

To reintroduce the education of the workings of government to all students in the United States in schools that receive any type of Federal funding.

In the House of Representatives

The Federal Educational Act of 2019

Section 1

Any school or school system receiving Federal funding or Federal aid must adhere to the educational schedule described below, or, it must forfeit all Federal funding and Federal Aid for the year following failure to adhere.

At grade 8, at least one full semester of the following mandatory class must be taught to all students: civics in the United States.

At grade 9 at least one full semester of the following mandatory class must be taught to all students: the history of the formation of the federal government 1775-1888.

At grade 10 at least one full semester of the following mandatory class must be taught to all students: the history in the United States of the Democratic, Republican and major independent parties from 1775 through today.

At grade 11 at least one full semester of the following mandatory class must be taught to all students: the history of other major forms of federal governments used around the world from 1775 through today.

At grade 12 at least one full semester of the following mandatory class must be taught to all students: the history of major economic and armed conflicts the United States has had with foreign governments from 1775 through today.

Section 2

Each participating school shall administer a final exam consisting of at least twenty multiple choice questions for each of the classes listed above and an average grade of at least 70 must be obtained for the school to receive Federal funds for the following calendar year. The multiple-choice questions shall be determined at the state level and used uniformly throughout the state.

Section 3

The above schedule must be implemented by August 1, 2021.
