

C.D. EXERCISE PRAISED BY MAYOR

Mr. Goodale, who is an R.S.M. with the 34th R.C.A., also said that it proved that the army and civilians could operate "as a family", "Errors were made," he continued, "but lessons could be and were learned from these errors."

Mayor Pratt who, with Alderman W.G. Milson, toured the various points and watched the two groups at work felt that all who participated had demonstrated a wonderful civic spirit.

Dorval Accepts Fire Truck

Acceptance of the Pierre Thibault fire truck for Dorval (exclusive of the aerial ladder) was proposed by Alderman John Macdonald, Police and Fire Commissioner, at Monday night's city council meeting, and approved unanimously.

The complete truck and ladder assembly had passed city and insurance underwriter tests and specifications the latter part of May.

However, before moving final acceptance of the aerial ladder itself, Mr. Macdonald expressed the desire to give the specifications thereof a final and thorough check and appraisal.

A swimming pool display by commercial interests at the corner of Sources Road and Herron will be permitted by the City, provided that the water therein does not exceed three feet in depth; there is a guard rail all the way around which will be locked; there is an attendant on duty at all times and, when he is absent, a canvas top is placed over the pool.

A notice of motion was given by Alderman W.G. Milson to prepare a by-law regulating the control of private and public swimming pools in the area.

can they apply for membership.

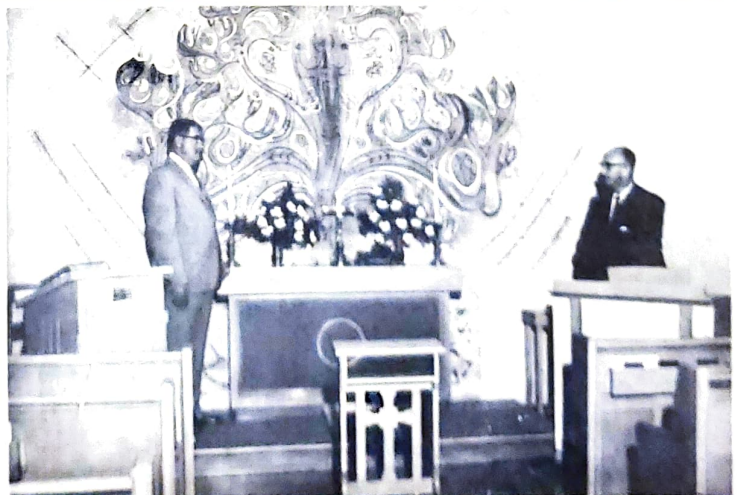

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L'Shore Lions "Mile Of Silver"

Friday, June 9th, and Saturday, June 10th, will mark the 14th Annual "Mile Of Silver" campaign, operated by the Lachine-Lakeshore Lions Club. Proceeds from this event will be devoted to many worthy causes, of which Little League Baseball represents an annual expenditure of approximately \$2,000.00.

The first meeting of the Lions Club to be held locally was in April 1946. The Club was chartered in June of that year with a charter membership of 25. The first few years were difficult ones but the Club is now flourishing with a wide membership of civic-minded Lakeshore residents.

Among their many activities are the following:

- ... Financial assistance to the Building Expansion Fund of the Lachine General Hospital, as well as endeavouring to furnish a ward upon completion of the new wing. TV set donated and Christmas Party and decorations at Lachine General Hospital for the sick.
- ... Christmas Food Hampers for the needy which totalled \$1800.00 last year.
- ... Supply of artificial limbs and wheel chairs for the crippled.
- ... Medical help, eye glasses and hospitalization where needed. Used eye glasses, in connection with Lions International, sent to India.
- ... Operating "Easter Seal Campaign in Lachine since 1951 - first mailing 10,000, now over 30,000. Proceeds divided between Quebec Society for Crippled Children and local aid.
- ... Clothing for the needy - summer holiday equipment for children's camp.
- ... Aid to retarded children in need of treatment.

Little League Baseball is Big League Baseball adapted to the capacities of boys twelve years and under. It is enfranchised with Headquarters in Williamsport, Pa. In 1958, there were 2,826 leagues comprising 11,837 teams and over 250,000 boys in all parts of North America as well as Hawaii, Canal Zone, Philippines and Korea. Regional champions are declared from those entering the play-offs, and eventually a Little World Series is played annually.

The Lachine - Lakeshore Lions Club commenced Little League operations in 1952, and in 1953 received the official franchise to operate a four-team League and teams were organized representing Dorval and Lachine and two minor Leagues.

The support of the Lakeshore public in the forthcoming 14th Annual "Mile of Silver" campaign will assure

a continuation of healthful recreation for our young lads who are able to qualify. The Lions believe very strongly that a reduction of juvenile delinquency results where youngsters are encouraged in healthful pursuits of this type. They also absorb very quickly the elements of good sportsmanship and learn to live companionably with others and to be good losers.

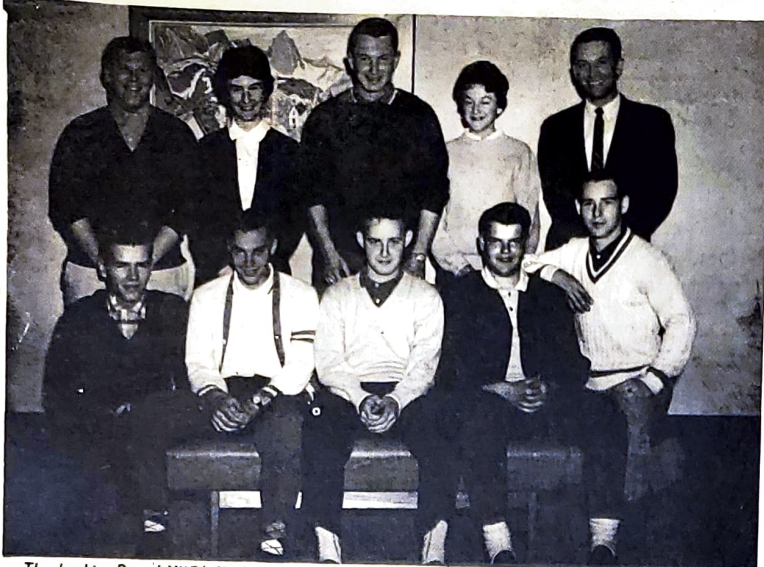

More Workers For Hospital Drive

Three more team captains and 32 volunteer workers have joined the active Dorval-Strathmore district organization working in the current Lakeshore General Hospital Fund's public appeal for \$2,500,000. The building fund appeal is being carried out in Lakeshore communities by hundreds of volunteer workers alling on their neighbors for support in the campaign to build a general hospital in Sainte Claire, just north of Beaconsfield. The committee is providing community health protection for families from Dorval to the Ontario border.

Une mise au point de la Commission des Ecoles Catholiques de la Cité de Dorval

La Commission des Ecoles Catholiques de la Cité de Dorval déplore la publication d'un article paru récemment dans un journal et signé par "l'Alliance des Associations paroissiales de Dorval."

La Commission scolaire croit de son devoir de réfuter certaines allégations de cette Association, dont elle ne connaissait pas l'existence avant la publication de cet article.

Cette association n'a jamais fait aucune représentation, ni officielle, ni officieuse, auprès de la Commission scolaire de Dorval.

Cette Association prétend que le président de la Commission a un caractère intransigeant et qu'il a sontré de l'entêtement à promouvoir un Centre scolaire. Une telle déclaration est fautive, car pour toutes les décisions importantes concernant le Centre scolaire, les commissaires ont voté à l'unanimité et librement, sans être influencés par qui ce soit.

Quant au Centre scolaire, ce projet a d'abord été proposé, le 21 avril 1959, alors que les commissaires ont adopté, à l'unanimité, une résolution en vue d'entreprendre des démarches auprès du Département de l'Instruction publique, à Québec, afin d'obtenir l'autorisation de construire une école secondaire de 24 classes, pour desservir la population étudiante du territoire de Dorval.

Le Département a accordé cette autorisation à la Commission scolaire. Les commissaires ont alors entrepris, avec des personnes compétentes, l'élaboration des plans et devis de la nouvelle école. Plusieurs projets ont été étudiés, après quoi, les commissaires se sont entendus sur des plans qui ont été soumis à Québec, le 9 novembre 1960. Le Département a alors suggéré certains changements mineurs. Mais, en aucun temps, le Département de l'Instruction publique n'a prétendu que l'espace réservé à la bibliothèque et à l'auditorium était trop grand. Au contraire, le Département a suggéré que les plans prévoient plus d'espace à la bibliothèque et un plus grand nombre de sièges à l'auditorium. Il arrive qu'à un certain moment, à ce stade des démarches, il ne fut plus possible aux commissaires de Dorval, délégués à Québec, d'obtenir une révision finale des plans. Une enquête a révélé que certains contribuables de Dorval s'étaient mis en communication avec le Département, à Québec, pour s'opposer au projet. Jamais, cependant, ces contribuables n'ont eu la courtoisie de se présenter à l'une ou à l'autre des assemblées de la

Commission scolaire pour faire part de leurs opinions. La Commission ignorait totalement leurs agissements, de même, que les raisons véritables de leur opposition au projet du Centre scolaire. Chaque fois qu'il a été question du Centre scolaire, la Commission a toujours agi de bonne foi et considère encore que ce projet est indispensable et pressant à cause de la pénurie actuelle de locaux.

En ce qui concerne la déclaration de "l'Alliance" à l'effet que la Commission scolaire de Dorval pourrait perdre \$200,000 en revenus annuels provenant des contribuables hors des limites de la Cité de Dorval, tout le monde sait que ces contribuables n'ont aucun intérêt à s'annexer à d'autres territoires, puisqu'ils auraient alors à payer les mêmes taux de la taxe neutre. Lorsqu'à deux reprises, la Commission scolaire de la Cité de Lachine a tenté d'annexer certains territoires, la Commission scolaire de Dorval a réussi à conserver son autonomie et à maintenir ses droits acquis.

Au cours de la dernière année, les Commissaires actuels croient sincèrement avoir réalisé la tâche qui leur avait été confiée.

Voici quelques-unes des réalisations de la Commission scolaire depuis un an:

- La taxe scolaire a été réduite de 0.80 à 0.60 cents.
- Les bibliothèques des écoles ont été agrandies.
- Les subsides aux étudiants du cours classique ont été augmentés de \$150 à \$250 par année, soit une hausse de \$100 par étudiant.
- Les salaires des professeurs et autres bénéficiaires marginaux ont été augmentés dans le but de retenir ou d'attirer à la Commission scolaire de Dorval les professeurs les plus compétents.
- L'Ecole Joubert est en voie d'agrandissement avec neuf nouvelles classes et d'autres améliorations importantes.
- Les services d'un directeur des études hautement qualifié ont été retenus, pour aider les Commissaires dans leur tâche et diriger l'équipe des professeurs en vue d'améliorer encore la qualité des études.

La Commission des Ecoles catholiques de la Cité de Dorval fait cette mise au point dans le seul but de mettre les contribuables au courant de son travail et de ses réalisations.

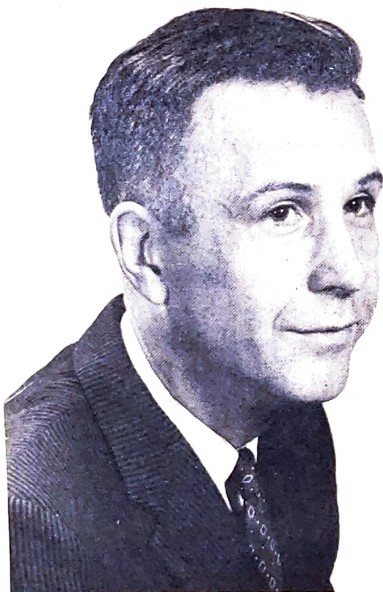

IN FOCUS

THE WORLD IS ACROSS THE STREET: Sometimes the world seems chock-full of disputes, of differences seemingly impossible of solution. Laos, Algeria, West Berlin, Africa, Alabama, Korea, Cuba — every name-place mentioned has earned headlines in recent weeks. Why, we are inclined to ask, can't the leaders of our nations get together and iron out these difficulties like sensible people, without all the threats and counter-threats?

It all seems so easy—when the dispute is far away. We, in Dorval, can easily solve the problem for Montgomery, Alabama—why can't they do it themselves? It reminds me of the fellow who said, "It's funny, but people are never willing to admit their own faults—I would, if I had any!"

DIFFERENCES IN DORVAL? Why should we grow impatient for settlement of disputes in faraway places, if we can't sit down like sensible people and settle arguments taking place in our own back yard?

Next Monday, there's an election in Dorval, an election to choose two members for the Catholic School Commission. There's been more public interest in this election than any School Commission election has been able to command in years. And the differences of opinion behind this interest all revolve around the question of high school facilities for Dorval's Catholic students.

But what are these differences? I, for one, think they are more imagined than real.

Whether between nations or neighbours, honest differences degenerate into disputes because of a failure, not just of understanding — but of understanding Communism does not make us like it or accept it — but of sympathy, of Christian charity and good will.

There may be honest differences about the worth of the plan for a new, modern, integrated high school with separate facilities for Dorval's French and English students, boys and girls. But if there are, why are they not out in the open where they can be examined in the clear light of inquiry and discussion?

Last Monday I was one of more than 100 who attended a meeting of the Dorval Catholic School Commission. I listened to every member of that Commission, one by one around their table, express his support for the new integrated high school. The audience was invited to express opinions. Many people did. Not one voice was raised in opposition, in this democratic assembly. Where were the differences? Street rumours, some of them finding their way into newspapers, has it that there was a dispute between the French and English students at that meeting, in about equal numbers, and spoke in French and English — some in both languages. Not a sign of opposition to the new school emerged, in either language.

WHAT BRINGS US TOGETHER? I suspect that in Dorval, as in Quebec and as in all of Canada, the things that bring us together are far more important than the things which some people would use to separate us.

The new high school, I have heard it said, will come into being because through it we Dorval families of French or English tongue, or both, are able to accomplish together what we cannot accomplish separately. That sounds like good, Canadian sense.

No one, of any language, will dispute this: that our children are entitled to the best education available; that they should not lack those facilities which make for better all-round development and which many other municipalities already have; that, acting together, all can have access to these facilities; which, as separate or sectional groups, we cannot afford.

THE GREAT COST: Some have said that the proposed central high school will cost too much money. We have already been assured that it will not mean an increase in taxes...and it need not, because the Dorval Catholic School Commission has a healthy surplus and can pay for the new school out of existing taxes spreading the cost over 20 years. But the more important question is this: Can we afford not to do the things which will lead our children to responsible places in our society? Can our city, our province, our country, permit Dorval students to be excluded from the ranks of leadership in the arts, the sciences, in industry and the professions through the default of their parents?

This latter is a cost none can afford. My guess is that in this issue, if it really is an issue, Dorval will stand together.

Differences may continue, across the world, but by good sense, sympathy and unselfishness, we in Dorval will settle our alleged differences, across the street.

Refugee Aid Society Elects Lachine Man For President

Mr. J.B. Reid of 160 52nd Avenue.. Lachine was elected president for the coming year at the annual general meeting of the Refugee Aid Society, Montreal Lakeshore, held on Monday evening last at the Pointe Claire City Hall. Mr. Reid is in charge of computer programming at the Trans-Canada Air Lines offices at Dorval Airport. Also elected were: Vice President, Mr. K.A. Dauphine; Treasurer, Mr. Gilles Lahale; Secretary, Mr. R. P. Harpur; other members of the executive are: Mrs. R.D. Williamson, Mrs. J.R. Ballantyne, Miss Audrey McGinness, Mrs. T.D. Nicol-Carne, Mrs. F.P. Whitting-stall, Miss Barbara Clarke, Mr. D. Van Dreunen, Mr. H.M. Snell, Mrs. L. Van Heyningen, and Mr. René Labrosse as Past President.

The official business of the meeting was preceded by two films, one showing refugee life in European camps where there are still some 14,000 refugees. The second film recorded the recent arrival of the Bassanese family, the first group to be sponsored by the Refugee Aid Society for entry into Canada.

