

Our Best Intentions

"I do not understand what I do. For what I want to do I do not do, but what I hate I do," (Romans 7:15), so spoke the Apostle Paul. Somehow he could not translate his best intentions into the actions he wished to do. This is the dilemma that has afflicted Christians who sincerely want to do God's will.

Peter experienced it too. "Lord, I am ready to go with you to prison and to death" (Luke 22:33), he declared, and he meant it. His best intentions were to stick with his Lord, no matter what.

Thomas, too, expressed his intentions. When Jesus said he was going back to Judea where the Jews had tried to stone him, the disciples tried to dissuade him. Realizing that nothing could stop Jesus from going to his friend Lazarus, Thomas said to the disciples, "Let us also go, that we may die with him" (John 11:16). He meant it too.

Yet, Peter denied knowing his Lord, and all the disciples fled in fear the night of his betrayal (Mark 14:50). What they wanted to do, they failed to do. What they wanted not to do, that is what they did. We understand the dilemma well. Like Peter, we weep when faced with our failures. But we do not despair, for we have learned that, while on our own we fail, with God we can do great things.

Christ went to his death in order to buy us back from sin, death, and the devil. We are no longer captive to sin and immobilized by it. "No, in all these things we are more than conquerors through him who loved us" (Romans 8:37). Jesus lived the perfect life for us; he shed his blood in payment for our sins; he suffered in our places; and he gives us grace that forgives our failures and gives us more opportunities to bear the fruit he called us and chose us to bear. Truly, with God we can do great things.

Personal Financial Stewardship

God Blesses Us for our Giving

By faith, we understand that the best investment we can make with our money is investing or giving it to God. Throughout Scripture, when a command to give is stated, along with that command is a reference to the blessings that the giver will enjoy. These blessings come in many forms. For example in Proverbs 11:25, "A generous man will prosper; he who refreshes others will himself be refreshed." In Proverbs 19:17 Solomon tells us: "He who is kind to the poor lends to the Lord, and [God] will reward him for what he has done." God has ordained that, when we give generously, we receive generously.



As Christians, we should give without expectation of receiving anything in return. However, our gracious God, who loves us so much, thrills to bless us. He has put within us the joy of giving and finding reward in another's pleasure.

Through Malachi, the Lord offers a double blessing to those who will be obedient in bringing their tithes to the temple. He promises to reward them materially through plentiful harvests. He promises that, if they will honor him with their tithes, he will prosper them beyond their dreams. Their crops will produce abundantly, and none of their fruit will spoil on the vine. The second part of the blessing is that surrounding nations will see this and realize the special protection that God gives them. "Test me in this," God said. Are you willing to test God with your earnings? Are you willing to bring your tithes to your church before you pay your bills? Are you worried about the mortgage, the clothes, the groceries, and the transportation? Jesus said, "... do not worry about your life, what you will eat or drink; or about your body, what you will wear . . . your heavenly Father knows that you need them. But seek first his kingdom and his righteousness and all these things will be given to you as well" (Matthew 6:25, 32-33). Test him! "Remember this: Whoever sows sparingly will also reap sparingly and whoever sows generously will also reap generously" (2 Corinthians 9:6). Are you willing to sow generously? You are free to sow generously and then to receive God's promise that you will also reap generously. "Give, and it will be given to you. A good measure, pressed down, shaken together and running over, will be poured into your lap. For with the measure you use, it will be measured to you" (Luke 6:38). It is inevitable that, when you give, you will receive, for that is the way our giving heavenly Father has planned it. Be careful not to do your acts of righteousness before men, to be seen by them. If you do, you will have no reward from your Father in heaven. So when you give to the needy, do not announce it with trumpets, as the hypocrites do . . . to be honored by men. I tell you the truth, they have received their reward in full" (Matthew 6:1-2). God pours out spiritual blessings on us when we least expect them. When you are giving out of a desire to obey God's command and to help others, you will find blessings heaped up and running over. These are blessings not understood by those outside the faith.

A Gentle Reminder

The generations of faithful Lutherans that have gone before us have left us a great legacy at Augustus Lutheran Church. Please do your part to keep our buildings neat, clean, and presentable to the many friends and visitors we welcome throughout each week of the year.

