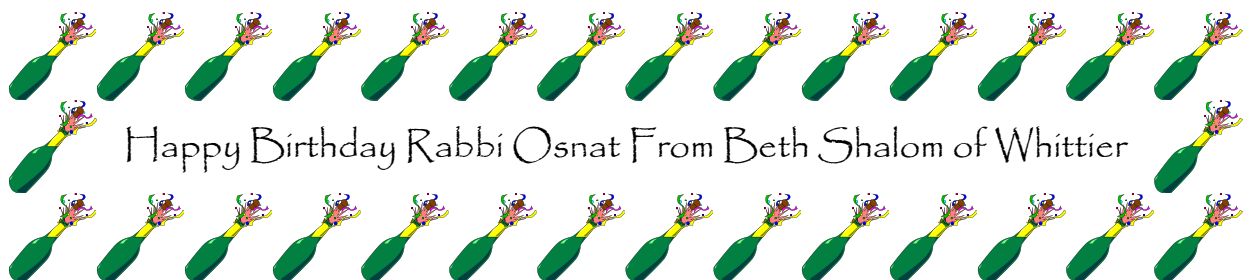

Sh'mini Atzeret/Simchat Torah Service

Beth Shalom of Whittier

October 24, 2016 9:30 am

Rabbi Osnat and Hazzan Lance officiate with Mark Peterson, accompanist. During the service, we recite the festival prayers which include the Psalms of Praise (*Hallel*) and the Memorial Service (*Yizkor*).

The special prayer for rain, *Geshem* is recited at this service to request from God life giving rain to irrigate our fields in the land of Israel. This year, we will present the beautifully written composition for this by Hazzan Meir Finkelstein. This composition for *Geshem* starts with an interlude that brings us into a river moving to bring water to a thirsty earth. It then soars to heights and comes back to earth with a beautiful Broadway-like tune that is the refrain of this prayer. Light sprinkles to torrents are all represented here, but it all comes back to the beautiful tune to request this life-giving rain from our divine maker.

We hope you will want to hear this magnificent composition which will enliven our spirits at this service.

Celebrate Simchat Torah and joyous processions with the Torah scrolls following the service. This festive event marks the conclusion and commencement of the annual Torah reading cycle that continually propels our learning and understanding of our holy writ—the Torah. As part of this service, we chant a special prayer that is called the *Jahres Kaddish* which includes melodies from the entire liturgical year in it.

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Sabbath

[Exodus 20:8-11]

The Fourth Commandment



"Remember the Sabbath day, to keep it holy. Six days shalt thou labour, and do all thy work; but the seventh day is a Sabbath unto the L-rd thy G-d. In it thou shalt not do any work, thou, nor thy son, nor thy daughter, thy manservant, nor thy maidservant, nor thy cattle, nor thy stranger that is within thy gate; for in six days the L-rd made heaven and earth, the sea, and all that is therein, and rested on the seventh day; wherefore the L-rd blessed the Sabbath and hallowed it."

Primary Ritual

Two of the major parts of Judaism are the ethical and the ritual. No one has difficulty understanding the Torah's telling us not to kill, steal, or shame or hurt another person. Judaism contains many ritual laws, rules that strengthen our relationship with G-d. These include the holidays, the Kashrus laws, and things such as Tallit, Tefillin, and the Mezuzah. There is one prime ritual that stands above the rest. That is Shabbos.

Shabbos is more than Rosh Hashanah and Yom Kippur, more than keeping kosher or attending services. Shabbos is the one ritual that identifies and marks the Jew. It is the most important institution of Judaism. It is the primary ritual, the touchstone of our faith. Throughout the Talmud and the Medrosh, we find the Sabbath has a most central place in Jewish thought. Therefore, G-d blessed the Sabbath day and made it holy.

Day of Eternity

To understand the significance of the Sabbath, we must first understand the Sabbath of creation. As we go through the six creative days, we find that each one brings a higher level of creation. First there is inert matter, then plants, then animals, and finally human beings. The seventh day gives us a most profound creation. On that day, on our Sabbath, G-d created Rest. To further understand this, I offer a more fundamental concept: The more something resembles G-d, the closer it is and the more it partakes of Him. Indeed, the ultimate purpose of Judaism is such an emulation of G-d. Our G-d dwells in Eternity; it is a realm beyond change and time. He told His prophet Malachi, "I am G-d; I do not change." [Malachi 3:6] Serenity and being tranquil are therefore an imitation of G-d's attributes.

In a sense, G-d descended to the world on the Sabbath of Creation. He brought about an integral harmony with His world. Rather than continuing to change, He brought the world into harmony with Himself. When we observe the Sabbath, we therefore partake of G-d's eternity and enter into a state of peace with all creation. Shabbat Shalom/Sabbath peace is not just between all of us, but peace between us and all of His creation. We are in a special closeness with G-d. That is the essence of Judaism. The Savior of the Jews is the Sabbath. Far more than Israel has kept the Sabbath, it is the Sabbath that has kept Israel.

Brunch consisted of fresh spinach salad, Vegetarian Adafina (the Sephardic version of Cholent which often tipped off the Inquisition looking for secret Jews), Rice with Carrots and Lemon, Spanish Tortillas (made with eggs and potatoes, probably the most ubiquitous dish in all of Spain), and Tarta de Santiago (Galician Almond Cake). Spanish Cava (their version of Champagne) accompanied the meal.

Susana Elena, the Flamenco dancer, started the program with a history of Gypsies and the various influences on Flamenco, then entertained us with several elegant dances, wearing a different exquisite costume for each dance. We knew we would also be entertained by a classical guitarist, but had no idea of the talent of Almer Imamovic and his wife Jessica, who accompanied him on the flute. They have performed internationally and introduced us to Bosnian music. The morning was magic.

