerful!), and there is a shortage of type O (my type). Red blood cells only have a shelf life of 42 days. Cancer patients need our blood/blood components to make it through their treatments.



--Health benefits range from reducing the risk of having a heart attack to discovering potential underlying health issues (cholesterol levels, Hepatitis, HIV, etc.) as well knowing your blood type, a free wellness exam, balancing iron levels. It can also reduce the risk of cancer, stimulate the body to produce new cells, lower cholesterol, reduce risk of heart disease and strokes, prevent liver damage, reduce aging, and *each blood donation can burn up to 650 calories (I did not know this ②).*

--Material gifts range from food pantry donations, beautiful local art t-shirts, movie tickets, and recently I got a tape measure in the mail from One Blood.

I knew many of the facts and benefits of blood donation as a nurse and blood donor, but during my research for this article, I am truly amazed at the *many personal health benefits and benefits to others of giving blood*. Blood and blood product donations are powerful lifesaving gifts! If you are not able to donate, you can make a difference by educating yourself and encouraging others. I hope to see my fellow brothers and sisters in Christ on the big red bus. "Share your power."

After God created birds, fish, and animals, he created humans to be his viceroys and to act "compassionately and gently" toward all forms of life. The future of our fragile, beautiful planet home is in our hands. As God's family, we are stewards of God's creation. We can be wantonly irresponsible, or we can be caring and compassionate. God says, "I have set before you life and death...Choose life" (Deuteronomy 30:19).

Community Bag Program










Pastor Appreciation

Shannon Priddy, President of the United Methodist Women international organization, writes, "United Methodist Women is a place for all women. This sisterhood of grace means something different for every woman, but for me it means calling out injustice when I see it." Though the organization is not political, it takes a stand for women, youth and children advocating for "issues such as just renewable energy, interrupting the school-to-prison pipeline, a living wage for all, and ending maternal mortality."

Burton United Methodist Women members Kim Youngblood, Mary Lou Wilkerson, Edith Zewadski-Bricker, Annabelle Bricker, and two Burton members who have recently moved, Jane Cole and Judy McManus Reynolds, attended the recent Florida Conference UMWomen event, Mission u, held at Florida Southern College in Lakeland. We studied "The Gospel of Mark: Practicing Resurrection," "Women United for Mission," and/or "What about our Money?" Mission U is a four-day educational and inspirational event held in nearly every United Methodist Conference around the world, which offers opportunities "to grow spiritually, to become more deeply rooted in Jesus Christ, and to put faith, hope and love in action."

During Mission u, the women in attendance participated in a candlelight vigil objecting to the separation of immigrant children from their families and praying for an end to the immigrant detention centers for children. Currently, according to a *New York Times* estimate, 15,000 children are in immigration detention centers in the US, with over 3,000 of these children held in the Homestead detention center. Please, won't you join with United Methodist Women as we pray for these children?