A Time to Be Dirty

People can get very dirty playing ball or running around outside. If that happens to you, someone may tell you to go inside and take a bath. But things are different on Ash Wednesday. During that day you may see people with smudges of dirt on their foreheads. Those people have gone to church and had the dirt put on their foreheads on purpose. The smudge stays on their foreheads all day.



Actually the dirt is not dirt at all, but ashes. Ashes are put on people's foreheads to remind them that their lives follow the natural cycle of all life. People live, and people die. But that's not all that Ash Wednesday has to tell us. That day marks the beginning of Lent, and during Lent we find out that our lives don't end with death. Instead we find out that nothing separates us from God's love. God loves us now, and God always will. Putting ashes on people's foreheads also reminds us to look to God and remember all that God has done for us. We ask God to help us live in ways that are good and which don't hurt other people or damage our world.

During Lent the music changes in church. We don't sing "Alleluia!" again until Easter, to help us remember that Jesus died for us. "Alleluia" means "praise the Lord," and we shout that word to express our joy on Easter. On Ash Wednesday, make a sign with the word "alleluia" on it and put the sign in a box until Easter.

COMMUNITY CONNECTIONS

1 Corinthians 12:4-6 reminds us that God gives each of us different gifts and talents. What a boring world this would be if we all looked and acted alike! God made some of us singers, others teachers, and others listeners. Help your children recognize their different talents and how they could best be used to share faith.

Use a game to help them think creatively of ways to serve others. Put several items in a bag and have family members draw them out one at a time, suggesting ways they could be used to serve or help others. Items might include: Bible (share God's word); dust cloth (clean the Sunday school area); can of food (collect food for the hungry); picture book (read to someone younger); page of music (sing in a choir); and dollar (give money to those in need).

Choose a project to work on together to benefit your church or community. Some ideas might be: make a matching game for the church nursery by gluing pairs of pictures to index cards; collect food to be distributed to those in need; plant flowers to beautify a park. To save money for the project, make a "We Share Because We Care" bank. Clean an empty nut can that has a plastic lid. Cut an opening in the lid for coins. Cut a paper cover for the can and label it: "We Share Because We Care." To make decoration stamps, cut several small hearts and crosses from perforated foam rubber shoe inserts or foam meat trays. Glue each shape to a small block of wood to create a stamp. Decorate the paper using the stamps and an ink pad. Wrap the paper around the can and tape the ends together.

Use the decoration stamps described above to create "We Care" cards. Decorate folded pieces of construction paper. Help each person use the stamps to create a different, but beautiful, effect. Write messages of love inside and send or deliver the cards to a care facility, hospital, or prison.

Create a reminder that each person has God-given talents which can be combined with other people's talents to do God's work. Trace around each person's hand on construction paper. Have the person print his or her name and write or draw a talent on the hand. Cut out the hand prints, group them in a circle, and place them in a circle on a large sheet of white paper and glue them there. At the top of the sheet write: "GOD GIVES US TALENTS."

Gather around the circle of hands you made in the previous activity. Join hands and have each person thank God for a talent or ability God has given someone else in the family.

For one, this fundraiser will be supporting the Irente Children's Home, a ministry of the North Eastern Diocese of the Evangelical Lutheran Church in Tanzania. This home cares for babies and toddlers 0-2 years who have lost their parents or whose families are too destitute to raise them. The second ministry this fundraiser will be supporting is Dr. Stephen and Jodi Lynn Swanson, ELCA Missionaries serving at the Arusha Lutheran Medical Center and Selian Lutheran Hospital in Arusha, Tanzania. Stephen is a board-certified pediatric and infectious disease physician serving in the care of children; is active in educational and research efforts and mentorship; helps to develop pediatric medical curriculum and ongoing training of Tanzanian nursing and medical students, assistant medical officers, interns, and international residents; and serves as an intermediary to the international global health community. Jodi participates in the care and management of acute childhood malnutrition in the hospital and community, as well as being active in nursing and health education and training community health workers. The third ministry this fundraiser will be supporting is the Sebastian Kolowa Memorial University (SEKOMU) in the North Eastern Diocese of the Evangelical Lutheran Church in Tanzania, our companion diocese. This university focuses particularly on serving people with disabilities and training graduates to work with people who have physical, sensory, intellectual and be-

This four-part Bible study will explore stories from both the Old and New Testament. 
The Christian church is strengthened when its members eat together. Holy Communion is the special meal shared by church families together in worship. Eating together as a family at home provides blessings as well.


