The U.S. is Moving to the Right? Since When?

"You Don't Say" on 2/10 featured the late iconic congresswoman Shirley Chisholm with her decades-old assertion that racial prejudice is moving the U.S. to the "right". The obvious message was that most current problems result from a new movement to the "racist right."
