### The Season of Lent at Calvary



Lent means spring. At least in the northern hemisphere the church season of Lent corresponds with the season of spring, when snow melts (if there is snow) or rain falls warmer than the freezing rain of winter days. The days get warmer and brighter. Small green sprouts poke through the ground and soon blue bells and daffodils bring color and life to our days. The seasons of nature match the liturgical season of Lent bringing a return of light and life. Lent is our opportunity to engage in scripture, prayer and worship, to draw closer to God in preparation for the life, death and resurrection of our teacher, ruler, savior and friend Jesus, the Christ. This is God's call to turn back to God, return to the practice of worship and service, and engage more honestly and deeply with God and with each other as the living body of Christ of whom Jesus is our leader. Jesus is our life and our liberation from sin, death and the power of evil. This is an invitation to return to our God and engage with your fellow Christian friends at Calvary. Our hope is that you will know God's wondrous love through your daily devotions, Wednesday Bible studies, and Wednesday evening Lent soup suppers and service.

How will we do this? It is simple. Come to church on Sunday morning. Come to Lenten services on Wednesday evenings. Those of you who cannot come to Lenten services in the evening can still come to morning and afternoon Bible Study groups on Wednesdays. We will incorporate some of the teaching materials for Lenten services into our morning and afternoon Bible studies. So here is the plan.

Traditional Ash Wednesday worship will be offered on February 26 at 7:00. We will offer the imposition of ashes, God's Word and communion. There will be no soup supper on this evening.

Wednesday evenings in Lent will begin at 6:00 pm and will include a simple soup supper, discussion, and prayer. I hope to use the devotional booklet, "Wondrous Love" as a guide for our Lenten conversations. This year's Lenten booklet is well written, grounded in scripture with literally down-to-earth images for contemplation. You may pick up a devotional booklet at Calvary. On Ash Wednesday we talk about ashes. On another day we talk about water. In a way, all of nature is sacramental and we are hardwired to recognize our spiritual journeys through metaphors of nature. We can also talk about how to preserve this planet whose skies proclaim the glory of God and whose trees of the fields shall clap their hands.

As we live our lives, we may have many different ideas of who or what we are. Children pretend to be astronauts, police, or hero characters in any number of TV shows or video games. February 26: Ash Wednesday Liturgy at 7:00 pm. The service will include the imposition of ashes. "Remember that you are dust..."

March 4, 11, 18, 25, and April 1: For the five Wednesdays in Lent, we will gather at 6:00 pm in the Courtyard Room. We'll begin with a simple soup and bread supper, followed by a conversation using the Lenten devotional, "Wondrous Love":

Wondrous Love provides a devotion for each day from Ash Wednesday to the Vigil of Easter. Devotions begin with an evocative image and a brief passage from the Gospel of Matthew. The writers then bring their unique voices and pastoral wisdom to the Matthew texts with quotations to ponder, reflections, and prayers.

May God's wondrous love be with you during this Lenten season as you walk with Jesus and live into your baptism.



### Stewardship

### From the ELCA:

We are a church that shares a living, daring confidence in God's grace — our congregations are evangelical mission centers where courageous and wise stewards are grown. Congregational stewardship begins with a healthy understanding of gratitude and generosity. We have first received and therefore we give.

Developing a culture of gratitude and generosity is the focus for growing stewards in many congregations. Through the study of Scripture, we develop a trust in God's abundance and strive to be faithful disciples and stewards. The formation of these stewards is a lifelong journey, and one in which we accompany each other.

As a member of the Executive Committee at Calvary Lutheran Church, I attended the joint Finance and Executive Committee meeting as we worked, at your request and on your behalf, to reduce the anticipated expenses to be in line with the anticipated giving as ascertained through our annual pledge drive.

One member reminded us that before we had pledge drives (which help us with budget planning) we created a budget with no anticipated income. Bottom line – we paid the bills and prayed for the income. Having the pledge drives help us be more realistic in what we might expect. No matter which way we look, the budget depends upon individuals.

I am on a fixed income and if our current administration has his way, that too will be cut. Because I no longer have a flexible income, I am able to budget and tithe better. When I was working, I didn't trust (believe) God to provide, which included making me responsible for wise use of the finances God had provided. I admit, I fell far short.