Sephardic Recipes from Flamenco Brunch

Almond Cake Recipe

Ingredients

1/2 pound (1 3/4 cups) blanched whole almonds

6 large eggs, separated

1 1/4 cups superfine sugar

Grated zest of 1 orange

Grated zest of 1 lemon

4 drops almond extract

Confectioners' sugar for dusting

Preparation

Finely grind the almonds in a food processor.

With an electric mixer, beat the egg yolks with the sugar to a smooth pale cream. Beat in the zests and almond extract. Add the ground almonds and mix very well.

With clean beaters, beat the egg whites in a large bowl until stiff peaks form. Fold them into the egg and almond mixture (the mixture is thick, so that you will need to turn it over quite a bit into the egg whites).

Grease an 11-inch springform pan, preferably nonstick, with butter and dust it with flour. Pour in the cake batter, and bake into a preheated 350°F for 40 minutes, or until it feels firm to the touch. Let cool before turning out.

Just before serving, dust the top of the cake with confectioners' sugar. Or, if you like, cut a St. James cross out of paper. Place it in the middle of the cake, and dust the cake with confectioners' sugar, then remove the paper.

Variations

- Add 1 teaspoon cinnamon to the egg yolk and almond mixture.
- Majorca has a similar almond cake called gató d'Ametla, which is flavored with the grated zest of 1 lemon, 1 teaspoon cinnamon, and sometimes a few drops of vanilla extract.
- In Navarre, the cake is covered with apricot jam.

Vegetarian Adafina

Prep time: 15 min

Cook time: 50 min

Yield: 6-8 servings

This recipe is a quick vegetarian version of the Sephardic hamin, the Sabbath dish that would traditionally slow-cook overnight. It's called adafina by the Jews of Spain and cholent to Ashkenazic Jews of Eastern Europe. Though adafina customarily includes meat, this vegetarian version keeps the spirit of the dish. It incorporates greens, as was common among Tunisian Jews, once so influenced by Spain. Adapted from Gil Marks's *Encyclopedia of Jewish Food* and from *Smitten Kitchen*.

Ingredients

3-4 tablespoons vegetable or olive oil, as needed
1 large onion, chopped
3-4 cloves garlic, minced
1 15-oz can diced tomatoes with juice
2 teaspoons ground cumin
1 teaspoon ground coriander
1/2 teaspoon chili powder
1/4-1/2 teaspoon ground turmeric
Pinch of red pepper flakes
2 15-oz cans chickpeas, drained and rinsed
Salt and pepper to taste
1 pound spinach, washed and roughly chopped
1 1/2 tablespoons red wine vinegar
Fresh lemon juice to taste
1/2-1 teaspoon smoked paprika

Preparation

Place a large, deep saucepan over medium heat and add the oil. When oil is hot, add onions and sauté until translucent, about 10 minutes. Add garlic and cook for about a minute. Add tomatoes, cumin, coriander, chili powder, turmeric and red pepper flakes and cook for several minutes, until the tomatoes have reduced slightly. Then add the chickpeas and salt and pepper, and cook for about 15 minutes, or until the chickpeas have heated through and softened slightly. Add the spinach and cook about 5 minutes, until wilted. Stir in the vinegar and cook for another minute. Add lemon juice to taste. If the consistency is a little thick, add some water as desired. Sprinkle smoked paprika to taste to top before serving.

Rice with Carrots and Lemon "Komida de Sefanorya"

from *Sephardic Flavors* by Joyce Goldstein

2 pounds carrots

1/4 cup olive oil

Grated zest and juice of 2 lemons

3 cups water 2 teaspoons salt

1 cup long-grain rice, rinsed and drained

Peel the carrots and grate them on the largest holes of a box grater or with the shredder disk on a food processor. You should have about 6 lightly packed cups.

Warm the olive oil in a large saucepan over medium heat. Add the carrots, lemon zest and juice, water, and salt, reduce heat to low, and cook, stirring from time to time, until the carrots are soft, 8-10 minutes.

Add the rice, stir well, cover the pan, and continue to cook over low heat until all the liquid has been absorbed and the rice is tender, 18-20 minutes.

Remove from the heat and let rest, covered, for 5 to 10 minutes. Serve at once.

We are so excited to invite you to come see the latest installation of community member art on display at the Jewish Federation.

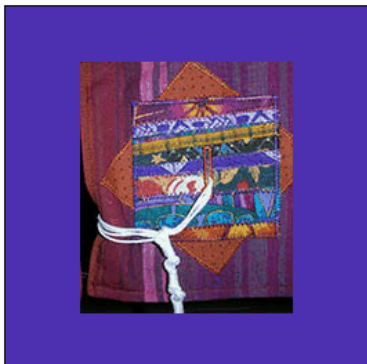

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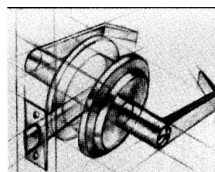

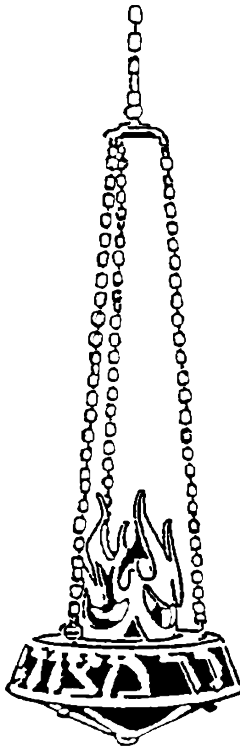