Retiring president, Mr. René Labrosse, paid particular tribute to the work of Mr. H.W. Henry, Officer in Charge of Immigration at Dorval Airport, who helped immeasurably in the project. Reports were also received from committees headed by Mrs. R.D. Williamson, Mrs. L. Van Heyningen, and Miss Barbara Clarke.

It was noted that the Bassanese family expects to be self-supporting within a week. Mr. Bassanese has been employed at a brickworks since two days after his arrival. His 22 year old daughter is at present working as a domestic while learning English. Additional English lessons are being given by members of the Refugee Aid Society in the home.

The next refugee family to be sponsored by the Society is expected on June 12, arriving by boat. The family consists of a widow and two teen-age sons. The society is in urgent need of furnishings for the apartment for this new family. Items of particular importance which yet have to be donated are a refrigerator, stove and two single beds. Most items of furniture would also be welcomed.

Dr. R.P. Harpur conferred Honorary Memberships in the Refugee Aid Society for conspicuous achievements in this

field to the 2nd Strathmore Girl Guide Company, Claudia Germaine and Elaine Short; Class 10F Lachine High School (represented by Allan Fletcher); Unitarian Refugee Committee (represented by Mr. McMurray); Lakeshore Catholic Refugee Committee; The Action Club (represented by Miss Elaine Marjerson and Miss Ruby Haaswik, both of Beaconsfield High School). Dr. Harpur specially commended these two teen-agers whose personal efforts have

resulted in the adoption of a 12-year old Hong Kong girl through the Foster Parents Plan. The two Pointe Claire girls successfully undertook to raise \$15,000 every month for the support of the child. Letters are exchanged through Foster Parent's translator every month.

The new president, Mr. Reid, closed the meeting with a reminder that more contributions are needed if additional families are to be brought out of the refugee camps.

The Mountain Playhouse has the reputation for presenting slightly risqué comedies which are improved by one or two visits to the bar before the rising curtain and again at intermission. A pleasant evening punctuated by sniggers is usually enjoyed, but this season Norma Springfield has opened with a rollicking comedy which, though its central theme is illegal, is certainly not immoral. What charmed us, now on the shady side of thirty five, was that all the characters save the maid were in life and on stage, crowding forty, and every one of them was obviously having a real ball!

The plot concerns a wealthy but eccentric Dame who "happens" into fur thievery. She uses the proceeds to support her own worthy causes, such as sending "deserving poor" to Italy on vacation. Assisting her in the Ring are a retired Brigadier who plans each coup like a military operation, and three other weird but amusing companions. The delightful hi-jinks produced by these amateur fur thieves kept a first night audience chuckling steadily. We predict a long and merry fun for "Breath of Spring".

Moya Femwick, with whom we would be proud to claim kinship (our maiden name was "Femwick") is delightful as Dame Beatrice, the leader of the "gang", and our hat's off to Josephine Barrington, whose fine sense of comedy brought verve and charm to her portrayal of Lady Alice. Nan Stewart, as a teacher of voice, brought the house down with her telephone conversation which opened the play, while Freda Allen kept us in stitches with her portrayal of a nerve-wracked potter turned fur-thief. Anne Butler as the good-hearted, devoted maid who



An outstanding life-saving and property saving innovation for fire fighters went on display for inspection in Montreal recently.

Known as the "Trump Snorkel", the apparatus is a hydraulic aerial platform with a jack-knife action boom. The amazing mobile Snorkel can swing up and down and around into badly involved areas of fires - over truss roofs and other hazardous locations where the use of conventional apparatus would be difficult, extremely dangerous and often impossible.

The versatility of this machine enables firemen to vent walls and roofs safely without leaving the platform, and to rescue trapped victims from differently located windows and lower them to the next safest level or adjacent building, thus saving the time necessary to descend right to the ground as is necessary with most other types of aerial apparatus.

Mounted on a standard truck chassis of relatively short wheel-base the Snorkel can easily get through narrow streets and alleys, congested downtown areas and negotiate sharp curves impossible to standard ladder equipment.

To prevent icing on the booms during extremely cold weather, the Snorkel can be optionally equipped with a 60,000 BTU gasoline-fired de-icing heater, which forces hot air, through ducts from the turntable up through the booms to the platform.


