John Boyd, Phoenix Children's Hospital

John Boyd is the Bike, Pedestrian, ATV Safety Specialist in the Injury Prevention Center at Phoenix Children's Hospital. His role in the Injury Prevention Center has him working with governments, cities, schools, police/fire departments and hospitals in the area of Bicycle/Pedestrian and ATV safety. According to the National Highway Safety Transportation Administration, more children ages 5-14 go to emergency rooms for bicycle-related injuries than with any other sport; many are head injuries. John reaches out to parents and children to stress the importance of the correct use of helmets, bicycles, scooters, skateboards and ATV's. His goal is to reach as many children in our community with tools and materials to keep them safe. John is a retired City of Phoenix Police officer and developed the Bicycle/Pedestrian program for the Phoenix Police Department and Maricopa County Safe Kids. He has a MEd in Educational Counseling from NAU and in his spare time he is training for Sprint triathlons.

Becky Garcia, Arizona State University Police

Becky Garcia is a crime prevention officer with the Arizona State University Police Department. She's been with the department 11 years, with the majority of time spent in patrol functions at all four Arizona campuses. Prior to entering into law enforcement, she spent 20 years in the non-profit world. Officer Garcia is Crisis Intervention Team (CIT) certified and serves on the East Valley CIT council. For nearly 10 years Chief Young was an adjunct professor for Grand Canyon University As the head law enforcement representative for the City of Surprise he is the steward of the Drive Wise Surprise campaign which includes among other issues, prohibitions of and education regarding distracted driving behavior. Representative Randall Friese M.D., State of Arizona House of Representatives

Doctor Randall Friese is a United States Navy veteran and trauma surgeon at Banner Health in Tucson. Formerly a surgeon at University of Arizona Medical Center, he has been serving the citizens of Tucson as a State Representative since 2014. He was one of the doctors who treated U.S. Representative Gabrielle Giffords and nine-year-old Christina Taylor-Green after they were shot in the 2011 Tucson shooting. On a daily basis he sees first-hand the consequences of poor decisions including those who walk, bicycle, and/or drive distracted. He earned a bachelor's degree in biochemistry as well as a medical degree from University of Maryland. He also earned a master's degree from the University of Texas Southwestern Graduate School.

Maria Wojtczak, COO, DrivingMBA Driving School

Maria Wojtczak is the co-found of DrivingMBA driving school. She is highly skilled in large systems change and organizational learning. Maria consulted with senior executives of large automotive business units, high level education personnel, and senior personnel in other organizations. Monte Yazzie is the Injury Prevention Coordinator for the Salt River Pima-Maricopa Indian Community which is part of the Tribal Injury Prevention Cooperative Agreement Program. The Indian Health Service provides funding for tribes to develop their infrastructure in injury prevention to address unintentional injuries. This collaboration allows the IHS to provide the technical guidance in injury prevention program development; implementation; evaluation; training and resource development. Yazzie earned a bachelor's degree from Arizona State University and master's degree from Northern Arizona University.

President Karen Fann, State of Arizona Senate

Senator Karen Fann was elected in November of 2016 to represent Legislative District 1, which covers 8,000 square miles throughout Yavapai County and portions of Maricopa County. She continues to represent her community by serving as a precinct committeeperson and is a member of the Rotary International and Elks. Senator Fann was elected to a two-year term as Senate President in November 2018. She is an Arizona small business owner of a 3rd generation Prescott based highway construction company and knows first-hand the extreme dangers workers face from distracted motorists. She is the only state legislator to have successfully passed a distracted driving bill, all be it very limited in scope, and continues to support common sense safety legislation on behalf of the families of Arizona.

Senator Kate Brophy Mcgee, State of Arizona Senate

Senator Kate Brophy McGee is serving in the Arizona Senate after serving six years in the Arizona House. Kate represents Legislative District 28 which includes North Central Phoenix, Biltmore, Arcadia and the Town of Paradise Valley. Her professional experience includes working in consumer and commercial lending, as a part-time accountant and consultant and as Senior Commercial Loan Officer and Bank Vice President from 1978 to 1990. McGee earned her bachelor's degree in history with a minor in Spanish from the University of Arizona in 1977

Vice-Mayor Billie Orr, Ed.D., City of Prescott

Dr. Billie Orr was elected to the Prescott City Council in November of 2015 and has served as Mayor Pro Tem since November of 2017. Mayor Pro Tem Orr was active in public education for over twenty-five years in Arizona, ultimately becoming the Associate Superintendent of Public Instruction. Under her leadership, Arizona implemented the most vigorous charter school program in the country and created state academic standards that were ranked among the best in the nation. She also worked in Washington, DC with a non-profit promoting high standards, accountability and Public School Choice. She serves on the board for Arizona Town Hall and Yavapai Big Brothers Big Sisters as an Honorary Chairwoman for Women of Influence.

Art Babbott, Coconino County Supervisor District 1

Art Babbott, after serving six years on the Flagstaff City Council, was elected in November 2012 to represent District 1 on the Coconino County Board of Supervisors. It's a diverse district generally includes northwest Flagstaff and sections of the Hualapai and Havasupai Indian Reservations, along the southern border of the Grand Canyon, and west toward the County's border with Mohave County.