God will provide. In the life of the church of the Book of Acts, they relied upon God's provision through their congregations / followers of Christ. Just be honest. Be honest with God and with your companions along the journey. Read the Book of Acts for the life of the early church.

The Stewardship Committee is mandated to encourage us in our financial giving.

### **Reconciling in Christ (RIC)**

I believe it is very important for Calvary to take action and become an RIC church and the council agreed. I am looking for a core group of 5 -10 members to help me.

I met with a representative from Reconciling Works almost a month ago to follow up on the work that Shari had already done in preparing for her first meeting with a core group. I was to discover that Shari was spot on! We just need an hour of your time to put the team together and get started.

We need a core group of a minimum of five people and would prefer to get at least ten to help with the one on one conversations! This group should need to meet three times. The meetings would look something like this:

**First Meeting** (probably an hour, really shouldn't need to be more):

Identify three questions we want answered in our one on one conversations. Example: 1. Do you have experience with someone from the LGBTQIA community? 2. Do you have concerns about members of the LGBTQIA community and their/your Christian faith? 3. What is your hope for the future of the LGBTQIA community and how Calvary can be more inclusive?

Ask each other these questions and listen to each others response.

Answer one question as a group and simplify our response: 1. Why is RIC important? 2. Come up with a statement or phrase framing why this is important to be shared with everyone but especially those participating in the one on one conversations.

### **Second Meeting** (Less than one hour):

Finalize the three questions.

Finalize the statement or phrase.

Review the one on one meeting process.

Divide and conquer. (Figure out how we are going to identify who we are going to speak to. Three people each? Who should they be?)

Set deadline and third meeting.

### **Third Meeting** (probably a little more than an hour):

What did we learn? Common feelings, concerns, belief statements? Believe it or not this part is organic to the process and you should be able to answer this in just a couple of sentences and quickly.

Answer one question: Do we think that RIC would be approved by the entire congregation at an Annual Meeting or is more work necessary?

If it would be approved; write our mission statement about Calvary as an RIC congregation. If it would not be approved; discuss our next steps.



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### That Energy Star Sticker on your Fridge or Dishwasher...

We've all seen the Energy Star symbol on our new appliances. But what, exactly, does it mean?





Energy Star refrigerators today use about 50% less energy than average ones sold 15 years ago. Energy Star light bulbs use up to 90% less energy and may last 15 times longer than uncertified ones. The washing machines approved under the program use about 25% less energy and 33% less water than uncertified ones, on average.

The program goes far beyond appliances, light bulbs and electronics, also certifying everything from roofing panels and insulation to entire apartment buildings! All told, more than 60,000 products bear the Energy Star label, including a dizzying 872 refrigerators and 390 dishwashers.

You might assume Energy Star applies only to high-end goods, but Jennifer Thorne Amann, from the American Council for Energy-Efficient Economy, a non-profit advocacy group, said that is not necessarily the case. "As we've looked over the years," she said, "we've seen Energy Star products at price points all across the spectrum."

Even if an Energy Star product is more expensive than its uncertified counterpart, the E.P.A. says you'll recoup the cost difference through savings on your utility bills. To help defray the upfront cost of certified products, you look for rebates from your utility provider.

What about the planet? Can Energy Star make a difference? "Yes," said Ms. Amann, who called it an extraordinarily effective program.

Ms. Amann underscored the fact that the benefits from energy efficiency go beyond the environment. "We can reduce carbon emissions and other pollution emissions, and save people money at the same time," she said.

### **How to Recycle Styrofoam**

The Calvary Eco-Faith group will no longer be accepting styrofoam and other plastics to recycle. However, **Agilyx** will accept all forms of polystyrene for recycling.

Polystyrene is found in Styrofoam products such as:

coffee cups, block packaging, meat trays, and to-go containers and in rigid products such as

CD cases, wine-tasting cups, coffee creamer shells, and anything marked with a #6 or PS

They will not accept starch peanuts, PE, or PP foam.

**Agilyx** is located at 13240 SW Wall Street, Tigard, Or 97223. The are located just past the Potso Dog Park. Their recycling drop box is located in their parking lot and it is open 24x7. They do not charge a fee.

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

### Two new additions:




